on Policy . INVERNESS, Scotland, Sept. .-The British Cabinet at its neeting here today unanimously approved of the reply Irish Republican Leader. The eply was handed to Robert C. Barton, Sinn Fein Courier, who started for Dublin this afternoon at four o'clock with it.

Earlier reports indicated that ettlement of the Irish question appeared to hang in the balance when members of the British Ministry met Premier Lloyd George here today. It was said that the ministers were not all in agreement as to the best method of procedure to be adopted, some favoring a further exchange of notes with Sinn Fein.
