THE LATE MRS. HOLMAN.

Interesting Reminiscence of the Famous Actress by the Toronto Telegram.

Appropos of the death of Mrs. George Holman in this city, on Friday, the Toronto Telegram says:

"The family went upon the road about 20 years ago, and were known as 'The Holman Troupe,' and gave little operatic performances, combined with specialties. Mrs. Holman acted as music directress, while Mr. Holman attended to the business department, and once in a while went upon the stage to assist his children.

After several years success they formed the Holman Opera Company, and added several artists to their troupe. W. H. Crane, the great actor, was taken as a lead and developed. They also developed Johnny Chatterton and his sister, Chatterton is known to the vast majority of our people, and is Lillian Russell's latest husband. While touring Canada, Mr. Holman learned that the Royal Lyceum Theatre in this city was to lease, and after a conference with the late James French, the owner of the house, he secured it for a term of years, and adding to the company a dramatic organization, they continued to perform here until the spring of 1884, when they removed to London, where they took over the old Music Hall and the name after the famous theatre of the Holman Opera House. 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
