Bluenose in Lead.

ELSIE LED AT START BUT WAS OVERTAKEN ON THE FIRST LEG.

At 11.32 Elsie carried away her foretopmast. Bluenese at once hauled down his balloon.

S.S. TYRIAN, OFF RACE COURSE. Oct. 22 .- A twenty-five knot wind from the northwest greeted Elsie and Blueose when they put out from their docks this morning for the first race of the series to decide the champion of the North Atlantic fleets of the United States and Canada.

The schooners carried four lowers and maintopsails, as they cruised about back of the starting line awaiting the lifteen minute preparatory gun.

The signal flown from the breakwater on the starting line indicated that number three course had been chosen for the race. This meant a reach of six miles to the inner automatic buoy off Chebucto Head, a run down the wind of six miles to the southeast automatic, a reach of nine miles to Shut In Island bell, a dead beat of twelve miles to inner automatic with a possibility of further windward work on the race to the finish line, six miles away. The fifen minute preparatory gun found both boats reaching for-line of port tack close under western shore.

The five minute gun found Bluenose by the wind in the centre of the harbor, quarter mile from the starting line, with Elsie under her lee and a little nearer the line. A minute later Elsie came up in the wind and hung on stays. Bluenose tore away for line. With three minutes to go Elsie was still in the lead and Bluenose was rounding up for the weather berth. Two minutes for the gun found both essels close to the western shore. Elsie had a wrapper full, while Bluenose was in stays.

One minute before the Bluenose holsted fib topsail. Elsie was right on the line and bore broad off. Bluenose was reaching fast for the line. When the gun flashed Elsie was first o cross the line with Bluenose to weather and a length or so behind. Official starting times were: Elsie: 9.00.10. Bluenose: 9.00.48, At 9.08 Elsie still in lead, went to weather of Bluenose. Elsie was flying American ensign from main peak, Elsie in Lead.

stavsails. At 10.30 the Bluenose had increased her lead shortly, and the wind had moderated to about 20 knots.


As the schooner's reached for the third mark the Bluenose seemed to be
