found in the trotting ranks again after his runners are disposed of. Nothing succeeds like success. It is said that last spring Ed. Geers refused over 100 horses that were offered him to train.

About the only unpleasant feature of the present trotting season is, says the Breed-ers' Gazette, the fact that some of the re-

ers' Gazette, the fact that some of the remarkable performances made on the various tracks incited so-called poets to the writing of senseless jingle that might far better have been left unsaid.

The most intelligent breeder will not be hampered or blinded by any set theory, says an exchange, but will study how the best horses of to-day are being produced with the greatest uniformity, and reach for the most successful under the double tests of performance and production.

In Robert Bonner's latest talk about Sunol, he says, "I believe it is in Sunol to beat 2:082, the record made by Maud S., provided Sunol is as game a mare as the latter. She certainly has the speed. Her record of 2:18 as a 2-year-old and 2:103 as a 3-year-old shows it. Yes, I may say conclusively that, barring accident, Sunol will make a new record for trotters." If there were one race for thorough 2-

If there were one race for thorough 2-year-olds where now there are five; if selling races could be entirely abolished; if no races were given for 3-year-olds and upward at less than six turlongs; if the minimum of weight were put not lower than 110 pounds—then it might be said with some approach to truth that the object of racing was the improvement of the American thoroughbred.—[Chicago Horseman. In cities he pulls butcher carts, milk wagons, buggies, carriages, omnibus and express wagons, and is found indispensable in many other places where nothing but fast harness horses can be used. Horses that make trotting race horses are about one in every 100, and the man who breeds a common mare to a trotting-bred horse and fails to get a 2:20 performer need not be disappointed, but has some assurance of a nice roadster that will be worth three colts from a scrub horse. What could a good roadster be sold for? It would be safe to say \$300, while a scrub would sell for \$100, and perhaps a good deal less, and cost the same amount to raise.—

A gentleman thoroughly experienced in trotting affairs and who at the recent Independence meeting saw for the first time a kite-shaped track in full blast, said that he was somewhat disappointed, and came away strong in the belief that the old-fashioned regulation track was preferable to the kite-shaped course. He remarked that he saw a few advantages in the new plan, but not sufficient to counterbalance its disadvantages, prominent among which he observed the many collisions and narrow escapes from collisions at the intersection of the tracks, a disadvantage which it would not seem easy to remedy. Undoubtedly the most serious objection to the kite-shaped track is that it precludes the possibility of a distinct and intelligent view of the races by the public, and certainly the public convenience and entertainment is a most important factor for consideration in the construction and equipment of a racecourse.

St. Louis, Mo., Sept. 29.—A dispatch from the City of Mexico says on the 15th inst. an outbreak occurred in the city of Guatemala, and private advices state that 500 lives were sacrificed.

It appears the people were celebrating their national holiday, and President Barillas personally appointed the orators of the day. To this the masses took exception, and when the orators took the rostrum it was the signal for a storm of stones, which put them to flight, they being chased across the big plaza by a howling mob, shouting "Down with the Government!" "Down with despotism and tyranny!" "Die, Barillas!" An exciting seene followed, and every known Liberal or Barillas' partisan was driven from the plaza. Barillas threw a battalion of infantry into the large square to disperse tho mob. They with fixed bayonets attempted to carry the plaza by assult, but were neb with showers of stones and bullets from revolvers. By doing this the horse becomes a good judge of the quantity he requires. If a horse comes home from a hard journey, perspiring freely, do not allow him to drink his fill of cold water. Let him stand in the stable till he has cooled somewhat and is made comfortalle. A little chilled water may be given and a little good, long hay be put into his rack to take his attention. It will require thorough mastication, and will have the effect of preparing the stonnach for the reception of the more concentrated food which is to follow.
