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RUSSIA DEMANDS PARLIAMENT IN MEMORIAL TO THE CZAR

Interest and Excitement Over Meeting of the Zemstvo at St. Petersburg Is Intense.

LIBERALS FROM ALL PARTS AT THE CAPITAL

St. Petersburg, Nov. 21.—The interest in the meetings of the Zemstvo representatives is intense. The war and all other questions are temporarily forgotten. Nothing else is talked of. Liberals from all parts of the empire are flocking hither, including many from Poland and Finland. The hotel lobbies are crowded. The permission granted by Interior Minister Sviatopolk-Mirsky was for an assembly of 500. The participants' friends display complete confidence in the protection afforded by the minister, and his most outspoken sentiments. The situation altogether is unparalleled. Nothing approaching such a gathering has ever before been permitted in Russia. As an evidence of the remarkable state of affairs it is sufficient to mention that one of the most prominent speakers yesterday was M. Petrunkevitch, of Tver, who spent 24 years in exile, and who had only been allowed since Prince Sviatopolk-Mirsky's advent to come to the capital. Nevertheless the most able men in the assembly are counselling moderation, and are doing everything possible to prevent demonstrations which might compel interference. One of the strongest members of the conference said to the Associated Press: "We want to make our position plain to the Government but we desire to avoid every appearance of lawlessness. I sincerely hope the meeting will be productive of great good. We hope

SUICIDE IN JAIL

Insane Man Hangs Himself in Essex County Jail.

Windsor, Ont., Nov. 21.—Henry C. Niece, an insane man, confined in Sandwich jail, awaiting removal to an asylum, committed suicide by hanging himself in the washroom of the prison on Saturday. Niece died two weeks ago and was suspended himself from a water pipe. He leaves a widow and five children at Edinburg Mills, Essex County.

£2,000 FOR THE CABBY

Mrs. Smith's Joy in Getting Jewels Back Tempered Somewhat.

London, Nov. 21.—Mrs. R. A. Smith, a wealthy Canadian, who is staying at the Carlton, is in a state of much discontent, though she recovered £20,000 worth of jewels the day after she left them in a cabby. When the cabby discovered the jewels he took them to Scotland Yard. Mrs. Smith was delighted to hear that she only had to go and identify her property in order to recover it. When she found out that she had to pay 10 per cent of the value of the jewels, she went to the cabby, her joy was tempered with regret. She wants to know why the cabman, when he discovered the jewels, did not bring them back to the Carlton, from which he took her. The cabby naturally preferred to keep the jewels, and the value of the jewels which he would receive from Scotland Yard to a chance of appreciation of his honesty.

PREMIER RETURNS DEC. 15

Will Take in the St. Louis Fair En Route to California.

Ottawa, Nov. 21.—The Prime Minister and Lady Laurier leave on Tuesday on a holiday visit to California. They will probably stay over at St. Louis for a day or two in order to see something of the exposition, afterwards resuming their journey. Their intention is to return to Ottawa about Dec. 15. Today was Sir Wilfrid's birthday, and numerous congratulatory telegrams and cablegrams reached him.

MINTO'S MARCONI GRAM

Last Word of Farewell Sent Premier by Wireless.

Ottawa, Nov. 20.—The Premier Saturday received the following farewell message from Lord and Lady Minto: "Rimouski Wharf, Nov. 19.—Cannot tell you how deeply we feel saying good-bye to you and to so many friends, and to Canada, where we have been so happy. Hope to send you a Marconigram from Fame Point." Sir Wilfrid stated that Lord and Lady Minto were profoundly touched by the warmth of the farewell demonstration. Lord Minto carried out his promise to send a Marconigram from Fame Point. The message was duly received by the Premier last evening, and read: "Must avail myself of Marconi system to express wish all prosperity may attend Dominion and yourself."

FELL INTO FIREHOLD

Fireman on Steamer Algonquin Met With Accidental Death.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., Nov. 21.—Charles Pierson, of Toronto, a fireman on board the steamer Algonquin, met with a fatal accident while the steamer was on Lake Superior. He fell down the ladder into the firehold, but it is not exactly known how the accident happened. He was picked up with a terrible gash in the back of the head, and never regained consciousness. His body is being taken on the steamer to Meaford, thence to Toronto.

CHILE FEELS SORE

Says the Reported Sale of Ships to Russia Is Quite Absurd.

