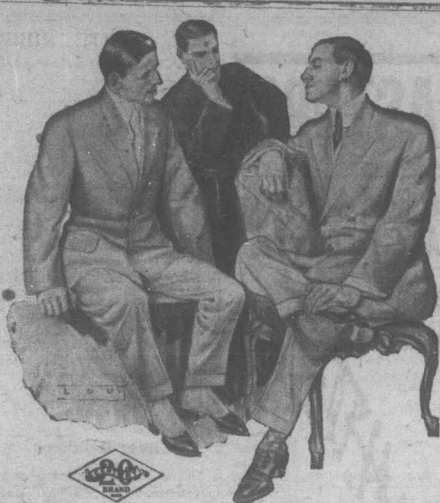

In supreme court chamber on Saturday, Mr. Justice Graham granted W. H. Townsend, of Kentville, leave to appeal to the judicial committee of the privy council from the decision of the court-in-banc delivered on August 3, which held the defence a good answer to the action he has brought against Justice Eaton and Beckwith for ordering the seizure and destruction of \$5,000 worth of his liquor on September 26, 1905. Security was fixed at \$350.
