A Far-Reaching Trail of Death and Destruction.

The Funnel-Shaped Tornado Desolates Scores of Homes.

from Forty to Fifty Persons Killed in Southern Minnesota. Further Details of the Ruin Caused by

Tuesday's Tornado in Quebec,

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., June 16.—A special from Mankato, says: One of the worst disasters that ever visited Southern Minnesota occurred between 5 and 6 o'clock last evening. The terrible funnel-shaped tornado again swept over the land and laid waste scores of happy homes and sent 40 or 50 souls into eternity. The extent of country devastated was greater than ever before known of the history of the State. It started near Jackson in Southern Minnesota. SIXTEEN KILLED.

It struck the district school house Shelburne, in which were the teacher and eighteen children. The building was de-molished and the teacher and fifteen scholars were killed.

At Linden many houses were torn from their foundations. One family of three families was killed and others were injured.

SEVERAL FATALITIES IN QUEBEC.

ST. ROSE, Que., June 16.—Further intelligence of Tuesday's great cyclone shows the destruction and loss of life was not confined to its place, but spread to many places in the vicinity. Ste. Ephriam sufficed severely. In that part of the parish annexed to St. Nazaire a poor man named A. Houle lost everything. His babe, 3 months old, was killed in its mother's arms, while the poor woman herself and three other children of Alphonas Miquiette, who were in the house at the time, suffered the fate of the others. The oldest, aged 11, was found dead, and the youngest one was considerably hurt.

At Ste. Helene 52 buildings were wrecked and fifteen persons wounded, some seriously. Many persons have been badly injured and scores have been rendered destitute and homeless.
