### The Kite Safe.

It will be a great relief to everybody, and especially to the relatives of those aboard, to learn that the s.s. Kite was seen two miles off Paquet on Tuesday last. The information was received by the Marine and Fisheries Department this morning from Magistrate Dugan, of LaSalle. This news will abate completely the anxiety which was undoubtedly felt, especially when news came to hand that wreckage had been passed by the Bloodhound last week.

Mr. J. H. Roberts also this morning received a message from Magistrate Dugan, stating: "Paquet men say that the Kite passed there 2 miles off going south, on Tuesday, 14th." This confirms the report of Magistrate Dugan of the 7th inst., in which he stated that men reported seeing her going north.

Mr. Mann told us early in the week that he had full faith in the seaworthiness and staunchness of the Kite, and that he did not believe she had met with any serious mishap.

**JOHN FOXE** died 1567, aged 70. The English martyrologist, whose "Acts and Monuments" (Book of Martyrs) is one of the best known books in the language. Born at Boston in Lincolnshire, he later became a clergyman of the Anglican Church and died in London.

**BYRON** died 1824, aged 36. The poet who exercised the greatest influence upon European thought during the early part of the 19th century. His "Childe Harold's Pilgrimage" in 1812 at once placed him in the front ranks of poets and thereafter he continued to produce poems, most of which were marked by an intense Republican sentiment, yet full of passion and charm and beauty.

**BERNARD SHAW** died 1891, aged 77. Statesman and member of the House of Commons in 1848 and not long afterwards became a prominent and picturesque figure in that assembly. His date is observed in England as "Primrose Day," by Tories especially.

## WILLIAM FREW.

What the Marine Disaster Act Provides.

Mr. Watson, the Hon. Treasurer of the Marine Disaster Fund officially acknowledges the receipt of \$46,878.38. This shows the Fund is growing apace, and that the Executive Committee in charge and that the collectors on Water Street, and the Society and Union collectors are doing good work. The latter reported for some \$2600 last night, mostly in small sums, and they expect to bring that amount up to \$4000 before they close their good work.

There will be also a sum available under the provisions of the Marine Disasters Act of 1913.

The first section of that Act provides, "If any fisherman or seaman domiciled in the Colony shall lose his life, by accident through drowning or otherwise on the high seas or within the territorial waters of the Colony, there shall be paid to his family or representative, out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of the Colony, the sum of One hundred dollars, upon the fulfilment of the following conditions:—

(1) Proof of the cause of death
