DIRECTORS ARE VERY ANXIOUS TO PROBE CHARGE

Both Sides of an Alleged Grievance Heard at the Hospital Meeting.

During the Hospital meeting President Waterous stated that having been told that Mr. James McRobb, Palmerston avenue, who worked for his firm, had been making adverse statements regarding treatment of his wife at the hospital, he had called him into his office. Mr. McRobb admitted that he had uttered criticisms and when asked agreed to come before the board with his doctor, Dr. Pearson. Mr. Waterous stated that he had requested a ventilation because for himself and he knew for the other governors the one desire was to have a general confidence in the institution and to at once clear up any misunderstandings.

Mr. McRobb then addressed the meeting. He stated that his wife had been admitted to the hospital on Feb. 20th and had been moved from one room to another until a ward could be obtained for which he was paying \$15 a week. He said that medicine ordered for his wife had not been given for 36 hours, and he had finally to phone for it himself at Tapscott's. He also asserted that oysters taken there by him had not been given the patient and that she had been placed in a broken down bed. He made complaint and things were better for a time but not permanently. Finally he removed his wife to their home. On one occasion he had looked for half or three quarters of an hour for the Superintendent head nurse or house doctor. He and his family had been in the hospital previously and had been satisfied with their treatment.

Another of his complaints was that his wife had rung her bell frequently without getting an answer for a long time and that she had been given liver for her breakfast. Miss Carson stated that the reason Mrs. McRobb had been moved so many times was that owing to the crowded nature of the building she at first had to be given a temporary room and then objected to the same as Mrs. McRobb suffered from a weak stomach and it was sometimes hard to get solids suitable for her. In such events she had been given liquids of all sorts. The bed given her was a new one, but in moving it from one end of the room to the other the wire underneath had become unlaced at one side. With the present lack of accommodation until the new building could be occupied some inconveniences were bound to occur even with the best of care. As to the medicine when called for at Tapscott's it had been inadvertently ordered among others taken by the hospital man whose duty it was to call. She herself had phoned for it. Mr. McRobb had complained that when his wife rang her bell it was not answered without considerable delay. Unless for a special case with detailed nurse, it was impossible to answer all calls immediately. The night Mr. McRobb claimed he could not find any of the heads for some time, the house doctor was in charge and she thought Mr. McRobb was mistaken.

Dr. Pearson said that Mrs. McRobb was in a very nervous condition and because of stomachic trouble need special diet. He thought this fact had not been sufficiently recognized. Asked if he considered that patients generally were well treated he replied in the affirmative. Mr. Waterous, Mr. Cockshutt and other Governors stated that as the result of enquiries more or less frequent patients in the vast majority of cases spoke well of the hospital. The matter was finally referred to the house committee.

Financial The revenue during the past year includes: Subscriptions, (including the city grant) \$3,224.00; commission \$30; interest on deposits, \$105.10; making a total revenue of \$3,679.10, which with balance brought forward from previous year, of \$1,600.38, making a total income for the year of \$5,279.57.

The expenditures have been as follows: Salaries \$1,444.75; other salaries, including travelling, office rent, etc., \$1,762.28, making a total of \$3,207.03. Showing balance available of \$1,565.56, as follows: Bank of Hamilton \$240.56, Brantford Industrial Realty Company (temporary loan for the purposes of securing site for the Niagara Silk Company building) \$1,325. Making a total of \$1,565.56.