New York, Nov. 21.—A Valparaiso, Chile, dispatch to the Herald, dated Nov. 20, says: In discussing the published dispatch from London relative to the alleged sale of Chilean warships to Russia through Columbia, a high Government official said today: "It is quite absurd to believe that Chile would sell battleships to a belligerent power as to suppose that the United States would sell some of her ships to Russia or Japan. Because Chile is placed on the South American continent is no reason to imply that she is a savage and uncivilized country, just as the other hand there would be no reason to assume that she was a civilized country because she happened to be located in Europe. Japanese diplomats in Europe show amazing ignorance of certain conditions they ought to know about in certain Latin-American nationalities."

CROWN ACTS IN BALLOT BOX CASE

Warrants For Arrest of B. O. Lott, Shipley and Reilly.

WHELAN ARRESTED AND BAILED

Election Clerk Says the Liberal Candidate Asked To Be Given a Ballot.

Belleville, Nov. 20.—Within ten minutes after the adjournment of the court yesterday Mr. George F. Shipley, K.C., was in consultation with Lieut.-Col. Sherwood, of the Dominion police. Their conference lasted up till within a few minutes of the hour at which Mr. Shipley left for Toronto. Immediately after his departure Col. Sherwood waited upon Police Magistrate Flint, and laid information against Byron O. Lott, Stirling W. J. Shipley, Harvey Smith, P. E. Whelan, Prescott, and O. J. Reilly, Kingston. Warrants were issued for the arrest of the persons named and placed in the hands of the proper officers for execution. Mr. Whelan was arrested at Prescott and brought before the police magistrate here. He was remanded until Friday next, bail being accepted. Mr. Whitney, a banker, who accompanied the accused from Prescott, deposited a check for \$2,000 as security for his appearance. Mr. Whelan, who is an inland revenue officer at Prescott, said on the morning of nomination day a man drove to his place with a box which he desired to be shipped by express to Lott, and gave him \$5 to pay the charges, which were \$2.50. (Whelan) knew nothing of the contents of the box. Mr. W. J. Shipley was in the city yesterday, but left before the warrant was issued. Mr. O. Lott, it was reported, was absent on a hunting expedition, but it was stated by a friend of the family yesterday that the warrant was issued some time this week. Up to a late hour tonight no further arrests had been reported.

HURST'S EVIDENCE

Mr. James Hurst, the Belleville insurance agent who was made a defendant by Philip A. Lott, on Saturday related the conversation which took place between them. The story told in the box by Philip Lott was a repetition of what Lott had told him at various times since March last. Witness called on Mr. Porter one evening about Oct. 4, in regard to the election, and told him that he had nothing of importance to tell him because he had no permission of the third party. When pressed, however, he told Mr. Porter that if what was contemplated was carried out he would be a trimmed man on election day and that witness would prove it before election day and deliver the goods. On Friday before the election witness learned from Philip Lott that the boxes had arrived and at his request Philip called to Belleville and communicated the facts to Mr. Porter and Mr. Corby. It was at first the intention of Philip Lott and himself to let the parties see the boxes and catch them redhanded. In cross-examination by Mr. McCann witness related that Philip A. Lott told him on the night they were staying together at the hotel that the bogus ballot boxes, the old-fashioned type, were that good the Ontario Government had paid \$50,000 for the use of them. All through the summer whenever he and Philip Lott met they had numerous conversations regarding the bogus ballot boxes. Lott never said he never heard of Reilly in connection with the matter until the Friday before the elections, at all events, it was not shown the correspondence with Reilly. Witness was always doubtful about the boxes materializing, as he didn't think sane people would take such chances. It was the suggestion of Philip Lott and witness that Mr. Harry Corby was present at the interview when Lott made the exposure, but he thought expected trouble would arise, and everybody would believe Mr. Corby if he came forward and said he had seen the bogus ballot boxes before the election. Lott didn't go to Mr. Porter's office on Sunday morning before the election, according to appointment, because he was afraid of the exposure. At the time public, and if Lott were seen carrying a telephone valve to Mr. Porter's office the Liberals would know something was afoot and the boxes would not then be used in the election, as they hoped they would be. One reason why they wished to have Mr. Corby's name in it was to make it more difficult for the story. On the Friday before the election witness was at Philip Lott's house, and they examined and tested the operation of one of the bogus boxes. Byron O. Lott did not know that Philip had taken witness into his confidence and witness cautioned Philip not to let anyone else know what was going on. He couldn't say who was directing operations. Philip Lott sometimes took advice from witness and occasionally witness took Philip's advice; they acted together all through the business.

ASKED LICENSE TO ROB

Pickpockets Wanted to Buy Concession at Horse Show.

