Inspector Sanders' report was laid before the board, showing ten cases of cruelty which had been reported and attended to by him during the month, some of the people reprimanded for cruelty to animals requiring much persuasion or the inspector's part before they agreed to his suggestions. Many people were found to be cruel from want of thought and because they simply do as they see others doing; but when the inspec tor reasons with them on the subject he finds out that as a rule the same persons never require a second reprimand. This is particularly noticeable with those who bring chickens and animals to market with their feet tied together. As several complaints had been made of the exposed condition or the cavalry horses during the holding of the camp, the inspector investigated the matter, and found that out of 160 horses only 40 were under cover, the owners of which provided the covering at their own expense, thus leaving 120 herses exposed to all kinds of weather. The secretary was instructed to communicated with the Minister of Militia with a view to having this defect re-medied before the assembling of the next camp. The case was reported of a man who wishing to stop a horse from coming into his field loaded his gun with peas, and so riddled the poor brute's legs and hip that it required the services of a veterinary surgeon to extract the peas, many of which were embedded a half inch under the skin and necessitated a considerable loss of blood before they could be cut out.
