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A Meeting of the Cabinet Called.

Washington, Oct. 7.

With a view of easing the money mar
ket, Acting Secretary Richardson has di
rected the Assistant Treasurer at New
York to buy five millions bonds and sell
five millions of gold on Monday, 7th inst.
subject to the usual conditions of month
ly purchases of bonds and sale of gold.

San Francisco, Oct. 6.

The steamer *Idaho* has arrived from
Honolulu, and brings news up to 25th ult.
The great crater of Mauna Loa in the
Island of Hawaii is again in eruption. At
a distance of 75 miles the sight is magnifi
cent. There is no flow of lava yet.

Chicago, Oct. 6.

In a number of churches to-day the
discourse were based upon the terrible ca
lamity which befel the community a year
ago, and the progress made in the resto
ration of the burned city.

The workmen are busy day and night

upon the Chamber of Commerce, a num
ber of banks and similar buildings, in or
der to have them ready for occupation
and formal opening of the 9th inst., the
anniversary of the fire.

London, Oct. 5.

One Collins, absconding with \$20,000
stolen money, took passage on the steam
er which left Southampton for Baltimore
on Monday last. The police authorities
have been notified to arrest the culprit
on his arrival at Baltimore.

Gladstone has called a meeting of

the cabinet for Wednesday next to transact
important business, the nature of which
is not reported.

Local and Other Items.

Lord Dufferin on his way to London
will receive an address at Woodstock.

Dr. Smith reports about six hundred
horses in Toronto affected with a new
disease, which, as yet, has not proved
very fatal.

The Town of Durham is going to offer
\$20,000 to the Clifford extension; Nor
manby proposes to give \$25,000 to each
Company, and have a junction at Ayton.

On Wednesday last Dr. Baird of Paisley,
had his left hand severely injured by the
bursting of his gun. Part of the thumb
was torn off, and the bones of the fingers
laid bare.

Dr. F. H. Wright, who was a member of
the graduating class of the Toronto Uni
versity last spring, has been appointed
resident physician of Victoria Park
Hospital, London, England.

The Godrich Signal announces the
death of Chas. Wilder, Esq., Commis
sioner of Inland Revenue and Crown
Land Agent. He was one of the oldest
residents of Godrich.

At the late Rifle competition between
the five companies of the Waterloo Bat
talion at Galt, the Hespeler company
through Sergt. Evans carried off the
Battalion prize and one of the members
of that company won the medal.

STRIKE IN CHICAGO.—Four thousand
bricklayers went out on strike in Chicago
on Friday, for eight hours a day. The
carpenters' strike continues, with no
prospect of settlement. The city is quiet
notwithstanding the large numbers of
unemployed persons on the street.

The demand for domestic servants is
increasing every day, and the supply
seems to be decreasing proportionately.

In some localities in the upper Ottawa
country girls are offered \$20 per month
(says an Ottawa paper), and very few can
be had even at that rate. The trouble
appears to be that they get married al
most as soon as they go there.

The Berlin Telegraph says that an
elderly woman named Grant, wife of Mr
James Grant, blacksmith, at Winter
bourne, dropped dead on the street in
that village on Sunday last. She was ad
dicted to the excessive use of ardent
spirits, and had been on a continuous
 spree for the previous six weeks, from the
effects of which she had been so ill on the
day previous to her death as to require
the attendance of Dr. Pasmore.

THE GALT REFORMER.—In the hurry
of Exhibition business last week, we
forgot to refer to the valedictory of
Mr. John Allan, of the Galt Reformer,
who has been connected with that
paper for the past nineteen years, and
for the last nine years was proprietor
and editor. During that time he has
conducted the Reformer with an ability
and judgement which often drew
from his conferees a well deserved
meed of praise. Our own intercourse
with him has been of the closest and
most friendly character, and we now
regret that falling eye-sight has caused
him to sever his connection with the
Press. We sincerely trust that rest
has been connected with the Press in
and a change of occupation will re
store his failing vision, and that we
may yet, at some future day, welcome
his return to our ranks. Mr. Hutch
inson succeeds Mr. Allan as editor
and proprietor of the Reformer. He
