in October, in which he was assisted by the Rev. Messrs. Salmon, Wood, and the brothers Silcox, in regard to which Mr. Malcolm reported: "The Lord has done great things for us. We have waited upon Him in faith and prayer, and He has rewarded us with an abundant outpouring of His Spirit. Many souls have found Christ. At our last church meeting, thirteen applicants were received to church membership, and a good number of others are intending to unite with us. Our Sabbath congregation increased from thirty to one hundred and sixty or seventy; our membership from sixteen to thirty-three.

Kincardine—received another baptism of blessing in connection with the visit of the Rev. R. Mackay, at the time of the opening of the new church, in December, 1876. A number of very interesting

cases of conversion and addition to the church resulted.

ALTON AND NORTH ERIN.—Under Bro. H. J. Colwell's charge, have both received large additions to their membership, the former 36 on profession, and the latter 34. In both cases the work has been largely the fruit of the efforts of the Y. M. C. Association in Orangeville, the pastor earnestly co-operating with them.

Martintown—Also reported, through its pastor, Mr. Macallum, that special services, commencing with the week of prayer (Jan. 7), were held, the Rev. R. Mackay, and the Rev. J. Burnet, (Presb.) assisting. "From the first there have been indications of good; a number are already rejoicing; Christians are revived, and for the past few nights there have been from sixty to eighty enquirers."

A little later, "The special services in this place came to a close on Friday, having continued for five weeks every night, Saturdays excepted. The hall in which we first met becoming too strait for us, the meeting was transferred to St. Andrew's Church, which seats between 700 and 800. This place was during the last three weeks, well filled, sometimes crowded. The interest continued to the last, though the enquirers were not so numerous for the last week. As yet we have not gathered up the results, but the three churches which participated in the work will doubtless have an ingathering in due time. One evening, the third week, we asked all those who had recently found the Saviour to take separate seats, when fully 120 were specially addressed. Of these 12 have been received into the church, while many have united with other churches."

Warwick—Also reported in January, "the conversion of a goodly number of souls," from among whom 12 were subsequently received into the Church.

Embro, also, at the same time, was rejoicing in the outpouring of the Spirit upon one of its outstations,—Braemar,—of which the pastor, Mr. Salmon, reported, "Two weeks ago I began a series of meetings, holding them every night. The house soon became too small. We were allowed to occupy a 'cheese factory,' where I have been preaching night after night. We have a congregation of over two hundred. The meetings are still growing in numbers and in
