JOHN PERCY

The death recently at Avondale of Mr. John Percy removed a link with the early days of the last century. Born at Brigus on June 28th, 1823, he was in his 98th year when the summons came to come up higher. Mr. Percy came of an old family whose history dates back to almost the first settlement in Brigus. He spent his life at the fisheries, first going sealing at the age of 14 years. He was a life-long member of the Methodist Church, and took a deep interest in the Orange Association. YOUNG HEROES' MONUMENT

Yesterday it was our privilege to see a beautiful monument, the work of Mr. Fred. Chislett the well known marble worker, turned out recently to two fine youths who made the Supreme Sacrifice in the great war. These brave lads who were quite young when they gave their services to King and Empire were George William and Leo James Collins, sons of Mr. James Collins so long connected with the firm of Parker and Monroe. The former lad was killed at the battle of Monchy and the latter at Steenbeke. The monument is of Vermont marble and very beautifully wrought, each of its four sides showing a kind of baserelief of the Sacred Heart of the Saviour while the Crucifix and Rosaries surmount the sacred emblem, forming a border which is beautifully gilded. Besides the boys who thus bravely gave up their lives, other parts of the monument contain the names of three other deceased children of Mr. and Mrs. Collins, viz. Margaret, Catherine and Augustine. The monument is placed on a fine pedestal and will be set up in Belvidere cemetery.
