# THE CANADIAN NORTHWEST

### HOMESTEAD RECULATION

Any even numbered section of De-minion Lands in Manitoba or the North-west Territories, excepting and 26, which has not been homesteaded, or reserved to provide wood lots for settlers, or for other parposes, may be homesteaded upon by any person who is the sole head of family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

### ENTRY

Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the District in which the land to be taken is sithate, or if the homesteader desires Be may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the Local Agent for the district in which the land is situate, receive anthority for some one to make entry for him. A fee of \$10 is charged for homestead entry.

### HOMESTEAD DUTIES

A settler who has been granted an entry for a homestead is required by the provisions of the Dominion Land Act and the amendments thereto to perform the conditions connected therewith, under one of the following

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of any person who is eligible to make a homestead cotty, under the provisions of this Act. resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for by such person as a homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence prior to obtaining patent may be satisfied by such person residing with the father

(3) If a settler was entitled to and has obtained entry for a second homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence prior to obtaining patent may be satisfied by residence up on the first homestead, if the second homestead is in the vicinity of the first homestead.

(4) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead the requirements of this Act as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

The term "vicinity" used above is meant to indicate the same township or an adjoining or cornering town-

A settler who avails himself of the provisions of Clauses (2), (3) or (4) must cultivate 30 acres of his homestead, or substitute 20 head of stock. with buildings for their accommodation, and have besides 80 acres sub-



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### **Canadians Received by Pope**

Rome, Jan. 5 .- The Pope to-day received the students of the Canadian College with the rector, Father G. Clapin, and the administrator, Father Athanase Itacher, and the Canadian clergy at present in Rome, numbering forty-five persons, including the Most Rev. Paul Bruchesi, Archbishop of Montreal; the Right Rev. J. S. H. Brunault, Bishop of Nicolet Quebec; the Right Rev. A. Augustin Dontenwill, Bishop of New Westminster, B.C.; the Right Rev. Timothy Casey, Bishop of St. John, N.B., and the Rev. Lecoq, Superior of the Monastery of St. Sulpice, Montreal. Although the Pontifi was somewhat fatigued, he received them all with charming benevolence, making the Bishops and Fathers Clapin and Lecoq sit next to him while the students and priests formed a circle

about the Pope. Father Lecog read an eloquent address in Latin expressing the loyalty of the Canadian episcopacy, clergy and students to the Holy See. Then the Pope read a sheet in his

The privilege of a second entry is restricted by law to those settlers only who completed the duties upon first homesteads to entitle their them to patent on or before the 2nd June, 1889.

Every homesteader who fails to comply with the requirements of the homestead law is liable to have his entry cancelled, and the land may be again thrown open for entry.

### APPLICATION FOR PATENT

Should be made at the end of the three years, before the Local Agent, Sub-Agent or the Homestead Inspector. Before making application for patent the settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of his intention to do so.

### INFORMATION

Newly arrived immigrants will receive at the Immigration Office in Winnipeg, or at any Dominion Lands Office in Manitoba or the North-west Territories information as to the lands that are open for entry, and from the officers in charge, free of expense, advice and assistance in 60curing lands to suit them. Full information respecting the land, timber, coal and mineral laws, as well as respecting Dominion Lands in the Railway Belt in British Columbia, may be obtained upon application to the Secretary of the Department of the Interior, Ottawa; the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, Manitoha; or to any of the Dominion Lands Agents in Manitoba or the North-west Territories.
