LOCALS

The third annual Provincial School Trustees Association will meet in the Odd-fellows hall, Strathcona, on January 27 and 28. A food program is being prepared which will meet the requirements of both the city and rural trustees.

The double train service on the C. & E. Railway by Calgary will be continued throughout this winter. During the past two years one of the daily trains has been taken off in midwinter months, but the increase of traffic this year renders this reduction impossible.

At the last meeting of the Musicians Local No. 350, Vernon Barford, the retiring president, was presented with a year's gold in recognition of his services as president since the association was organized two years ago.

Attention is called to the fact that the meeting in Club Hall, Kinsistone ave., and Elizabeth street, will be held on Tuesday, January 12, for the purpose of meeting his constituents and to discuss legislation to be introduced at the coming session of the Alberta legislature.

WANTS MORE MEN.

It is probable that the new chief of police, A. C. Laney, will ask the city council in the near future for several more patrolmen. At the present time the outlying parts of the city are not sufficiently patrolled. It is probable that the new additions, if authorized, may consist of mounted men as the present mounted men are doing excellent work in the outlying sections.

REPORT BELIEVED UNTRUE.

Nothing further can be learned regarding the report that five Frenchmen were frozen to death west of the Pembina river during the present week and the story is not credited at the R.N.W.M.P. barracks, where the first official news would doubtless be received. Stoney Plain, where the news would likely first be heard, has no further information, and the report seems to be entirely without foundation.

TO COMMENCE SAVING AGAIN.

William Thompson, the young school teacher, who was robbed of all his savings consisting of \$250, while travelling from Kamsack to Edmonton on the C.N.R., en route to Calgary Normal school, has secured a position as school teacher in Lacombe. A number of those who have heard of his misfortune have interested themselves in his behalf and are doing what they can to help him. Despite his heavy loss young Thompson has managed to commence saving his money again in pursuit of his career at the Normal school. The young man is a native of Bridgeville, Picton county, Nova Scotia, not New Brunswick, as formerly stated. He came to the west about a year ago and commenced school teaching in Saskatchewan, where he has been since.

MADE A RECORD.

What looks very much like a record was established by the Militia Department in connection with the 101st Canadian Fusiliers of Edmonton, organized recently. The officers of the new regiment were not gassed until November 21st, and the general orders were not received here until early in December. A school of instruction was granted almost immediately to Ottawa asking for arms and equipment for the school. These were shipped on December 21st, and the school opened here on Thursday, January 7th. The school of instruction opened on January 8th and the school has made the same number of non-commissioned officers in attendance. Captain Mackie, D.S.O., has charge of the school and is assisted by two instructors from Winnipeg. The school will be continued for six weeks. Captain Mackie will be in charge of the school and it is likely that the cost of the equipment will be paid by the city, but the work will be done under government supervision.

BONDS STILL SELLING HIGH.

The latest quotation sheet received by the city commissioning this morning from Coates, Son & Co., London, England, shows that Edmonton bonds still retain the high place on the financial market that they registered the week before. For the week ending December 22nd, the highest sales were at 107 3/4 and the lowest at 107 1/4. No other western bonds sold on the market during the week. A gratifying feature is the statement that while "the American market has been unusually erratic" the Canadian market has been firm for government and municipal issues which have risen on the week's sales.

ADDITION TO CASTLE HOTEL.

Early in the spring work will be commenced on a \$100,000 addition to the Castle Hotel on Second street. Plans have been prepared for this large structure by Wright & Hooton. This large addition will be built on the south side of the present structure and will more than double the accommodation of the hotel. The addition will be four stories high and will be built of brick on a stone foundation. The interior arrangement will be similar to every part of the hotel and will make the Castle Hotel one of the largest and most modern hotels in Edmonton. According to the present plans of the owners the construction work on this addition will be commenced at the earliest possible moment in the spring.

POST OFFICE RETURNS.

The official report of the postmaster-general for the year 1908 has just arrived. It gives another record of the progress of this city and the progress of the province in general. The postal returns are perhaps the best indication of the progress of any district.

Suffering Slight.

"Is there any evidence of suffering in the city on account of scarcity of coal?" asked a Bulletin representative of a coal merchant.

"Well, I do not think there is much actual suffering, but many are inconvenienced," was the reply of one merchant. "I have managed to give all a little by dividing loads between several houses. One man may get 200 pounds, but that is enough to last him until the next round is made."

Only one case of suffering has come under my notice," said another merchant. "A feeble woman came in to the office yesterday with a small child, and she said that she had to buy coal for her child and her own self and two small children warm. She said the Presbyterian church was passing out one-half bushel of coal to last him until the next round is made."

HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT.

The report of the Medical Health Officer, Dr. Whiteley, for the month of December was handed to the city commissioners Thursday. It shows that the health of the city is good and that no infectious diseases are prevalent. The report is as follows:

I have passed the following work of this department for the month ending December 31st, 1908: Admitted Hospital, 16; Discharged, 16; Died, 16; Buried, 16; Vaccinated, 16; Inspected, 16; etc.

