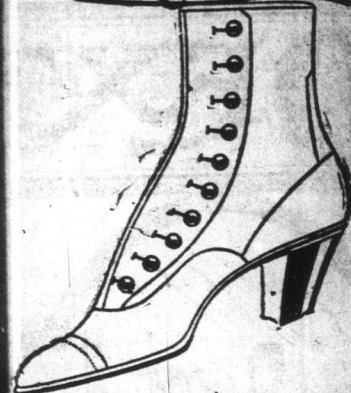

TelegramFROM THE SECRETARY OF STATE
FOR THE COLONIES.

To Governor, St. John's:
London, Sept. 14.—Considerable
misapprehension exists with regard
to the nature of the arrangement re-
cently concluded whereby the Prime
Ministers of the Dominions have been
given the right of direct communica-
tion with the Prime Minister of the
United Kingdom on certain matters,
and it therefore seems desirable to
state the exact nature of this arrange-
ment. After preliminary discussion
in the recent Imperial War Conference,
the subject was considered by the
Imperial War Cabinet, where on the
30th of July the following resolutions
were passed:

(1) The Prime Ministers of the Do-
minions, as members of the Imperial
War Cabinet, have the right of direct
communication with the Prime Minis-
ter of the United Kingdom and vice-
versa.

(2) Such communications should be
confined to questions of Cabinet im-
portance. The Prime Ministers them-
selves are the judges of such ques-
tions.

(3) Telegraphic communication be-
tween the Prime Ministers should as
a rule be conducted through the Col-
onial Office machinery, but this ex-
cludes the adoption of more direct
means of communication in exceptional
circumstances.

In order to secure continuity in
the work of the Imperial War Cabinet
and a permanent means of consulta-
tion during the war on the more im-
portant questions of common interest,
the Prime Minister of each Dominion
has the right to nominate a Cabinet
Minister either as a resident or vis-
itor in London to represent him at
meetings of the Imperial War Cabinet
to be held regularly between the plen-
ary sessions. It has recently been
stated in the overseas press that dis-
satisfaction with Colonial Office meth-
ods of administration was the chief
reason why this question was raised.
The discussion at the Imperial Con-
ference will shortly be published in
a Blue Book, and it will then be seen
that this statement is contrary to fact
and that the assumption that the at-
titude of the Dominions in this respect
was inspired by distrust of the Col-
onial Office was expressly repudiated
by the Dominion representatives as is
shown by the following extracts from
the speeches made:

Mr. Massey: "I am glad to hear
from both speakers (Mr. Hughes who
moved the resolution and Sir Robert
Borden who supported it) that no re-
solution is intended on the Colonial
Office as at present constituted. My
experience of the Colonial Office dur-
ing the time I have been Prime Min-
ister, and I am now in my seventh
year, is that they have done their
work well and thoroughly and enthu-
siastically, and I have always person-
ally met with the greatest courtesy
from the Colonial Office from each
and every one of the staff from Mr.
Long downwards. I do not wish to
go into particulars now."

Mr. Hughes: "I cordially agree
with that."

Mr. Burton: "As far as we are
concerned in South Africa, it is hard-
ly necessary for me to say that the re-
solution is not prompted by any sense
of dissatisfaction or of complaint
against the administration of the Col-
onial Office, whether under your au-
thority, Sir, or indeed that of any of
your predecessors. The days have
long gone by when any such com-
plaint could justly be made."

Mr. Cook (after a complimentary
reference to the assistance which the
Naval Board of Australia had obtain-
ed from the Colonial Office on a par-
ticular occasion): "And, therefore, I
think that the machinery, though per-
haps it could be improved up a little,
would still be necessary for dealing
with the detailed administration of
the other Dominions, while reserving
for the Prime Minister that other
class of correspondence on cases
which have to do with the policy of
the Empire generally."

Sir Joseph Ward said: "I want to
add my word of recognition which the
Colonial Office throughout, so far as
my experience is concerned, has done.
That not only applies to the present
Secretary of State for the Colonies,
but to his predecessors. I think from
the point of view of the work of the
Colonial Office, none of the overseas
countries have had any reason for
complaint at all. On the contrary, I
think they have had a great deal to
be satisfied with."

by him whilst temporary flight
commander.

THE ROSE OF LANCASTER.

"They Win or Die Who Wear the Rose
of Lancaster."

The following poem written by the
late Lieut. Leonard Comer Wall, son
of Mr. Charles Wall, "Hill Top," West
Kirby, a well-known Liverpool mer-
chant, who was killed in action in
June of last year, was published in the
"Daily Post" sixteen months ago. Its
patriotic fervour attracted considerable
notice at the time. Since then
the glorious deeds of the 55th Division
—West Lancashire Territorials— who
now wear the red rose as their divi-
sional sign—has given a prophetic
touch to the little poem. A metal disc
bearing the crest of the Division and
the words of the last line of the poem,
"They win or die, who wear the rose
of Lancaster," is to be placed on the
graves of those who have laid down
their lives in this war under the
badge of the Red Rose. We make
no apology for reproducing Lieut.
Wall's verses on the occasion of the
fourth anniversary of the war—

When Princes fought for England's
crown,
The House that won the most renown,
And trod the sullen Yorkists down,
Was Lancaster.

Her blood-red emblem, stricken sore,
Yet steeped her pallid foe in gore,
Still stands for England evermore,
Of Lancaster.

Now England's blood like water flows,
They win or die—who wear the Rose
of Lancaster.

Flanders, April, 1917. L. C. W.

Lieutenant Comer Wall was in his
21st year when on the 9th June last
year he made the supreme sacrifice in
France, where he had been serving for
two years. Fresh from his studies at
Clifton College, he obtained a commis-
sion in the West Lancashire Brigade
Royal Field Artillery in the early days
of the war, and discharged his duties
with valour, intelligence and marked
enthusiasm. The tragedy of his fall
on the field of battle was accentuated
by the fact that he was engaged to be
married to a Kent lady—Liverpool
Daily Post and Mercury, Aug. 5th, 1918.

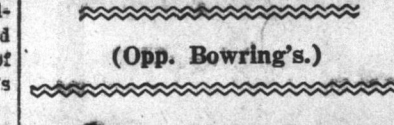
UNION DANCE SUCCESSFUL.—
