valuable fish the eel is, the wonder is
some enterprising person before this

Fishing at Fox Island.
Monday's fishing at Fox Island, the
first fair day after the gale, was good.
It seems the blow stirred the fish up,

brought to Chatham immediately, in the

NORTHUMBERLAND COUNTY
COUNCIL.
The regular Semi-Annual Meeting of
the Northumberland County Council was
opened at Newcastle yesterday, at 12
o'clock. In the absence of Mr. Warden
Brown, Mr. Anthony Adams was ap-
pointed Warden. The minutes of the
last meeting were read and approved,
and Messrs. Loggie and Cettier were
appointed constables to wait on the
Council.
The Council adjourned to dinner.
AFTERNOON.
The Council met at 3 o'clock, when
licenses were granted to parties making
application.
T. F. Keary, retail, 6 mos.
On motion of Coun. R. B. Adams
assessment in the Parish of Chatham
was ordered, to indemnify Mrs. Towell
for land through which the road leading
from St. John Street to Foundry Lane
was to run. Some discussion arose on
the motion.
Coun. Burchill presented a petition
from Mrs. Quigley of the Parish of
Newcastle praying for remuneration for
damages sustained by the burning of a
town sewer, the water overflowing, rush-
ing into her cellar, and destroying and
damaging vegetables, potatoes, etc. in
her cellar. A committee of three was
appointed to enquire into and report
upon the matter.
Coun. R. B. Adams presented a peti-
tion from Donald McGruar praying for
an abatement of interest on amount due
the County by him, for land purchased
from the County in 1864. A motion
of R. B. Adams that a rebate of 50 per
cent. be made, after some discussion
was lost.
The Council adjourned till 10 o'clock
today.