The local branch of the Brotherhood is sending out notices of the coming conference and is also endeavoring to advertise the Twin Cities of Edmonton and Strathcona. They have arranged a list of speakers including Archdeacon Lloyd, from Saskatchewan, well known for his energetic work in the scattered settlements of the northern part of this province."

COAL JUMPS TO \$5.50.

Coal, a week ago, \$3.50 per ton. Coal, on Friday, \$4 per ton. Coal, Saturday morning, \$5 per ton, with some as high as \$5.50. The thermometer and the price of coal are never at an antipathy. When the mercury takes a dip the coal takes a rise. Why? Because the cold weather drives the buyers to the coal dealer's door. The coal dealer's door is now being pelted by all sorts of vengeful and abusive householders fast enough and because they have raised the price. The conversation over the telephone between an irate housewife and the coal dealer would make a good one-act comedy on a vaudeville stage.

Irregular Operation.

Operations at the coal mines in the vicinity of the city have been seriously affected by the cold weather. The mine working at the mouth of the mine cannot work for more than 20 minutes or so without retiring to warm up. The engineers have to leave their posts to keep warm. The machinery runs heavily and the tracks leading from the entrance to the mine become coated with ice so that the removal of the coal is a slow process. The miners working at the surface and the consequences is that the output of the mines is greatly reduced and the disadvantages to which a consumer is called upon to pay.

Other Difficulties.

In addition to the difficulties of operation the miners have been disgraced. The Galician miners and assistants entered on the Christmas festivities last Wednesday and will not report for regular work until Wednesday next. It is also reported that several mines have closed down on account of the Workmen's Compensation act, which came into force on January 1st. The Dawson coal mine was said to be one of these and three loads of coal bearing the card "Dawson Coal Co." were seen being taken by the wagon along Jasper avenue this morning.

INTERESTED IN EDMONTON.

A glance over the mail received by the Edmonton board of trade each day will convince one of the great interest that the interest in the city of Edmonton and the surrounding district is widespread. This morning's mail brought in letters from people in Saskatchewan, Quebec, Michigan, Massachusetts, British Columbia and Missouri. Some were enquiring about the district with a view to locating here, while others wished to make investments in the city and district.

TO TEST PRODUCER PLANT.

Several experts in connection with the gas engine and the producer gas plant are expected in the city this evening or tomorrow, and it is expected that an official test will be made of the new plant this week. Considerable doubt has arisen as to whether the plant is doing the necessary amount of work, and it is expected that the representative of the producer gas plant manufacturers will bring with him a calorimeter testing apparatus to remove, if possible, any doubt of the efficiency of the plant.

CITY ELECTRICIAN'S REPORT.

The report of the city electrician for the month of December has just been completed. He shows that there were 120 applications representing 1,200 lamps for incandescent lamps for power service representing 106 applications for wiring permits representing 500 outlets and two motors.

In incandescent lighting during the month there were 119 services completed, 65 services disconnected, making a net increase of 54 services. There were four service connections and two services disconnected, an increase of two.

During the month five series are lamps were placed in position for street lighting as follows: One at the corner of Currie street and Jasper avenue; one at the corner of Jasper avenue east and Government street; one at the corner of Jasper avenue west and Government street; one at the corner of Jasper avenue east and Government street; one at the corner of Jasper avenue west and Government street.

THE CITY DAIRIES.

The city dairies appear to be gradually attaining a better sanitary condition as the result of the new milk by-law. The dairies which were inspected in the month of December were: A. McINNIS PROTEST DROPPED.

At a recent meeting of the executive committee of the wage earners' union it was decided to drop the protest against the election of Ald. McInnis. The grounds on which the protest was based were that he had intimidated voters at the polls and had entered the polling box with a voter. They stated that they had several witnesses to prove their case, including a deputy returning officer, three scrutineers and a number of voters. Two lawyers of the city had also offered to conduct the case free of charge.

Anxiety for Tibetan Missionaries.

Victoria, B.C., Jan. 10.-Rev. Mr. Jones, formerly a missionary in Tibet and now a resident here, has received word of a revolt of Tibetans against the Chinese on the Batang border. Among the missionaries in the affected district are Mr. and Mrs. Blair, of the China Inland Mission, and two Roman Catholic missionaries. Some anxiety is felt for them.

MORE ELEVATORS REQUIRED.

On Saturday evening George Bury, Winnipeg, general manager of the western division of the C.P.R., accompanied by a number of the divisional officials and his secretary, came up to Edmonton from the south by the afternoon train. His private car was immediately switched over to Edmonton by the E. Y. P. and he left again by the C.N.R. at 9:10 for Winnipeg. Mr. Bury stated that he was in reply to a question as to the alleged delay in shipping the grain from Alberta, he said that he wished to be pardoned for saying that the Canadian Pacific Railway appeared to be the only one which had sufficient empty box cars for the winter. He provided for the grain crop. He was sorry it had not moved faster, but the restriction placed on the loading of cars by legislation and the lack of elevator space, no doubt due to the lack of the government building elevators, was the cause. He pointed out that while at the present time the company had three thousand empty box cars, it was not available for grain traffic, even now the grain was not moving as fast as it should from Alberta. If there were more elevators in Alberta and a greater proportion of grain loaded
