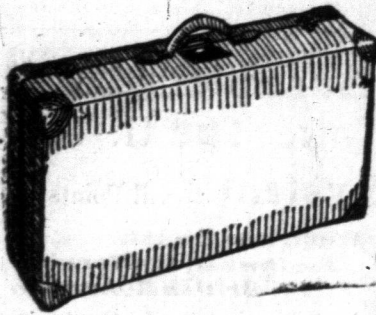

FUNERAL OF MR. DOBELL.

Folkestone, England, Jan. 14.—Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal, the High Commissioner for Canada, and Jos. G. Colmer, secretary of the office of the Canadian High Commissioner, represented the Canadian Government at the funeral to-day of Sir Richard Reid Dobell, the Canadian minister without portfolio, who was thrown from his horse and killed near here on Saturday last. Canon Woodhouse officiated at the services, which were attended by a large number of persons.

Paris, Jan. 14.—The Chamber of Deputies to-day resumed its sessions. Paul Deschanel was re-elected president of the House, without opposition. The Senate also re-assembled to-day, and adjourned until Thursday.

At Ridgeway yesterday an air-brake on a M. C. R. freight train broke, and the rear portion of the train stopped so suddenly that brakeman E. L. Johnston, of this city, was thrown forward against a car door, his face and nose being bruised. He came to the city, where Dr. Curtis attended him.—St. Thomas Times.

Charles Sutton, proprietor of the Royal Hotel, was married on Dec. 31, 1901, to Miss Jennie Nicol, of Thamesford, Ont. The bridesmaid was Miss Ethel Sutton, of Fingal, sister of the groom, and the best man was Edward Nicol, the bride's brother. They are spending their honeymoon in Hamilton, St. Thomas and Fingal.—St. Thomas Times.

The worst snowstorm of the season struck St. Thomas on Saturday. The snow came from any and every direction. It quit early in the afternoon and started again early in the evening. No matter which way you walked it was in your face and made you draw down your eyelids and duck your head to keep out the stinging flakes. On Sunday it was cold, but the snow had ceased to fall. Traffic on the railways was not greatly interfered with, trains not being a great way behind time yesterday.—St. Thomas Times.

Windsor is still keeping up its marriage record. For the last six months of the past year the number ran up to 448, and Rev. James Livingstone, of Windsor Avenue Methodist Church, had the largest number to his credit, having 135 ceremonies to perform. Rev. D. H. Hibb, of Sandwich, officiated at 130, Rev. David Robinson at 81, Rev. J. C. Tolmie at 35, and Rev. J. P. Hincks at 32. The remaining marriages were distributed among the other ministers. There were 132 births and 91 deaths for the half year just closed.

BIDDLES RESPECTED.

Harrisburg, Jan. 13.—Gov. Stone has respected John and Edward Biddle, the Allegheny county murderers, that they may get their cases before the Board of Pardons. John is respite from Jan. 14th until Feb. 25th, and Edward from Jan. 16th to Feb. 27th. Their cases have never been before the Board of Pardons.

HIGH KICK MAY COST HER LIFE.
Vienne, Ind., Jan. 11.—Elsa Condon, head waitress at the new Grand Hotel, is dying as the result of injuries to her spine received in a fall by trying to kick a tray of dishes held by one of the waitresses under her. Miss Condon attempted to make the kick in order to win a friendly wager, and, losing her balance, fell backward, her spine striking against an overturned chair. She has been unconscious for hours in a room at the hotel, and the three doctors who have been with her pronounce her case hopeless.

WINDSOR ARMORIES.

The officers of the 21st Regiment paid a visit of inspection to the new armories yesterday, and all were delighted with the appointments. Everything is up-to-date. In fact it is claimed they are the most modern in the Dominion. It is expected that the building will pass out of the contractor's hands at the end of this week. The finishing touches to the heating and the lighting and a few odds and ends are all that now require to be done.

The officers will hold the first meeting in the officers' quarters on Thursday evening.

RESULTED FATALITY.

Charles Thomas (colored) 20 years of age, fell from the bumper of a stock train as it was pulling into the Michigan Central yard at Montrose early Saturday forenoon, and the wheels passed over his left leg, badly crushing it. He was picked up unconscious and was taken to the M. C. R. Emergency Hospital, where Dr. McGarry amputated the limb near the trunk. The shock was too much for the man and he died. He became conscious just before death and gave his name. He claimed to have ridden on a freight train from Springfield, O., to Windsor, Ont. Thomas said he rode on the bumper of a stock train from Windsor, which place he left Friday afternoon. He had fallen asleep and was knocked off when the train stopped on entering Montrose.—St. Thomas Journal.

SEVERELY FELT.

Toronto, Jan. 14.—The scarcity of soft coal and coke still continues, and the foundries in the city find it difficult to obtain a supply. The Toronto Foundry Company were compelled to close down for a short time, but have succeeded in securing enough to carry them until a supply, which they have ordered, is received. The great trouble is the difficulty of securing transport, but in addition to that, there is but little soft coal being screened. The laying up of the lake steamers always decreases the supply of screenings, as they use only the best screenings of lump coal. It may be some months before the situation is relieved.

The Letter-Box

Editor of The Planet,

Dear Sir,—I see the Mayor has given instructions that in future notices should be given of any matter brought before the council. This is a step in the right direction in conducting the business of the council. It should be one of the standing orders that any motion which any colleague wishes to bring before the council or committee, such matters should be sent to the clerk in writing at least eight days before the meeting of the council or committee, so as to enable the matter to be put on the agenda paper and posted by the clerk to each alderman. This gives each member time to look the matter up, and be prepared to support or object at the next meeting.

The standing orders should be enforced by the chairman and no important question should be dealt with of which due notice had not been given.

There are other important matters I should like to see dealt with, viz., the short terms in which aldermen are elected. I consider this a very weak point in the municipal system which lessens the efficiency and independence of the council.

Experience has abundantly proved that the worst form of government had happened under the yearly system. No appointment should be made for personal or friendship sake.

No qualification but fitness should rule. Position in civic government should be secure and permanent and good work should have its full reward. Recognition of honesty and industry would encourage the study of municipal government.

COLLEGIATE QUESTION.

J. C. Fleming, Thomas Scullard and J. W. White, a committee of the C. C. I. Board, met in Harrison Hall this morning, to consider a letter from Hon. Richard Harcourt, Minister of Education. Mr. Harcourt asked that the C. C. I. Board consider the alleged injustice of the High School Act respecting the provisions pertaining to the responsibility of county councils toward High Schools, situated in municipalities separated from the jurisdiction of the county council, and schools in municipalities not so separated. It is regarded as unfair that while the separated municipalities are not required to contribute any part of the cost of maintenance for county pupils, the unseparated municipalities contribute their share of the total amount levied by the county council for maintenance of all county schools. The result of the committee's deliberations in this matter will be presented at the next meeting of the C. C. I. Board.
