

The race between Mr. Diraell and Lord Salisbury has been broken. Through members of the same cabinet, Lord Salisbury tried to defeat an amendment which Mr. Diraell favoured, and the latter, referring to his colleague, denounced him to the House as "a master of fibes, flouts, and sneers" and accused him of laying a "trap" for the rejection in the Lords, of a bill which had the Premier for its advocate in the Commons. It might have been thought that after so conspicuous a snubbing administered by Mr. Diraell, Lord Salisbury would have hastened to resign. But instead of this he merely hastened to deny the accuracy of the report that he had called the House of Commons "a blistering majority." That was "a pure fabrication," which is the reverse of complimentary to the reporters.
