

The Oration Which Won First Prize In Seminary Students Contest Waterloo

The following address delivered by Student W. A. Schmidt of the Waterloo College was awarded first prize in the Oratorical Contest.

MR. WILLIAM EWART GLADSTONE.

Escaping Peace, the chief topic of interest, to all classes of people to-day is democracy and equality. There is a marked unrest among the workers of Europe and America. We don't know why but the upper and lower classes seem to have no sympathy for each other. We have all been aroused and incensed by the actions of the Bolsheviks, Trotsky and Levine in Russia. They are masquerading under the name of freedom and liberty, but are only dragging the rich and low down to greater depths of despair and poverty than before.

Mr. William Ewart Gladstone, the great British Statesman, who died in 1898, is the man who laid the foundation for the present democratic government of our great empire, British Empire, which has and we fondly hope will continue to lead the world. Mr. Gladstone raised the poor to the level of the rich instead of pulling all classes lower like the Bolsheviks.

Longfellow tells us that: "We can make our lives sublime, And departing leave behind us, Footprints on the sands of time." The footprints of Gladstone are freedom and wealth which he gave to those who were poor and on the press.

A very wealthy merchant of Liverpool gave him the best education to be had. And as he was a very religious boy and conscientious in his studies he was very successful at school. From the first he was a gifted scholar and orator. While at Eton he distinguished himself in debate and exercised a strong influence among the boys for godliness and conscientiousness. He became famous at Oxford for his oratory and graduated with double first class honors. Nature and Fortune had well fitted him for his tasks, having given him a musical voice with which to charm his hearers, a prematurely developed mind and strong athletic body with which to work and money to help him.

He had written several articles on the church and he had a strong desire to enter its service. But his father influenced him to enter politics. His personal charm and the Sponsorship of the Duke of Newcastle secured him a seat for Newark in 1833 at the age of 24. He was destined to delight and astonish the House for the next 60 years.

It was as Chancellor of the Exchequer that he first displayed that great financial genius which astonished the world. The Scotch are said to be the wisest business men, so possibly it was the Scotch in Gladstone which made him an unequalled master of finance. His first budget speech was a wonder. The budget lessened the burden of the poor taxpayers by raising the incomes of the rich, who could well afford to pay it. It was a tremendous task to make these speeches clear and interesting and to raise the money without burdening anyone. But Gladstone went about it with that conscientious persistence which made him a success. Every member was present and the most intense excitement and interest prevailed when he made his budget speeches. The galleries too were always crowded with people of distinction. The newspapers of the day were full of praise and commendation of his wisdom and justice. He certainly performed a wonderful feat in making mere financial statements so popular. Let us be glad and thankful that a man so powerful used his power for the people.

His devotion to duty, Neither love of office nor even the good will of his colleagues could stand between him and what he believed to be his christian duty to the nation. If this was not true he would not have deserted the Tories who were in power. An ambitious man does not seek popularity by forsaking the dominating party. He was naturally a conservative but he could not fail to see the fallacies of their policy. Nor he could not stand by and see the poorer classes downtrodden. In any ordinary man such conduct would have been fatal to success but the British people were so impressed with his unselfishness, his love of liberty and his honest purpose that they forgot the past. And they supported him in spite of it.

We find the words "greater freedom for the people" in almost every bill he has introduced. The three reform bills which he championed increased the voters from 200,000 to over 5,000,000 and made Great Britain a real democracy. The Redistribution Bill and the Ballot Act divided the voters into constituencies and protected the voters by means of the secret ballot. He abolished the purchase system in the army by means of which wealthy men bought commissions and promotion. Many poor deserving soldiers in the ranks had been held back by this sys-

He introduced compulsory education to be paid from the state treasury, and gave power to districts to elect their own school boards.

Ireland owes much to him for the reforms he introduced there. Although he was the ardent defender and admirer of the Roman Catholics in Ireland of the burdensome taxes which they were compelled to pay to the Church of England. It had been the state church but under him it was disestablished in Ireland. He aided the poor land tenants with many land acts and reforms which lightened their burdens. They had been given the vote by his reform bills. In 1885 Ireland voted solidly for Home Rule and as Mr. Gladstone believed the only right thing to do was to grant it, he set about the task. Home Rule for Ireland was and is to-day a vexing question and whether he was right or wrong opinions differ. The best effort of his political life was to make it the dominating question of British politics. He brought in his Home Rule bill in 1886. It passed the House of Commons but was thrown out by the House of Lords. Home Rule proved to be the track on which Gladstone's political career was wrecked.


But it was not the British people alone who benefited by his reforms. He championed the oppressed wherever he found them. While travelling in Italy he was aroused by the cruelties which were being perpetrated by the corrupt government. He used his influence to secure the indignation of all Europe with the result that the government were overthrown. And when the Turks were abusing the Roumanians and Bulgarians he came to the rescue with his powerful following. And when he was High Commissioner to the Ionian Islands the injustice of holding these people separated from the rest of Greece aroused his sympathy he was instrumental in securing their independence.

This great man is gone but his influence is still felt and will continue to be felt throughout the ages. He was an orator, a writer, a financier and a statesman but in my opinion his sense of justice and his intense hatred of wrong are what really made him distinguished. His qualities as an orator are what made him so successful. Sir Wilfrid Laurier said: "He had the eye of a god the voice of a silver bell; and the very fire of his eye, the very music of his voice swept the hearts of men (even before they had been dazzled by the torrents of his eloquence)." Looking over his life and his achievements we see his one desire was to live that when Thy summons comes to join.

The innumerable caravan which moves to that mysterious realm, where each shall take. His chamber in the silent halls of death. About him, and lies down to pleasant dreams.
