Early Election Returns Show Conservatives Leading.

Early Voting a Feature of the Poll—Anglo-French Accord May be Reached at Lausanne—Britain Pays U.S.A. Millions.

THE RESULTS TO 4 O'CLOCK.

LONDON, Nov. 15.

Conservative 147, Georgians 19, Liberals 28, Labor 89, Independents 6.

LONDON, Nov. 15.—The first sixteen contested constituencies to report showed five gains for Labor from English Boroughs, mostly taken from Conservatives.

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LONDON, Nov. 15.—Viscountess Asquith has been re-elected for Sutton Division of Plymouth.

LONDON, Nov. 16.—The following was the state of the parties at 1:30 this morning, counting acclamations: Conservatives, 130; Georgians, 18; Liberals, 20; Labor, 48; Independents, 4.

LONDON, Nov. 16.—Andrew Bonar Law, Prime Minister, was elected for Central Division of Glasgow. The following was the standing at 2:30

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LONDON, Nov. 15.—Former Premier Asquith, leader of the Liberal party, has been re-elected for Paisley, Dornoch and Ross, the novelist's son and a Labor candidate, has been defeated in Reading. Ben Tillett, Laborite, retained his seat in North Division of Salford by a narrow margin.

LONDON, Nov. 15.—The Canadian member for Brantford Division of Middlesex, Col. Grant McRyn, the organizer of the British Empire Steel Corporation, defeated Mrs. Oliver Strachey, Independent, by 10,150 to 7,804. She was one of the women who had high hopes for election.

LONDON, Nov. 16.—The standing of all parties at 3 o'clock was: Conservatives 154, Labor 65, Liberals 25, Georgians 20, others 8.

NO DIFFICULTY IN REACHING ACCORD.

PARIS, Nov. 15.

Premier Poincare, without replying in detail to the memorandum from Lord Curzon, has sent word to London that he saw nothing to prevent England and France reaching accord on the attitude their delegates should take at Lausanne. Lord Curzon, therefore, is expected to come to Paris on Saturday and both go to Lausanne and discuss conference matters with the Italian representatives.

BRITAIN MEETING HER OBLIGATIONS.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.

The receipt of fifty million six hundred and ten thousand dollars for account of United States Government, was reported today to the Treasury by the Federal Reserve Bank of New York. The fifty million represents interest on the war debt of Great Britain to the United States and the six hundred and ten thousand, interest on the debt representing the sale of silver to Great Britain during the war which is still in progress of liquidation, there being sixty-one million of this account still outstanding.

CARDINAL SUGGESTS RELEASE WOMEN PRISONERS.

DUBLIN, Nov. 16.

Cardinal Logue, Primate of Ireland, suggests the release of Miss Mary MacSwiney from Mount Joy Prison where she has been on a hunger strike for eleven days. The suggestion is conveyed in a telegram to Kevin O'Higgins, Free State Minister of Home Affairs. The telegram said that more harm would be caused by delaying the release of woman prisoners in Ireland than by liberating them.

TURKS WILL CARRY OUT ARMISTICE TERMS.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 15.

The Turkish Nationalist Government has given formal assurance to the Allies that the stipulations of the Mudania Conference agreement will be respected.

GRADUATES AS NURSE.

MONTREAL, Nov. 15.

Miss Elsie M. Brain, of Grand Falls, Newfoundland, was one of the graduating class of nurses at Western Hospital here.

MEXICAN BANK FAILS.

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 15.

The Banque Francaise De Mexico, the largest French bank in Mexico, failed to open its doors this morning.

ANOTHER EARTHQUAKE.

SANTIAGO, Chile, Nov. 15.

Cogumbo reported a strong earthquake and tidal wave early this morning. No damage or casualties are reported.

BRITISH STEAMER IN TROUBLE.

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.

The British steamer West Hamatic, Hamburg to New Orleans, after being several days with boiler trouble in mid-Atlantic, has been taken in tow by the steamer Saucannon, and will probably be towed to New York or New Orleans.

CALGARY M. P. DIES.

CALGARY, Nov. 15.

R. C. (Bob) Edwards, Independent Member of the Alberta Legislature for Calgary, and editor of the Calgary Eye-Opener, died last night, aged 58. He had been prostrated many months by heart trouble following an attack of influenza contracted while attending the spring session of the Legislature. He is survived by his widow.

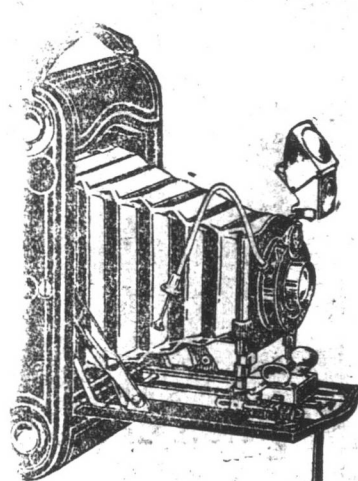
LENINE EXPLAINS.

MOSCOW, Nov. 15.

Premier Lenin, addressing delegates to the Communist International yesterday, explained just why Russia, the head and front of the revolutionary system, has rejected Communist principles and returned to capitalism. "We went too far," he said, "and we found that the peasants and small bourgeoisie, that form the vast numerical majority of our country were against us. To retain our power we had to satisfy them." On world revolution, or a world Communist policy, he said nothing, nor did he touch international politics. He hinted to show his hearers, first, why Russia exchanged pure Communist for State Capitalism, and second, why the change was justified with the results and beyond doubt succeeded.

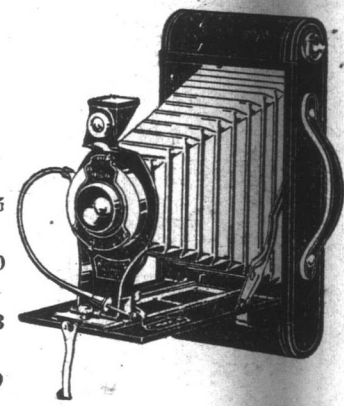

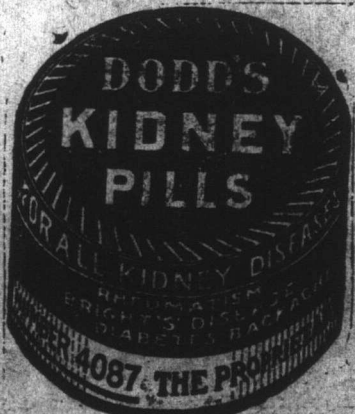
