MISS' OR SMALL WOMAN'S EVENING DRESS

A particularly fascinating style for the new evening dress is illustrated in No. 8654. The skirt is really much more simple than it looks, for it has only two gores and the back one is draped so that it gives a suggestion of the new bustle effect, although it is not actually puffed. The skirt is gathered all around to a cascade underbody, which is made of lace and may have shoulder straps of ribbon to hold it in place. Over this there is a separate bodice which drapes gracefully around the figure and fastens under the arms. It may have tiny sleeves, as shown in the small view, or it may be cut down to the perforations for deep armholes.

The miss' or small woman's evening dress pattern No. 8654 is cut in three sizes—16, 18 and 20 years. Width at lower edge of skirt is 1 1/2 yards. As on the figure, the 16 inch size requires 3 3/4 yards of 36 inch or 36 yards 40 inch, with 1 1/2 yards 12 inch lace, and 1/2 yard 2 inch ribbon for underbody. Price, 10 cents.

WOMEN TO SUPPORT
CANNING KITCHEN

Ladies' of County Will Lend
Aid to Send Food Over-
Seas

It was unanimously decided at a meeting Saturday in the Board of Trade Rooms by the Board of Agriculture and the Women's Institutes to establish a community canning kitchen in this district. The assembly was fully representative of the various societies of the city and vicinity and was addressed by Mr. Geo. Putnam of Toronto. The matter was given a thorough discussion before it was definitely decided upon. About seventy-five ladies and a considerably smaller number of men were in attendance. Mr. J. W. Clark made an efficient chairman and introduced the subject to the audience. He stated that the matter had been brought up at the meeting to see, with further and more detailed explanations of the methods and system to be employed, if the Women's Institute of Brant County could not be prevailed upon to take the matter up. The ladies had considered the matter once and decided that there would be too much work entailed to allow the kitchen to be run in the limited time which they had to devote to such a project.

Mr. Putnam dealt with in his address the manner in which the kitchen would be established and the manner of conducting it. The apparatus would be furnished and the building equipped by the government. An experienced processor of the work would be left in the ladies. The gathering of the raw material would have to be done by the persons having autos and all chickens and apples for the work would be contributed by the farmers throughout the district. When the canning had been completed the products would be packed and sent to the hospitals in France to provide luxuries for the convalescent Canadian boys. The building that had been decided upon to be used was situated in Echo Place and was adequately suitable to meet the needs of the ladies. The equipment that was at present was being installed in the building.

Considerable discussion followed during which representatives of both the North and South Brant associations expressed their views on the subject. It was finally decided that if the men would be responsible for the finances of the project the women would look after the labor end of it. The men were, it is under-

stood, to provide the management, and be responsible for the business management.

This was finally agreed to after considerable discussion as to just exactly what was to be expected from the different parties concerned.

The establishment of a community kitchen in Brantford will no doubt become a popular and patriotic way of cheering the boys in the hospitals overseas. The chief articles to be canned for shipping are chicken and different varieties of jam. Those will provide the necessary delicacies for the boys who have done their bit.

Following is the text of the resolution passed:—

"Resolved that we, in special meeting assembled, pledge ourselves to support the Brant County Women's Institute and Red Cross Canning Centre being established at Echo Place, by asking the residents of our respective localities to furnish supplies for the canning centre, the said to be used for military hospitals, upon the understanding that the women's organizations of Brantford and Brant County will endeavor to furnish the necessary labor, and also that the Canadian Agriculture for Brant County and The Provincial Department of Agriculture will assume responsibility for all financing and management."

Played by the Kaiser

Is That of Pecksniff!

Kaiser Wilhelm is looking down upon the battlefield of Quent, west of Cambrai. A war correspondent of the Berlin Lokal Anzeiger is near; alongside, perhaps, and notes the pathetic scene:

His Majesty's silence was broken only once, when he remarked to an officer who stood beside him: "What have I not done to preserve the world from these horrors?"

