

Local and Other Items

A bad electrical storm at Montserrat on the 8th interrupted to a considerable extent telegraphic service.

Two polar bears with Ringling Brothers' circus, at Schenectady, N. Y., succumbed to the extreme heat. One of them had been packed in ice.

The priests of this diocese are attending their annual retreat at St. Dunstan's University this week. Rev. Father Coyle, S. J., is conducting the exercises of the retreat.

Harold Munro, aged 19, dislocated his neck when he struck his head on bottom in diving at the Parkdale Toronto Canoe Club into four feet of water. He died a few hours later.

A local machinery concern at Hamilton, Ont., has received an order for a threshing machine to Palestine. This is the company's first business dealings with the Holy Land.

According to intelligence from Edmonton, Alberta, wireless telephones may be used by forest rangers, in their duties to protect the reserves in the vicinity of Lesser Slave Lake.

A young lad named Smith, whose parents reside at Minden, Ont., was drowned in Gull river while trying to walk a tight rope over the water. He was a good swimmer and it is believed he was a victim of heart failure.

The Dominion cabinet on the 7th passed an order in council setting aside a portion of the money to be received from the expeditionary force canteen fund to be used for the purpose of relief among indigent veterans of the late war.

The city's water supply of Allantown, Pa., was cut off several hours during an invasion by an enormous army of frogs. They clogged the filters and mains and were extracted with difficulty.

Following a terrible hail, rain and electrical storm, which swept the Canora, Saskatchewan district, an astral phenomenon in the shape of a comet tore through a clear sky in a rain of sparks and exploded leaving a small cloud in the sky.

Charles H. Jackson of Brockton, Mass whose friends claimed he was the largest man in the world, died at the hospital in Cambridge on the 6th. In 1916 he weighed 630 pounds but a five years illness had reduced him to 400 pounds. He was 61 years old and was six feet tall.

Great Britain, through Premier Lloyd George, on the 11th, virtually accepted President Harding's invitation to participate in a disarmament conference. Addressing the House of Commons, Lloyd George said he welcomed with the utmost pleasure Harding's "wise and courteous initiative." "No effort will be lacking on the part of the British Empire to make the proposed conference a success," Lloyd George said.

Miss Phoebe J. Fairgrave, 18 years old, of St. Paul, Minn., established what was said to be a new world's record for a parachute drop for women when she dropped 16,200 feet from an airplane at Curtiss Flying Field near that city on the 10th. It took exactly twenty minutes from the time Miss Fairgrave leaped until she alighted safely in a wheat field. "It was terrible," said Miss Fairgrave later. "I never want to try again."

A very singular accident happened in the blacksmith shop of M. Bailey, Winchester, Ont., on the 7th, by which William Link, of Cass Bridge, lost a valuable horse, worth, it is claimed, over \$200. The horse, which was a highly excitable and nervous animal, was taken in to be shod. Above its head hung an electric wire for light. The horse, in its nervous state, made a snap at the wire, and caught it in its teeth. It immediately fell to the floor dead. There was no mark of burning about the horse's mouth.

Local and Other Items

William Craig of Tryon, 16 years of age, while bathing, with two other young men, in Lord's mill pond, North Tryon, on Monday last, went beyond his depth and, unable to swim, was drowned before he could be rescued by his companions. The body was recovered about forty minutes after the occurrence; but despite medical efforts resuscitation was unavailable.

The schooner Maud, of Captain Amundsen, the Arctic explorer, has been found by the United States coastguard cutter Bear, and both vessels now are at Whalen, Siberia, the Treasury Department at Washington recently announced. A radio message from the Bear, sent out to find the Amundsen craft, which the explorer was forced to abandon, when it became frozen in the ice, stated that the cutter would tow the explorer's ship to Nome, Alaska, as soon as weather moderated. Amundsen and the crew recently reached Alaska. Whalen is a small Siberian village about 200 miles from Nome.

Paris is sweltering in unusually hot weather and a rush for the seaside resorts is on. The usual July 14 exodus from the city to make room for the influx from the provinces, which always characterizes the national holiday having been advanced by a few days. The thermometer on the 9th registered 95 degrees Fahrenheit, while at three o'clock next afternoon the mercury made a record climb, reaching 35 degrees centigrade, or 99 degrees Fahrenheit, the first time this mark has been struck in 42 years. There was little or no breeze and the percentage of humidity was high. Three cases of heat prostration were reported and one death from heat.

One of the longest intense heat spells in the history of Massachusetts culminated in Boston on last Saturday, in the heaviest electrical storms for over thirty years, and the greatest rainfall ever known since the Meteorological Bureau was established. The first storm was from two to six a. m., the second from eight to ten, and the third from seven to ten a. m. There were continuous flashes of appalling chain, bolt and sheet lightning, with constant terrifying crashes of thunder. The Weather Observatory states that a cool east wind came in from the sea, and meeting the hot and humid atmosphere caused a hitherto unheard of disturbance. The rainfall was nearly six inches, one inch descending in ten minutes.

Rules Relating to Private Bills.

36 All petitions for Private Bills must be presented within fourteen days after the commencement of the session exclusive of adjournment.

37 No Private Bill shall be brought into the House, but upon a petition first presented, truly stating the case at the peril of the petitioners for such Bill, and such petition must be signed by the said parties.

38 A committee shall be appointed at the commencement of every Session consisting of five members of whom three shall be a quorum, to be designated. The Private Bills Committee to whom shall be referred every Private Bill, and no proceedings after the first reading shall be had upon such Bill until such Committee has reported thereon to the House.

39 So soon as the Committee has reported any Bill, such Bill together with any amendments that may be suggested by the Committee, shall be printed at the expense of the parties who are sponsors for such Bill and printed copies thereof delivered to the members before the second reading if deemed necessary by the Committee.

40 No Bill for the particular interest of any person or persons, Corporation or Corporations or body or bodies of people shall be read a second time until all fees be paid for the same into the hands of the Clerk of the House.

41 No Bill having for its object the vesting in or conferring upon any person or persons, Municipality or Body corporate the title to any tract of land shall be received or read in the House unless at least four weeks notice containing a full description of the land in question has been published in the Royal Gazette and one other newspaper in this Province of the intention of such person or persons Municipality or body Corporate to apply for such Bill.
