NEW FISHWAY ON NASHWAAK RIVER TO BE STARTED SOON

Construction Operations Will Be Commenced Before End of the Week.

SALMON BLOCKED AT DAM AT MARYSVILLE

People Gather to Watch the Unusual Sight—Fish are "Helped" Over.

The construction of a new fishway in the Marysville dam across the Nashwaak will probably be undertaken this week, following the completion of rafting operations above the dam to-day. The new fishway, which has been made necessary through the carrying away of the former one, will be located in the western end of the dam. The need of fishways for the purpose of allowing fish to proceed upriver for spawning has been clearly demonstrated to the uninitiated in the collection of salmon which have gathered at the foot of the dam unable to proceed farther. MOTOR VEHICLE LICENSE FEES ARE ABOVE ESTIMATE

Actual Receipts Are Already More Than Estimated For Fiscal Year.

GROSS RECEIPTS WILL REACH \$400,000 MARK

Highway Patrol Fund Receipts Over \$55,000 With More Than \$40,000 Owing.

Receipts in fees under the New Brunswick Motor Vehicle Act have already exceeded the estimates for the present fiscal year, it became known to-day. Estimates tabled in the Legislature last spring showed \$325,000 as the anticipated receipts for the licensing and registration of automobiles, motor trucks, motor cycles and all other motor vehicles as compared with \$201,272.16, the actual receipts of last year.

Actual receipts up to a week ago amounted to \$327,843.50, it was learned to-day at the Public Works Department, where Premier Veniot was busily engaged in departmental work this morning. These figures showed that the estimates had already been exceeded and the total is expected to be considerably augmented before the close of the fiscal year through returns from dealers to whom license tags are issued in quantities to be placed upon cars as disposed of.

It would not be surprising if the gross receipts from fees under the Motor Vehicle Act this year passed the \$400,000 mark and amounted to at least \$100,000 more than last year. Estimates at the last session of the Legislature included an amount of \$65,000 for Motor Vehicle Patrol Fund which has been gathered up by means of an additional impost of 20 per cent. on top of the usual fees. From this source more than \$55,000 has actually been paid into the Motor Vehicle Branch of the Public Works Department but a sum of upwards of \$40,000 remains to be collected from persons who had taken out their "tags" before the new order became effective and who have failed to make payments as required by the retroactive features of the regulation. It is understood that definite steps towards the collection of these amounts are being immediately commenced.
