all history seems to bear out the principle that, in the matter of reformation, the certainty of punishment is of far more avail than its severity. then, the more the substituted, in all its aspects, the

more seriously are we inclined to doubt the collective and determinate theory of severe punishment except in extreme cases, and the more certainly and irresistibly are we drawn to the conclusion that the only rational hope of criminal therapeutics lies in the individualization of punishment, wherein and whereby the crude and exploded theories of retaliation, intimidation and expiation give way to the more advanced ideas of reformation and education.

ANOTHER PLEA FOR THE JUVENILE OFFENDER.

Before bringing this Easter article to a close I want to put in another plea for what one of our city clergymen terms "the rising generation of undesirable offenders." Surely some other place than the Penitentiary could be found for them if we expect to reduce the criminal class of the community to a minimum. Last year 35 juveniles from 10 to 16 years of age were committed to prison here, and as many more released on suspended sentence by my genial and sympathetic friend Judge Morris of the Central District Court. Ignorance and indolence are the chief causes of juvenile, as well as adult, depravity. The total number of commitments to the Penitentiary last year amounted to 233, and of these, 35 could neither read nor write. What a commentary on our present educational system! Then, there are the evils of procrastination and shirking—through these the boy first learns to steal, for indolence itself is fundamentally dishonest. It is the very "sap-root" of crime. The boy who habitually steals time from his employer is in a fair way to steal something of more tangible value. He covets that which he does not earn. He does not recognize

his obligation to give to his work the best that is in him. In short, he has not learned to work. He is not interested in the task before him. His mind is elsewhere—in dreams, perhaps—but, beyond the dream, there lies the shadow of the iron bar.

THE ADULT "IDLER IN THE MAKING."

Of course, "just as the twig is bent the tree is inclined." As the Biblical sage observes: "Train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it." The child-idler is simply the adult-idler in the making, and, in about seventy-five per cent. of the cases, the adult idler is the criminal. It by no means follows that in teaching the child to work, his powers should be taxed beyond their capacity. To do so would be inhuman in the extreme, and as unnecessary as inhuman. The labor of the child should never proceed beyond the limits of healthful exertion, and that, too, within surroundings safely guarded with respect to morality and sanitation.

THE MOTHER'S INFLUENCE AND OBLIGATIONS.

Then there is the part the mother has to act in connection with juvenile training; but this is a prolific subject, and I must leave it for a subsequent article. Suffice it to say here that the history of the human race is twined, like a garland, around the heartstones of humanity. A man may pride himself upon a son whose good traits bespeak a great and good career; but it is now a fairly accepted law of heredity, established by the researchers of modern science, that, in most cases of normal heredity, the male offspring borrows its traits from the female parent and not from the

father. Unfortunately we know too little of the great mothers of the world. Like the violet, they bloom in secret places; and as the whorls of the shrinking flower is often disclosed only by the fragrance it exhales upon the passing breeze, so do we often discover these modest women only by the perfume of those good works which have gone forth from a secluded home, to scatter sweetness and light along the ways of life and breathe a benediction to the world. One such there was in Nazareth!

JENSEN CAMP

An Industrial Home For Girls.

HAVING been invited by the Editor of the Evening Telegram to contribute a short article for the Easter Eve issue of the Telegram on "How Easter is observed and spent at Jensen Camp," it seems an opportunity to give a little history of the work going on there at the present time. No Easter has as yet been observed at the Camp by the present occupants, as it was not opened as an Industrial Home for Girls until during Easter Week of last year. At that time, two young girls, homeless and untrained for any useful work, were about to be released from the Penitentiary. A group of women representing various denominations, interested in the unprotected girls of Newfoundland, were offered the use of the Staff house in connection with Jensen Camp, to meet the emergency, and gratefully accepted the kind offer, immediately forming the association and commencing work with the two young girls as inmates under the care of a Matron. By the 1st of September seven girls were in the Home, and the number has varied, only five being there at the present time. As the burden of financing the undertaking became too great for the small association of women to bear alone, the Executive was enlarged in December last by the addition of five men, whose assistance and advice have been of much value. During the year, the public has been solicited for subscriptions with more or less success, and small sales, teas, et cetera have been held at various times. On Wednesday afternoon next, the 19th inst, a sale and tea will be held in the Empire Hall for the benefit of the work.

The girls are being instructed in elementary branches of school work, also in sewing, cooking, and general housework, and in course of time it is hoped that it will develop into a real Industrial Home, as its name implies. Time and an infinite amount of patience will be required to accomplish the results hoped for. The 1st and 3rd Fridays of each month are visiting days at the Home, and anyone going out there on the afternoons of those days will be cordially welcomed. The girls are eagerly looking forward to Easter Sunday, as the Matron has arranged that each one may be able to attend at her own church. As the Home is situated about three miles from the city, it will mean a six mile walk, and after their return they will partake of a special Easter dinner which has been provided through the generosity of friends. The Matron has planned a devotional hour for the evening, when a short talk and readings will be given, and hymns will be sung. During the Christmas season, a treat was given by the association to the inmates of the Home, in the shape of a Christmas Tree and Supper, and on Valentine Day, the Matron arranged a little party for them, some of the neighbours kindly coming in to help her, one of them bringing his violin, which was greatly enjoyed by all the company. There is both hopefulness and discouragement in this work we have undertaken; but if these girls, some of whom never had a chance to go right, can be kept from the temptations which beset them on every side when allowed to wander on the streets, until some character has been developed, it seems as though the work will not have been in vain.—C. C. B.
