In the Dining-Room.

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 16.

• BREAKFAST—Pineapple, Tomato, toast with poached eggs. Hashed potatoes. Yeast puffs and coffee.

• LUNCHEON—Omelette, Thin bread and butter, Olives, Shredded potatoes, Hot or cold tea.

• DINNER—Onion soup, Fish maitre d'hotel, Baked potatoes, Deviled eggs, Sliced cucumbers, Bananas, float and cake.

Cut out these recipes and paste them in a scrap-book.

Pineapple Toast with Poached Eggs.—Place three sliced ripe tomatoes in a saucepan over the fire; add one-half teaspoonful salt, three dashes pepper, one teaspoonful sugar and same of butter; boil ten minutes. In the meantime toast five slices of bread, butter them and place on hot dish. Pour the tomatoes over the toast, and on each slice place one poached egg.

Yeast Puffs.—Sift one pint flour in a bowl, add one-quarter teaspoon salt, one tablespoonful sugar, one ounce butter (rub butter fine in the flour), break one-half yeast cake into one cup lukewarm water; set cup in warm place until yeast rises to surface, then mix all into a smooth batter; let it stand over night in morning but in a hot oven, turn the omelette so both sides meet in the center; turn on a hot dish. Prepare another omelette in the same way.

Cheese Omelette.—Grate two ounces of cheese; mix the yolks of two eggs with one-eighth teaspoonful of salt and same of pepper, and two tablespoonfuls of cold water; beat the two whites to a stiff froth; add slowly while beating constantly the yolk mixture over the whites; place in a frying-pan with one teaspoonful of butter over the fire; when hot pour in the mixture, and as soon as the omelette is brown underneath sprinkle over one-half the grated cheese; place the pan for a few minutes in a hot oven, then turn the omelette so both sides meet in the center; turn on a hot dish. Prepare another omelette in the same way.

Fish Maitre d'Hotel.—Procure three slices of fresh codfish, remove skin and bones and cut slices in half; season with one teaspoonful salt and a few dashes of pepper; dust with flour; dip the pieces in beaten eggs, cover them with cooking oil, and fry in a hot oven, fry in lard or oil; lay fish on hot dish; stir one ounce of butter to a cream, add one tablespoonful lemon juice, one tablespoonful finely-chopped parsley and one-quarter teaspoonful nutmeg; spread this over the fish and serve.

Deviled Eggs.—Boil three eggs twenty minutes, then place in cold water; when cool remove shells and cut eggs in half; fill each half with a mixture of a pinch of mustard and a few drops of vinegar. Stuff the whites with this mixture and place them on lettuce

Banana Float.—Place in a double boiler one pint of milk, two tablespoonfuls sugar and the yolks of two eggs; add one teaspoonful cornstarch, stir over the fire until thick, then add a little vanilla flavoring. When custard is cold beat the two whites to a stiff froth; mix with two tablespoonfuls of sugar, cut three bananas into slices and place in dish, pour over the custard and put whites of eggs on top in shape of snow balls.

GUELPH MODEL FARM

Visited by Farmers of East Middlesex—A Successful Excursion.

The annual excursion of the East Middlesex Farmers' Institute, held on Saturday last to Guelph Model Farm, was a decided success. The day was delightful and the attendance over 500. The train started promptly on time, viz., 7:15 in the morning, and 6 in the evening, making the trip each way in 2 hours and 45 minutes, and was run under the care of Conductor Joseph Fitzpatrick.

At the farm the party were very cordially received by Mr. Mills, president of the institute, and Mr. Zaver, led the way through the experimental grounds, explaining his system in experimenting, and drawing attention to the leading varieties of grains, mixtures, methods of cultivation, etc. After this lunch was served, Mr. Ken- nedy minutely described his system of cultivation, rotation of crops, manuring, economical system of feeding, fencing, construction of buildings and management, which, in the last few years, has done so much to place the farm in such an excellent condition.

Mr. Zaver then showed the party the poultry, dairy buildings and the making of butter, or the various breeds of cows, sheep and cattle. An exhibition of milking cows by steam was given, ten or more being milked at once. All present were highly pleased with the trip and a profitable one.

