The war disturbed the even tenor of our lives, the cessation of hostilities came suddenly and unexpectedly, and threw the business world into a state of confusion, and even after a period of five years, we have far from adapted ourselves to the new conditions.

Millions of men drawn from every walk in life were returned to civil occupations only to find that their former posts had been filled by women, or that the trade at which they worked was unable to absorb them.

Others, who had been happy living a sedentary life previous to enlistment, discovered that work of this nature no longer attracted them. They had developed physically, and they felt no desire to return to the confines of an office or a shop.

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For a time indecision marked their efforts, but gradually some semblance of order was restored and attempts made to find suitable work for as many as possible.

Unfortunately there were those who were only too ready and willing to avail of the opportunity which offered to commit irregularities or violate the laws.

ties are faced with a further grave problem now, which, unless dealt with promptly and decisively, may have serious results.

This lawlessness is due in a great measure to the unprecedented conditions which exist. It is due also to the disinclination of the authorities to take vigorous measures in the first place from fear of causing more serious trouble.

LONDON, Nov. 28. H. J. Thomas the Railway Labor Leader and Parliamentary candidate speaking at Barrow last night, said that those who called the members of the Labor Party little Englanders and declared the Labor Party did not believe in the Empire were deliberate liars.

CHURCHILL AFTER MACDONALD'S SCALP.

LONDON, Nov. 28. Winston Churchill speaking at Leicester to-day said, "whether we get Baldwin off the front bench I do not know, but I am certain we will get MacDonald off the front Opposition bench."

BOLSHEVISM BEARS ITS HEAD.

LONDON, Nov. 28. The labor elements with a banner inscribed "Hail, Bolshevik Russia," continuously interrupted the speech of the Liberal leader, H. H. Asquith in his home riding of Paisley to-night.

EH, WHAT'S THIS!

NEW YORK, Nov. 28. Sir Richard Squires, the former Premier of Newfoundland was a passenger to-day on the Majestic, returning from London where he represented the Nfd. Government at the Imperial Conference.

203 THREE CORNERED CONTESTS.

LONDON, Nov. 28. Analysis shows that the straight fight in the electorate contests are distributed as follows: Conservatives vs. Liberals 128; Conservatives vs. Labor 108; Liberals vs. Labor 82. There are 203 three cornered contests in any one of which a member may be elected on a minority vote, since there is no provision in British elections for proportional representation or second preference votes.

BRITAIN HAS NOT SURRENDERED HER RIGHTS ON THE SEAS.

LONDON, Nov. 28. The British Government has requested of its Charge d'Affaires at Washington a full report on the circumstances surrounding the seizure of the British schooner Tomako off the New Jersey Coast by the United States officials and the seizure of the British schooner Island Home, off the Texas Coast.

NO DECISION YET AS TO THE CHANCELLORSHIP.

BERLIN, Ger., Nov. 28. Germany was still without a Chancellor or an effective Government at a late hour to-night and the five bourgeois parties who were supposed to constitute the new coalition bloc were far from an accord which would give them a united front in Reichstag.

PREMIER'S SON AT VARIANCE WITH FATHER'S POLICE.

LONDON, Nov. 28. Ignoring final stipules, Premier Baldwin's eldest son, Oliver Baldwin, who professes Socialist views, made his first platform appearance in Buckingham last night in support of the Labor candidates, and denounced his father's Government, asserting that it had been in office a year and had done nothing but twiddle its fingers.

REPRESENTATIVE OF NFD. HON. OUBRED BY PRINCE OF WALES.

LONDON, Nov. 28. The Prince of Wales yesterday received Premier Warren of Newfoundland.

GIGANTIC SWINDLING.

NEW YORK, Nov. 28. Foreigners in the last few years have been swindled out of approximately twelve million dollars by a ring of real estate sharks selling undeveloped marsh lands within a fifty mile radius of New York.

BELGIUM ANXIOUS TO EVACUATE THE RUHR.

BRUSSELS, Nov. 28. The Belgian government it is learned in official quarters soon will raise in friendly conversation with France the question of the partial withdrawal of the forces in the Ruhr now that active and passive resistance is considered ended.
