## Agreement Reached on Irish Negotiations

France Financially Protects Austria—Germany Will Meet Monthly Obligations—Naval Men Search German Steamer—Newfoundlander Awarded Radio Certificate.

### THE IRISH CONFERENCES.

LONDON, June 14.

Optimism increases regarding the outcome of Irish negotiations and it is suggested the conferences may finish the work to-day.

### AGREEMENT ON ALL POINTS.

LONDON, June 14.

The Central News says it learned authoritatively that to-day's Irish negotiations resulted in an agreement virtually on all points.

### FRANCE AIDS AUSTRIA.

PARIS, June 14.

The Senate yesterday voted an advance of fifty-five million francs to Austria in order to keep her from falling into the hands of Germany.

### AIDING AUSTRIA.

PARIS, June 14.

The Allied Council of Ambassadors decided to-day to request the few remaining governments, creditors of Austria, who have not yet renounced their claims against her to do so for a period of twenty years. The desire is to permit the application of the credit system which has been elaborated for the industrial restoration of the dual monarchy.

### A VITAL MATTER.

LONDON, June 14.

A Times despatch from Dublin says that difficulties have arisen regarding the allotment of portfolios in the Free State Cabinet. De Valera insisting on having the Ministry of Defence and Arthur Griffith strenuously objecting to De Valera being placed in control of the Army.

### TRUE BILL AGAINST MACAROW.

MONTREAL, June 14.

The Grand Jury which considered the case of D.C. Macarow, General Manager of the Merchants Bank, this afternoon brought in a true bill on the charge of perjury, claiming that he willfully signed the false statement of the Bank's condition made to the Dominion Government for October 1921. This will be Mr. Macarow's second appearance before a Judge on the charge. He was previously acquitted by Judge Curson in the police Court. He is at present out on \$10,000 bail.

### FOR ORGANIZATION.

CINCINNATI, June 14.

Delegates to the American Federation of Labor introduced a resolution to-day for the amalgamation of existing unions by industries into organizations.

### ASCOT WINNER.

### POLICY REMAINS UNCHANGED.

TOKIO, June 14.

Change in the Japanese Cabinet will not alter the nation's policy to give effect to agreements reached at the Washington Conference says the Foreign Minister.

### A D'ANNUNZIO ECHO.

FUJME, June 14.

Owing to unemployment the former Legionaries of D'Annunzio have occupied the railroad station here.

### U. S. S. SUBSIDY BILL.

CINCINNATI, June 14.

The Ship Subsidy Bill now pending in Congress was condemned as a measure of patronage for political purposes by a resolution unanimously adopted yesterday by the American Federation of Labor.

### GERMAN STEAMER SEARCHED.

BELFAST, June 14.

Sinn Féiners attacked Killeagh Castle, County Down, during the night, but were driven off by the special Ulster Constabulary. Incendiary fires were numerous here, the places burned including two picture theatres, restaurant, brewery, a block of business offices and engineering works. Blue-jackets were to-day discharging the cargo of the German steamer Stella Maria, stopped yesterday by a British man of war, but the result of the search was kept secret.

### NEWFOUNDLANDER GRANTED RADIO CERTIFICATE.

OTTAWA, June 14.

C. E. Williams, St. John's Nfld., was among 44 men granted certificates of proficiency in radio telegraphy by the Department of Naval Service during May.

### MAPLEDAWN'S CAPTAIN REPRIMANDED.

MADEIRA, June 14.

In the case of the stranding of the steamer Mapledawn near Isle Aux

Vaches, St. Lawrence River, April 24, the Dominion Wreck Commissioner L. A. Demers, has fined Pilot Georges Arcand \$10.00 and reprimanded Capt. J. P. Dufour.

THE GERMAN GOVERNMENT, notified the Reparations Commission to-day that it would pay the regular monthly installment of fifty million gold marks due tomorrow.

### UNEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS.

LONDON, June 14.

Unemployment benefits paid since November, 1920, total eighty-five million pounds and provision has been made for fifty million between now and July 1922.

### TO CLOSE MINES.

TERRE HAUTE, June 14.

A crowd of four hundred persons were here to-day in automobiles announcing their intention of closing all mines in the district of Indiana.

### Yesterday's Outbursts.

FIREMEN RECEIVE TWO CALLS.

A piece of smouldering rag, thrown carelessly in a cupboard was responsible for calling out the Central and West End Fire Companies yesterday forenoon. Shortly after 11 a.m. an alarm of fire brought the firemen to the residence of Mr. Crummeys, Hamilton Street. On arrival at the scene an investigation discovered a piece of burning rag which had been used in cleaning a stove, and which had been thrown in a cupboard. After the cause of the trouble was removed the fire was extinguished.

At 8 o'clock last evening the Central and East End Fire Companies were called to Bannerman Street where a slight fire was discovered at the residence of Mr. John White. Sparks from a chimney igniting the roof caused the blaze. Very little damage was done.

### Runaway Horse.

WAGGON CONSIDERABLY DAMAGED.

Two young men and two ladies had a nasty spill near Bowring Park yesterday afternoon, when a horse owned by Mr. Dowden, truckman, took fright. The party were driving in a dog cart and when coming out of the Park the horse took fright and dashed along the road. The spring of the vehicle broke and the occupants of the carriage were thrown to the ground, but fortunately they were not injured. The horse was stopped near Dr. Parson's residence by the mounted police. Besides having a broken spring the wagon was otherwise considerably damaged.

### BAIT PLENTIFUL.

Herring in abundance struck at Topsail yesterday, but very few were taken, as at present there is no market for the fish except a little for bait. Caplin are still very plentiful at Holyrood and residents are hauling them for manure.