DR. D. MITCHELL.

Death of a Devoted and Highly Respected Physician.

One of the most devoted and thoroughly respected physicians of Western Ontario died Sunday evening in the town of London. Dr. D. Mitchell, born in Lobo, about fifteen miles from London, 38 years ago, his life had been one of constant effort, successful in great measure, but hampered by a weak constitution. Three years ago a lung trouble had caused him to leave his practice, and take a trip to Jamaica, and previously it had been the cause of his giving up a lucrative practice at Tilbury. His fatal illness had lasted only a week, and until a few hours before his death it had been hoped he would survive.

As a lad he passed with high honors through the Stratford Collegiate Institute, and was for some years very successful as a teacher. In his medical studies he passed honorably at Toronto, Glasgow and Edinburgh, being associated for some time with the celebrated Dr. Wood, of the latter place. He had had practiced successfully at Harrow, Tilbury and Glenholm. In each place he secured the thorough confidence and respect of a large clientele. He was of highly literary tastes, and his parlors were frequently the gathering place of all in the neighborhood of similar tastes. Mrs. Jean Blewett being of the number. In social circles he was a great favorite, being endowed with conversational powers of a high order. In his opinion he was frank and outspoken, being a thorough enemy of all sham and pretense. His loss is deeply felt by a large circle of friends, and will be learned with regret. In politics he was a Liberal, and in religion, though of broad views, he was a member of the Disciples. Some years ago he married Miss Cameron, then of Lobo, but whose mother now resides in South London, and who is a sister of Mrs. (Judge) Bell, of this city.

He was a member of the C. O. F., and also of the Masonic body. The funeral will take place from Monmouth on Tuesday, after the arrival of the morning express, to the old cemetery in Lobo.

Cornwall's New Hospital.

Laying of the Corner-Stone by Premier Hardy.

Provincial Support of Charities—Several Appropriate Speeches.

Cornwall, June 15.—A public function of great interest took place here yesterday. The occasion was the laying of the corner-stone of the new general hospital, a fine building now in course of erection. The presence of Hon. A. S. Hardy, the Premier of Ontario, brought together a large crowd of people to witness the ceremony. Hon. Mr. Hardy went to the site of the hospital at the foot of Second street. He was escorted by Mayor Mulhern and Messrs. James T. Kirkpatrick and John McIntyre, the trustees of the estate of the late Mr. John Purcell, to whose munificent bequest the erection of the present state edifice is due.

Mayor Mulhern acted as chairman, and spoke a few happy words in introducing the Hon. Mr. Hardy. Hon. Mr. Hardy, as premier of the province, and head of an administration which is likely to ask the people for a renewal of confidence, was attentively heard, and it must be said that this his first visit to the historic town of Cornwall, has left a most favorable impression. Mr. Hardy first of all performed the formal part of the ceremony with handsome silver trowel, which was presented to him as a memento of the occasion. In his address he referred in fitting terms to the bounty of the gentleman who had so generously donated a portion of his wealth to the establishment of one of the great improvements which modern civilization has given us. In these days it was becoming quite common for rich men to endow charitable institutions, and the practice was a commendable one. Mr. Hardy mentioned several institutions of a similar

character to this one, notably the Nicholas Hospital at Peterboro, the Stratford in his own city of Brantford, and the Ross Robertson Home for Sick Children in Toronto.

Mr. Hardy then referred to the policy of the Ontario Government in the matter of hospitals, and many of his hearers were surprised to find what a large portion of the province's funds went to the aid of these homes and refuges for the afflicted and helpless.

Mr. Hardy said that the sum appropriated for hospitals each year had grown from an insignificant item twenty years ago to its present proportion. Mr. Hardy also spoke eloquently of the jubilee year of her Majesty's reign and the celebration of the same.

Mr. J. G. Snelinger, M.P., Mr. Wm. Mack, ex-M.P., Mr. James Leitch, C. C., Dr. Harrison, and the trustees, Mr. McIntyre and Mr. Kirkpatrick, also spoke briefly, and the ceremony was closed with ringing cheers for the Queen, the premier and the chairman. Mr. Hardy goes tomorrow to Lancaster to speak at a Liberal picnic.
