TO HAVE TWINE

In Time for the Late Corn Crop—That is what the Promoters of the Factory Expect.

"We will not have the factory running in time to provide binder twine for the early harvest," said T. C. Smith, secretary of the Chatham Binder Twine Company to The Planet this morning.

"We will, however," continued he, "probably have it running in time to provide twine for the late corn crop."

A STATE MOURNS

The Body of the Late Governor Pingree, of Michigan, lay in State in Detroit To-day.

Gov. Pingree's body was lying in state in the City Hall, Detroit, to-day, and thousands of citizens called to take a farewell look at the features of Michigan's former chief.

The remains were taken from the train to the City Hall by a G. A. R. escort through a line of bare-headed people.

The members of Detroit post were first, followed by the delegation of soldiers and supervisors that had gone to New York to escort the body home.

Schrammer's band was next in line, and then followed the general public.

The first of the crowd to look on the pale and placid features of the ex-governor was a woman in calico dress, perhaps someone who had been befriended by the governor. She had wiped up the corner eagerly, as though fearing that something might happen to prevent her gazing into the face in the casket.

There were tears in her eyes as she turned to the little boy at her side and lifted him up to look at the remains.

The one striking feature of the crowd that streamed through the corridor was that it was made up of the common people, for whom the ex-governor has made such sacrifices.

Men in laborers' clothes, poorly-dressed women and boys, bootblacks and newsboys, constituted by far the larger portion of the crowd.

WAGE DISPUTE

Judgment Given Against the Employer with Costs—Mrs. Burgess gets 6 weeks in Jail.

William Morrison, of Raleigh, appeared before Magistrate Houston at the County Police Court this morning charged by Joseph Matchett with the non-payment of wages. Matchett claimed that he hired with Morrison on the 1st of April for three months at \$30.

Morrison, on the other hand, claimed that he had hired Matchett from the 1st of April until threshing time, which was a matter of about seven days longer than the time that Matchett claims he was hired for.

Judgment was given against Morrison with costs.

Norman Hooper, a farmer of Raleigh township, charged Mrs. Katie Burgess with stealing \$11.85. She was found to be guilty, and sentenced to two weeks in the county jail.

A hard fall of a farmer living with his father-in-law, Robert Lowe, of Raleigh. Mrs. Burgess is a widow who was keeping house for Mr. Lowe. Hooper claimed that during his absence from the house Mrs. Burgess entered his room and took the money. Mrs. Burgess positively denied the charge and stated that she had seen another woman enter the house and proceed upstairs. She did not know whether the other woman had taken the money or not.

The Magistrate, however, considered this a very improbable story, and could see no other course than to convict her.

In sentencing the prisoner he remarked: "I am very sorry to have to do this, but I firmly believe that you are guilty. I feel sorry for your little children, but the law will have to take its course. I have made the sentence as light as possibly could."

To this she replied: "No one can do a wrong but the facts will in time come to light. I am not guilty of the charge and know nothing of the stealing. The Lord is my Judge, and I am thankful for it. He knows that I am not guilty."

The Magistrate, however, assured her that he did not wish to condemn an innocent person, but the evidence given proved that she was guilty, and that was all that he had whereby to judge her.

The boy "desperado," Elmer Langhorn, pleaded guilty to stealing and was remanded until Monday for sentence.

POLICE COURT

Ollie Reeves answers to a Charge Assault on Jim Jie—Jas. Sykes Gets 3 Years in the Central.

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He pleaded not guilty to both charges. Reeves is possessed of quite a Police Court record. On April 19, 1896, he was fined \$3 for assault; on August 15, 1896, he was dismissed on a charge of trespassing; on Aug. 21, 1897, he appeared on a charge of assault, and on Dec. 31 he was fined \$4 and costs on a charge of assault.
