

ALL IS QUIET AT PORT AU PRINCE

French Cruiser Taking Away Refugees Presence of Warships in Harbor Allays Fears of Foreigners

PORT AU PRINCE, Mar. 18.—Following the decision of the Haytian government to permit the participants in the late insurrection, who have been expelled from the various consulates to leave the country unmolested, the French cruiser D'Estrees is making preparations to take on board all the refugees in the French, German and Spanish consulates at Gonaves, St. Marc and Port a Paix. The cruiser will take the revolutionists to Saint Thomas.

President Nord Alexis has issued instructions in the case of six military officers, of whom Major Larague, commander of the cavalry corps is one, now under arrest on suspicion of being implicated in the recent conspiracy that, if the facts warrant it, they may be taken before a regularly constituted military court for examination.

SHIPPING COMPANIES WANT TO ANSWER

To Serious Allegations Made by Mr. Eaton, of T. Eaton & Co.

LONDON, March 18.—Though the Canadian Pacific and other shipping companies have received no invitation to do so, it is expected that they will demand the right to give evidence in rebuttal to the serious allegations made yesterday by Mr. Eaton of T. Eaton & Co. of Toronto and Winnipeg before the royal commission on shipping lines.

FORTUNE IN MINES FOR WOMAN HERMIT

After Long Litigation California Actress Recovers Claims Valued at a Million Dollars

LOS ANGELES, Cal., March 18.—Marie Redestalle, a woman hermit of Santa Anita canyon, where with her own hands she reared a home in the wilderness and lived in solitude three years, has come into possession of a fortune in Alaska mines, after a long litigation she will leave next week to take charge of the property, reported to be worth a million dollars.

Miss Redestalle was one of the women pioneers who rushed into the Klondike in the early days of the gold excitement, going with "Lucky" Baldwin's famous shipload of actresses, dancers and singers. She went into the wilderness like the men, drove her own dog teams and made her own way, rendering great hardships.

GENERALS IN A FATAL DUEL

ST. PETERSBURG, Mar. 18.—Lieut. General Smirnoff was probably fatally wounded in a duel fought here this morning with Lieut. General Fock. The duel was fought in the riding school of the Chevalier Guard Regiment and fought with pistols at short range.

WOMEN THE MOST LIBERAL TO BEGGARS

QUALITY OF ONTARIO CATTLE MUCH BELOW STANDARD

TORONTO, March 18.—Owing to the scarcity of feed, now general throughout Ontario, the quality of the cattle offered at the various markets this winter has been much below the usual standard. Because it was practically impossible for them to obtain feed many farmers were forced to sell their cattle prematurely when only half fed and often at extremely low prices.

DIED FROM BLOOD-POISONING

MONTREAL, March 18.—A piece of a nose which went into the wound of arm of James McBride, 22 years of age, a driver for the Namath Company, Thursday night caused his death in four days. McBride died yesterday of blood poisoning. He was lying in bed at his room on Thursday night, and in putting his arm to his head he ran the needle, which was sticking in the wall into his arm. The needle broke off near the point and a room mate who was there at the time endeavored to remove it, but without success.

CZAR THANKS ALL DEFENDERS OF PORT ARTHUR

Surrender by Stoessel He Says Was a Shameful Affair.

ST. PETERSBURG, March 18.—The following imperial decree to the army and navy was published here today: "Our heroic defense of Port Arthur, the bravest and most glorious of our military actions, which has just finished, the entire world admires and has established the name of the never-to-be-forgotten heroic deeds of the brave garrison. Courageous defenders of Port Arthur, through your heroic deeds, through your self-sacrificing bravery and fidelity to your oath, shown in defense of your fortress in the hour of danger, you have won for yourselves and added a new and splendid page to the annals of heroic deeds of Russian arms. Russia is proud of you. She will never forget your deeds, as you did not forget your duty to her."

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CHILDREN'S LIVES SIMPLY SHOCKING

LONDON, Mar. 18.—Obed Smith, the new Canadian superintendent of emigration, is dealing vigorously with the neglect in the various districts of the children of English children who are being sent to Canada to support their parents. He is simply shocked.

EMPEROR CONFIRMS STOESSSEL'S SENTENCE

ST. PETERSBURG, March 17.—The Emperor today confirmed the death sentence pronounced upon Lieutenant General Stoessel, and also the court's recommendation for commutation of the sentence to ten years' imprisonment in a fortress. The former commander of Port Arthur ineffectually petitioned for a full pardon.

SALVATION ARMY OFFICERS TALK ON IMMIGRATION AFFAIRS

WINNIPEG, March 18.—Lieutenant Colonel Howell, who is in charge of all the immigration operations of the Salvation Army in Canada, and who has just completed the work of settling five hundred British people in British Columbia, arrived in the city yesterday from the coast. Replying to criticisms of the army's immigration work, Col. Howell said: "We have repeatedly been asked why it is that when there are so many unemployed people in Toronto we should bring people all the way from Great Britain to British Columbia and should leave these people in Toronto unemployed. I see that this matter is referred to in recent telegraph despatches from the East. Our reply to this is that there are constant applications at the offices of the Salvation Army in Toronto for assistance, offering good wages. The unemployed people of Toronto will not accept this employment. The people whom we are bringing out from Great Britain to the West are to go to work the moment they arrive."

PRIZE FIGHTER DIES FROM HIS INJURIES

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., March 18.—"Lack" Allan, a local prize fighter, died today from injuries received last night in a boxing match with Fritz Futsenberger, professionally known as "Young Rhodes," also of St. Joseph. Allan collapsed in the fifth round and was taken out unconscious. Rhodes was arrested today and the coroner will hold an inquest this afternoon. SHOT HERSELF IN TELEPHONE BOOTH

Girl Was Sick and Tired of Living—Note to Mother.

NEW YORK, March 18.—Miss Helen Daenzer, who conducted a school of instruction in embroidery and other fine needlework in Brooklyn, tonight shot herself to death in a telephone booth after summoning an acquaintance to care for her body. The report of a revolver and the dying groans of the suicide carried over the wire to the man who had answered her call, and before he could reach the address given the woman was dead. Across a writing pad which rested on a shelf in the telephone booth had been written: "Somebody will come to identify me. Excuse me for making all this trouble."
