MONTREAL, July 21.-Mr. E. M. Jackman, of St. St. John's, Newfoundland, who for nine years (1900-1909) was Minister of Finance in the Liberal Government of Sir Robert Bond of Newfoundland, died at 11.20 last night (Thursday) in the Home-

opathic Hospital here. Mr. Jackman was born in St. John's, Newfoundland. He came to Montreal eight weeks ago on business. He was removed from his hotel to the hospital suffering from a severe attack of jaundice. Four weeks ago he seemed to be recovering, but peritonitis developed and an operation for gall stone was performed.

His strong constitution stood him in good steed, and he was on the road to recovery, but the excessive heat caused a sudden heart weakness Wednesday afternoon and he did not rally from this.

Ministerial Decree is Posted in Rome Placing Persons and Property of Germans on Same Foot ing as Austrians and Hungarians-Italy May Declare War on Germany

ROME, July 21 .- A ministerial decree was posted to-day placing the persons and property of Germans on tire same footing as those of Austrians and Bulgarians. The decree states that the Allies of Austria are to be treated as enemies and their subjects and goods are liable to sequestration. There has been strong agitation in Italy for some time for breaking off ing at war with Austria, while nominally at peace with Germany was emphasized by an agreement between Rome and Berlin wherein all rights of citizens of one country domiciled in others were to be respected. On July 16th this agreement was denounced by Italy on the grounds that it was not being conserved by Germany. If war is now declared Italian troops may be sent to the Western front, according to expectations expressed in London and Paris.

Threat to America

LONDON, July 17.-The Manchester submarine Deutschland, says that plans for submarines of 3,000 to 4,000 tons existed in Germany and England before the war, but that such vessels were not built because of the time required to submerge them and the impossibility of submerging in shallow water. It points out that the Australian submarine A-E-2 went from Australia to the Dardanelles, and says that if the Captain and crew of the Deutschland are members of the Imperial German Navy the submarine may be dealt with as a naval auxiliary. Otherwise she is a blockaderunner, which could be ordered to stop, and if she attempted to submerge it would be justfiable to sink her.
