Stick to It.

We believe the farmers have sized up Sir Edward Morris, and if they are insistent enough they will force Sir Edward Morris and his party to comply with their wishes and establish an Agricultural Experimental Farm under an expert, scientific and practical farmer. They should remember that Sir Edward Morris is a complainant subject to powerful influence.

"As the Hon. J. A. Robinson said some years ago, 'After all, the man who could vote for the contract of 1888, and then vote for that of 1901, could vote for anything.'"

His attitude as to a Model Farm is quite as wobbly.

In his speech in 1908 on the Resolutions to establish an Experimental Station and Agricultural School, Sir Edward Morris said:—

SIR E. P. MORRIS.—He thanked the hon. minister for the information, but it would have been more satisfactory to the committee if a detailed estimate of the disposition of the \$200,000 vote could be given. He would have liked to know the amount to be spent in erecting the contemplated school or college which, although rather a comprehensive term, is really what is needed, and what will have to be provided at some future date. He understood then it was the intention to import a scientific head for the station, but the minister did not say as to whether he was negotiating with an expert in the old country, or in Canada. It might be of interest to the committee if the minister would state which country. Personally he, Sir Edward, was in perfect sympathy with any movement which will improve our agricultural resources and develop them. A few years ago he had introduced resolutions which, if carried out, would have been somewhat similar to the effect of those at present before the chair. In the year 1889 the same policy was under discussion, and he had listened with interest this afternoon to the quotation from the

pen of Mr. Slattery, written to the Harbor Grace Standard of some years ago on this subject. He thought every one must be in favor of the establishment of a model farm, if carried out in the right way. In order to do this he thought the farm should be the outcome of a department for agriculture, solely and simply, and if so, it would prove successful. In Ottawa there is a central experimental farm under the direction of Prof. Robertson, who has done more to promote agriculture in Canada than probably all his predecessors put together, while every province has its own model farm, the one at Ottawa being the chief. These latter are not so extensive as the central one, but they aid in disseminating the knowledge gained at the larger station. He feared that in this case we were putting the cart before the horse, and he said this in no sense of hostility or criticism, but with a sincere hope of seeing the venture a success, as he did not care who or what government proposed a measure, if it were a good one he would support it heartily.

He thought the first step should be the inauguration of an agricultural department—not necessarily another department, but a new one, a department of agriculture. What he meant by a department of agriculture was to have a number of experts and practical farmers attached to the present agricultural department that would be competent to instruct and advise the country on every matter pertaining to agriculture.

Then for the sake of political expediency, he carried on a campaign against the movement, although he had committed himself to it in the House.

But he is capable of swinging back again, to his more rational sentiment. His Agricultural policy has been an absolute failure. It has earned the contempt of everybody, and now we have the St. John's Agricultural So-

ciety insistent on the establishment of agriculture on a scientific basis. The Society should be more and more insistent in their views and Sir Edward Morris will cave in before the General Elections. After that it will not matter, he and his party will be out and the Liberal Party after the Election will see that the waste and extravagance of the Agricultural policy are stopped and that the funds are spent in a way that will benefit farmers and the people instead of political heifers.

Prima Arrives.

The S. S. Prima entered port last midnight from Glasgow with a cargo of hard coal for A. J. Harvey & Co.
