DISTINCTIVE POINTS OF COLOR AND FORM IN BEST STYLES.

The "Picture" Feature Again in Favor—Perfection of Line and Faultless Finish Give Tone to the Costume—Fantastic Hats.

Rather curiously, considering the season, a note of gray seems to have crept into the exclusive fashions, perhaps because they are exclusive and as a silent protest against the clashing and crude outburst of color presented in popular styles of the present. An idea of the way in which the gown builders gain the effect of simplicity and real chic even in the "picture" costume of the season may be gathered from the cut as well as an example of the fancy for subdued color alluded to.

The material selected for use in this costume is a fancy spot chiffon velvet in a curious but beautiful mauveish

gray hue that recalls certain tones of the green fig. The front aspect is that of the most elegant princess, the silhouette accentuated by broad crossed strappings of the velvet and the upper part thrown back bolero-wise, with revers of shot silk and a cascade of lovely tulle lace.

The back, however, furnishes the daring feature of this confection, for there the strappings develop into a wistful effect, the folds falling direct from between the shoulders, where they converge into narrowness from a handsome cut steel buckle. The short elbow sleeves are entirely of lace, inclosed within a crossed sheath arrangement of the velvet. Perfection of line, faultless finish and general "ton" raise this costume to a niche of its own.

Two very up to date fancies in millinery occupy the second cut. The first model is an individual one of brown velvet, with crown of mink and in the shape of a sweeping eagle's beak of ostrich feathers, shading from brown to pink.

Preparation for the Messiah.—Matt. 3, 1-12.

Golden Text.—I will send my messenger and he shall prepare the way before me.

The prophecy of our lesson was fulfilled 600 years, after its utterance. The preparer of the way was John the Baptist.—Mark 1, 1-2.

The Lord whom they sought did come to His temple, but only two old saints, Anna and Simeon, recognized Him on His first visit. He came to His own but His own received Him not. Their priests were bad and the people, with such leaders, were corrupt. Who of them could stand before the faithful Malachi, let alone His Master? Not one.

V. 3—How long do you keep that silver in your lair in this furnace? asked a visitor to a silversmith. Until I see my own face reflected in it as in a mirror, was the answer. Mrs. General Booth, one of God's saints, suffering and dying with the terrible agony of a cancer, was thus treated by the Lord and though hundreds of thousands in sympathy prayed for her recovery, yet He thought it best thus to refine this (finest of gold) and all suffering saints can say, "all things work together for good."

V. 5—A swift witness.