The form of the question implies that his majesty has done everything, has left nothing undone. This is an important revelation. From it we are able to construct a complete history of the Kaiser's part in the beginning of the war. Since he did everything that could be done to prevent the war, he must have begun his labors at Potsdam on July 5, 1914, when the lords of Germany decided to launch it. He positively forbade them to do so; he must have. When they persisted, he, of course, threatened to abdicate rather than to sanction such horrors. They silenced his protests by binding him and gagging him and imprisoning him in the cellar, while they went ahead with their plans.

It was eighteen days later when the conspiracy bore fruit in the Austrian ultimatum to Serbia. The Kaiser was said to be cruising on the North Sea in his yacht at that time. We know now from his revelation on the battlefield of Quent, that he had a wireless apparatus on his yacht and was keeping it busy with frantic appeals to Kaiser Franz Josef not to carry out the Potsdam plot.

In the ten days that followed he did not send the *hocus-foccus* messages signed with his name, in which the writer pretended a Pecksniffian anxiety for peace and at the same time found some way of blocking everything that Sir Edward Grey or Seanoff proposed for the purpose of bringing it about. On the contrary, the real Wilhelm was besetting the lords of Potsdam with urgent pleas to let him accept the proposals of Grey and Seanoff and get the dispute arbitrated. He must have been.

Indeed, we can go further back even than this. We must assume that for twenty-five years Kaiser Wilhelm had not been planning this blow at the peace of the world; that he had not been building up his army and creating his navy and taking advantage of every incident, from Agadir to Adrianople, to forest the domination of the world by Germany. He did not approve, he disapproved, he must have disapproved; the seizure of Bosnia and Herzegovina in 1908; the stirring up of Bulgars and Serbs against each other in 1912; and all the other steps that led inevitably down the road to this war. He did everything he could to prevent them. It must be so. And he failed. Now, with a clear conscience, he can seek posterity, by way of the correspondent of the *Lokal Anzeiger*, "What have I not done to preserve the world from these horrors?" And there is a point on which he need have no doubt—posterity will answer him.

Codfish Very Prolific.

The cod is estimated to yield 45,000,000 eggs each season. As many as 5,000,000, 8,000,000 and even 9,500,000 have been found in the roe of a single cod, says London Tit-Bits.

An eel was caught in Scotland some years ago which contained a brood of 10,000,000 eggs. This, however, would appear to have been an exceptional find, and it is generally admitted that the cod is more prolific than any other fish. Though not so prolific as the cod, many kinds of fish are exceedingly prolific. More than 36,000 eggs have been counted in a herring, 38,000 in a smelt, 1,000,000 in a sole, 1,125,000 in a perch, 2,400,000 in a sturgeon, 242,000 in a carp, 332,000 in a perch, 546,000 in a mackerel, 392,000 in a perch, and 1,257,000 in a sander.

The oyster is also very prolific. It has been ascertained by recent observation that in the liquor of their shells small oysters can be seen by aid of the microscope—150 in the space of an inch, covered with shells and swimming actively about.

A herring weighing six or seven ounces is provided with about 30,000 eggs. It has been estimated that in three years a single pair of herring would produce 150,000,000.

Buffon calculated that if a pair of herring could be left to breed and multiply undisturbed for a period of twenty years, they would yield an amount of fish equal in bulk to the globe.

Mail After Ten Years.

Tristan da Cunha, to which, after an interval of ten years, a mail has been sent from England, is an island about midway between the Cape of Good Hope and the South American shore. When Napoleon was imprisoned on St. Helena a company of artillery was placed on guard in Tristan, although it was 1,500 miles south of the Little Dependency.

On his death the guard was removed, and only three men left to guard the fort. These adopted agricultural pursuits and did a brisk business with passing sailors. In eight years the population increased from three to twenty-seven.

The 103 people who form the present population of Tristan da Cunha are of mixed descent, and descend, for the two companions of Capt. Glas obtained from St. Helena Hindoo girls as wives. A further admixture of blood has resulted from the arrival of shipwrecked sailors. Indeed, the great-granddaughter, Curpie Glas, is married to a Danish sailor saved from an Italian ship.
