IT MAY END IN DIASTER

Fetersburg, May 9.—The danger of an early conflict between the Government and farliament has been greatly increased by what has happened within the last twenty-four hours. The good impression produced by the official intimation of the new Premier that the Emperor and the Government were sincerely desirious of working in harmony with Parliament, which was accepted in good faith by the leaders of the Constitutional Democrats, enabling them to counsel moderation has largely been dissipated, and in its place the old feeling of mistrust has been revived. The Liberals are utterly stunned in view of the semi-official assurances on the subject, by the unexpected promulgation late Monday night of the obnoxious fundamental law in a slightly modified form.
