None Reached Germany on Deutschland, Says Lord Robert Cecil.

London, Oct. 23.—I have been granted an interview by Lord Robert Cecil, Foreign Under Secretary, who in an interview to the American press stated that certain amounts of nickel emanating from allied territory which were despatched to the United States ultimately found their way to Germany on board the submarine Deutschland.

Lord Robert assured me that this in no way referred to nickel from Canada, and that he had no intention whatever of criticizing the arrangements for controlling Canadian nickel or suggestions that any Canadian nickel reaches the enemy. The British government is perfectly satisfled with the precautions taken and arrangements made by the Canadian government with regard to nickel.




