THE WEEKLY MARKET.

There was an increased attendance of both buyers and sellers at the regular weekly market this morning and while the supply of produce was large it was hardly equal to the demand. Garden stuff such as onions, turnips, carrots, beets, endive, radishes, cabbages, celery and such like sold at the regular prices of 5 cents per lb. Eggs were exceptionally scarce that is of the new-laid variety, the price in some instances being 65 to 70 cents per dozen and at that they were given out in half dozen lots.

Butter remained firm at 60 cents per lb. There was considerable fowl offered chickens predominating selling readily at 32 cents per lb. There was only one lot of potatoes offered the price being \$2.25 in single bag lots. Northern Spie apples sold at \$5.00 per barrel.

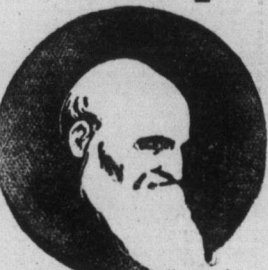
WORK PROGRESSING.

COUNSEL ADMITS CO. HAS MONOPOLY

ELECTRIC COMPANY BEFORE BOARD OF COMMERCE

Ottawa, Nov. 7.—In the case of the Canadian General Electric Co., the Canadian Board of Commerce on the instance of the LaCo-Phillips Company, endeavoring to obtain Tungsten wire, Mr. A. W. A. C. Toronto, appeared for the applicants, said there had been a world wide combine in electric appliances and he held these companies against the spring of the General Electric of the United States. The patents in lamps had been allocated between the General Electric and the LaCo-Phillips Company. The General Electric Company had confessed to being a trust and he thought he would be able to prove the Canadian General Electric was undoubtedly a combine.

Mr. I. F. Helmuth, K. C., for the respondents admitted they had a monopoly in drawn Tungsten wire and that they would not sell it for the manufacture of incandescent lamps. The reason they would not sell to the LaCo-Phillips Company was because it would enable them to infringe the patents of the respondents. He argued that under section 13 of the Combines and Fair Prices Act, if the General Electric Company were misusing these patents by overcharging the public for the lamps then it would be reasonable to grant the application, but as a matter of fact, they were selling them cheaply than were the applicants. They had no objection to selling the wire if it were not used for the manufacture of lamps. It was not a combine, not a detriment to the public, merely a detriment to a rival producer.

Letter to News Record PROHIBITION AND DESPOTISM.

That alcohol is a natural product and that its formation by nature cannot be stopped by Orders in Council or Statutes, seems to be lost sight of by the "Bone Dry" prohibitionists. Wine and cider do not need any assistance by man in their formation. The juice of grapes and apples will ferment and alcohol will form therein in spite of legislation with its accompanying persecution.

In this alleged enlightened western hemisphere, it is proposed to abolish alcohol by law and save souls by statute. This is the latest up-to-date method, and has more followers than the teachings of Christ. The Bible is ignored or not studied, otherwise prohibition would not be preached so much.

It is prohibition first and last and all the time and it never strikes some so-called ministers of the gospel that by advocating prohibition by law and persecution, they are admitting their own failure, and the failure of the churches they represent. People are to enter into the Kingdom of Heaven by means of statutes and Orders in Council or Acts of Congress, as the case may be.

Apart from the religious or anti-religious aspect of the prohibition movement it is contrary to the law of nature and to human rights, and moreover where is it going to end? Reason will tell any person, not blinded by fanaticism, that the only end is despotism by a majority of fanatics.
