Correspondence

Between GOVERNMENT AND UNITED FISHERMEN.

Sir— I beg to inform you that the resolution dealing with a bounty on cod and the price of labor, submitted by you as a chairman of the delegation which interviewed the Hon. the Minister of Fisheries yesterday, have given the most serious consideration.

The desire expressed in the said resolution, that the Government should grant to those engaged in the present year's fishery operations a bounty sufficient to keep them from being a charge on the Colony during the coming winter, as well as being a means of encouragement for them to remain in the industry.

Also that the Government shall fix a minimum rate of wages for laboring work in Newfoundland sufficient to permit those so engaged to maintain themselves and their families.

CAPT. WINSON'S REPLY.

Sir— I have acknowledged yours of the 1st inst.

In reply I am asked to say that we are very disappointed at the attitude of the Government, particularly with reference to our demand for a bounty on fish. Whilst agreeing that this is a matter of "outstanding economic and financial importance," we have to respectfully submit that matters of equal importance in these sections have been dealt with by the Executive Government without the opening of the Legislature.

We are of the opinion that a decision on this matter should be reached by the Government in sufficient time to enable those who ordinarily engage in the fishery to decide whether they will continue at the work, judging by the history of the past few years the opening of the session will be too late for our request.

Queer Finds in Fish

That Swallowtail a Love- Letter. An old wedding ring has been found inside a scallop dredged up off Weymouth. How it got there is beyond guessing, but there it was, badly discolored, with no mark or sign to show whose finger it had ever adorned.

There is scarcely a fisherman who cannot tell of some strange find made while cleaning his catch. A worthless sculpin caught a codling two and a half miles in weight, and found inside it a ring in which was set an extremely good diamond.

Two are greedy, and will swallow anything bright. A woman living at Paradise, in Berwickshire, bought one of these fish from an Eyemouth dealer and discovered inside it a small enamel brooch with lettering and a number. She advertised it, and it was found to belong to an Edinburgh woman whose daughter had lost it at sea, in Pile.

A Taste for Sovereigns. Whenever a shark is caught it is always open to see what is inside. A shark caught in March, 1922, off the coast of Mauritius had inside it a gold coin, a goat, and a regular museum of bones.

Another small shark taken on the North American coast was found to contain a hand-bag in which were four British sovereigns, six shillings, four United States dollars, a diamond ring, and a love-letter.

The most amazing of all such finds was made in October, 1915. It was believed that Germans in the United States had chartered vessels to supply the German submarines, but it was some time before proof could be obtained.

Then some Brazilians caught a shark off Pernambuco and opening it, found inside a bag containing the papers of a steamer named Maria Quaresima, which had sailed from the American port of Newport News. These papers proved beyond doubt that this vessel had been chartered for the purpose of supplying German submarines.

Our Dumb Animals.

REPORT OF THE CHIEF AGENT FOR WEEK ENDING OCT. 26th.

I attended to the landing of 23 head of cattle from the Sable L., and all the beasts were in excellent condition. Also I saw to the landing of 83 head cattle which came in during the week by train. Everything was handled in a very satisfactory way. I attended to the shipping of a horse which was going to Bermuda, and called to humbly put to death two dogs; one on Forest Road, a very valuable setter, had received a serious injury about the shoulder, another one for a resident of Mundy Pond Road who paid a yearly subscription to the Society. I have also received several complaints from different people about lame horses being driven on Water Street. Some have a shell-bone, others have splints and others have spavins, for which there does not seem to be a remedy. One will find a horse limp on Water St. which will not limp on Duckworth St. Many of these horses are owned by big firms and are in the hands of Veterinary Surgeons, but some 5 or 6 horses are not laid aside. I would now like to call the attention of shippers of cattle to the Act which says that after Oct. 31st to May 1st, inclusive no animal shall be carried on the deck of any ship or vessel, out of this colony. Persons not complying with this rule are liable to a fine of fifty dollars for every animal so carried. All owners of horses are requested to keep them in a stable at night time. Many cow owners have already started keeping cows stabled at night as the weather is cold and pasture exhausted. As the water trough has been removed from the Beach it will be necessary to have it erected again on Water Street, at the foot of the hill. Water for working horses is badly needed in this vicinity on account of all the trucking from steamers at the East End wharves. Will the City Councilors kindly see that this is carried out and receive the thanks of horse owners and the silent appreciation of the animals.

Cats Should be Kept in the House at Night.

They not only need shelter, but they should not be allowed to annoy the neighbors.

In the country, at the time when birds are rearing their young it is especially important to keep cats in at night, as it is in the early morning hours that the birds are caught by them. Some watchfulness is needed in the day, also, at this time, if we would preserve the lives of our useful friends, the birds.

To prevent too much increase it is well to have all but one of the kittens of every litter put to death humanely before their eyes are open. Complete immersion in warm, not hot water for a half hour will end their lives without suffering. Place a weight in bag with kittens. Grown persons, not children, should do this.

Kindness to animals is capital, well invested and pays the farmer, in dollars and cents. If possible always have the same person milk a cow, and let it be one who is naturally kind and who inspires the cow with confidence, so that if she moves or jumps the milker to any inconvenience she will not expect punishment. It is better to feed before milking, than the cow will stand quietly and give her whole attention to the operation.

Horses and cows will enjoy better health and do better work if they are well groomed every day.

To run a cow to pasture is cruel. The milk of a frightened or abused cow is poisonous.

Discourage the use of blinders as they cause much suffering to animals forced to wear them. Weakness of vision and blindness are often caused by the use of blinders. Ornaments on the head-harness near the eyes are also harmful.

Observe "Be Kind to Animals Week," April 9-14, and "Bugsday," April 15.
