**Counsel Saves** Belgium's Army.

> Paris, March 18 .- (By mail to New York)-King Albert of Belgium is singing the praises of Sir John French,

> the British commander-in-chief. In the darkest day of all the dark days of the Belgians military career, Gen. French gave the King of the Belgians a bit of advice-which, really, was rather in the form of an order-that saved the Belgian army.

It happened last November, when the Germans drove the Belgians back on the Yser-when the Belgians had fought with wild desperation, but finally gave way. Many of them were drowned in the river. The Belgian army was all but dispersed. Its remnants were scattered and many of the soldiers retreated as far south as Dunkirk. The King of the Belgians motored over to Gen. French's headquarters with the news. He tried to tell strap over instep and ornament the story of what the Germans had done to the Belgian army.

King Was Discouraged.

The King explained the battle as best he could, carefully answering the question of the British leader as to ed to have on the Germans. The King was discouraged. With his army broken up, it seemed to him that the Germans had only to continue their advance in order to take the last remaining inch of Belgian soil.

But Gen. French kept to the theme of what the Belgians had done to the Germans. At last he said:

"Your majesty, collect your army again and go back to the Yser. From what you have told me I am led to believe that the Germans have suffered so greatly that they will not be able to attack you again or try to continue their advance for at least two weeks."

The King did as Gen. French advised him. Within ten days he had collected his army and got them into trenches along the river. The Germans did not attack, as French had surmised. The British general, with his extraordinary knowledge of warfare, had measured the amount of fight the Germans would have remaining after the battle and his guess as to when they would regain their strength was exact, almost to the day, for it was not until twelve days had passed that the Germans made anoth-

er try at the Belgian lines. "That man is not a general," are the words which the King of the Belgians used later, speaking of Gen. French. "He is not a general, but a

# John M. De Robeck.

The startling combination found in the name of the present commander of the allied fleets at the Daradanelles is in no wise more startling than the position he occupies as contrasted with the career of his great grandfather, who came over to America under Rochambult to fight with the revolutionists against the British. For this he was given a pension by the American Government. He fell in love with a beautiful Irish girl at the end of the war, however, and immigrated to Ireland, where he married and became a naturalized British subject. Admiral de Robeck is a brother of the present Baron de Robeck. The title is Swedish. He entered the navy in 1875 and became Rear-Admiral in 1912, when a new nost was created for him that of admiral of patrols. His duty was to command four flotillas of destroyers of the home squadron. Recently. of the home squadron. Recently, Vice-Admiral Carden, who was in command of the fleets attacking the Dardanelles forts, was taken ill. GERMANS HAVE BEEN SHELLING VERDUN PORTS.

Paris, March 31.-After seven months of continuous effort the Germans have finally got near enough to Verdun to bombard the forts defending the city.

Fort Douaumont, five miles northeast of the city proper, has been violently shelled by heavy German howitzers, a dozen projectiles striking the

This was officially stated to-day by the War Office. Fort Douaumont is one of a group of six forts and redoubts north of the Conflans road, defending Verdun on the northeast.
