FOSTER AS A FINANCIAL EXPERT

There is a phase of the candidature of Mr. Foster in North Ontario which is neither political nor personal, but of a purely business character. An experienced public financier - one of the three or four best-informed men in Canada in the intricacies of Federal finance-is offering to give his services, without salary, to this very branch of the national business. A man who was for years Dominion Finance Minister, and is many times better equipped to consider with informed intelliggence the financial propos als of the Government than any other available politician, expresses his willingness to attend the sessions of the national "board of directors" and criticize these immensely important proposals from a standpoint independent, at all events, of the Government which makes them.

If this proposition were transferred to the business world, there would be no hesitation about its acceptance Any meeting of shareholders, which was not carried in the pocket of the dominating directors, would send such a man to the board if he were available. Certainly, any business house would accept such expert assistance especially if-as in this case-it was to cost them nothing.

But other questions confuse that business side of Mr. Foster's offer. He is the candidate of a party, and will try to put the present Govern ment out; and he is a strong political leader, and may tend to throw into the shade lesser political figures on his own side. He stands for as much distinctness of policy as there is in our mingled politics; and he is per sonally ambitious. Although he is offering his services for the moment without other charge than his indem nity, he hopes to collect such magnificent fees as party success and, possibly, the Finance portfolio again.

We put these things down paldly in order that none may imagine that we have forgotten them. They are phas es-and important phases - of the Foster candidature. Circumstances could easily arise under which any man's policy, or party affiliations, would make it simply impossible to accept his services as an expert critic of any kind. We are not contending that a man's personality or business equipment should lead to his election. when that election would constitute a victory for a bad policy or a bad

But to-day in Canada party lines are hardly drawn so closely and party issues are hardly cut so clearly that the personality of a candidate should not count. In fiscal matters, even the question as to whether there is much real difference between the two parties is in dispute. And surely under such circumstances-if ever the community might with safety consider the fact that one of the candidates before it at a certain election is a man to whom, if the country were managed like a business corportion, we would be eagerly offering a large salary to do the very work he desires to do for nothing. North Ontario has the opportunity of securing to the country the services of a financial critic who probably has no equal in public life except Sir Richard Cartwright; and if it has any other issue of equal importance before it at this time-to be entirely frank-we fail to discern it.