New York, Nov. 21.—"Are you an official of the National Horse Show Association of America?" inquired a tall, slender man entering the executive offices of the association in the Madison Square Garden and approaching a person having an air of authority. The tall man was well dressed, to the extent of a top hat, and the person in the uniform of a horse show man, and after receiving a reply in the affirmative, returned to the man in the top hat. "Are you in a position to make arrangements for a business proposition without any holdout, I'm on the square?" "I am," was the reply. "There was a moment's hesitation on the part of the stranger, while his gray eyes continued the scrutiny. He seemed satisfied as he said: 'Well, I'm ready to talk business with you, I can throw a lot of money your way. What I want is the concession for picking pockets in the garden during horse-show week.' 'I don't know what arrangements you have now,' continued the stranger, 'but I can do something good for you. Just let me keep in front and prevent the others from entering while my men circulate in the crowd. All my men are nice and presentable, and they are experts. I'll see that you get 35 per cent of the proceeds.' 'But,' began the official, 'I know others may offer more.' 'Interrupted the tall man, 'but you can get more through me. They may promise you a larger percentage, but you get your fair proportion with me without any holdout. I'm on the square. Now, what do you say?' 'No,' roared the official, with a few exceptions that would not look well in print. 'You get out of here. I'll call the police.' 'Calmly, without seeming to hurry, the tall man left.

LIBEL CASE DROPPED

Cooke-Blackley Case Brought to a Sudden Termination.

Montreal, Nov. 21.—The celebrated case of libel preferred by a former crown prosecutor, J. P. Cooke, against William Blackley, of Toronto, came to a sudden end today through the withdrawal of the case for the prosecution. Counsel for the private prosecution announced the withdrawal, and Crown Prosecutor Laframboise, on behalf of the Attorney-General of Quebec, entered a nolle prosequi. No explanations were made to the court for the dropping of the suit. Motion was made for argument on costs, which was granted.

THE NEXT ATTACK A TREMENDOUS ONE

Heavy Reinforcements Rushing to General Nogi.

JAPS TUNNELING A WAY IN

Tokio's Ships Capture a German Provision Boat Attempting to Run the Blockade.

Tokio, Nov. 21.—Reliable sources report that the Japanese mined and occupied a counter-scarp on Riblung Mountain, Nov. 19. A dispatch from Tokio early today announced that the Japanese after successful mining had occupied a counter-scarp on Sungshu Mountain, on Friday, Nov. 18. Riblung (or Erlhung) Mountain is east of Sungshu Mountain. The latter is due north of Port Arthur. Riblung Mountain forms part of the northeastern fortifications. The Foo, Nov. 21.—2 p.m.—A Japanese official among the latest arrivals from Dalny states positively that the general attack upon Port Arthur has not been resumed. Rumors to that effect in Dalny have arisen because fresh troops, including the seventh division, recently landed, are being sent to the front. It is believed that the explosion which took place on Nov. 19 occurred in some counter-mining work. It is expected that the next attack upon Port Arthur will be a tremendous affair. More reinforcements are coming to the support of Gen. Nogi than those dispatched to Field Marshal Oyama. The Japanese are now constructing coast defense forts at Pigeon Bay, which is accepted as an indication that they expect to be defending Port Arthur themselves some day.

Tokio, Nov. 21.—The navy department reports the capture of the German steamer Batelan, while attempting to run the Port Arthur blockade. The department says that at 3 a.m., Nov. 19, a Japanese squadron, cruising off Yantai (near Taiten Bay), sighted a vessel steaming for Port Arthur. The gunboat Tatsuta, pursued, and overtook the steamer at 5 in the morning. On board the vessel was found a great quantity of winter clothing, blankets, medicine and corned meat. Her captain said he was bound for Newchwang. The route and cargo of the Batelan were considered to be suspicious, and she was taken possession of and brought to Sasebo.

Baltic Sailors Desert

London, Monday, Nov. 21.—The Express prints a dispatch from its correspondent at Cana, Crete, saying there were horrible scenes there during the stay of Rear-Admiral Voelker's division of the Baltic fleet. Many of the officers and men were continuously intoxicated. They roamed the streets at night, assaulting the inhabitants. According to the correspondent, they murdered at least five persons in drunken brawl. At about 10 p.m. the sailors, who were on board of the vessels comprising the squadron, were in a state of insubordination. They openly declare that they had no confidence in their officers. Liberal Gathering Promises To Greatest Ever Held.

Toronto, Nov. 21.—It is perfectly evident now that Massey Hall will be taxed to its utmost to accommodate probably two thousand delegates and as many more visitors. Unless all signs fail, the 98 Ontario constituencies will not only have their delegations present, but a very large number of visitors also, so that the Liberal convention, which opens on Wednesday forenoon in Massey Hall, will be the largest political convention ever held in Canada. The decision to admit as delegates the editors of all Liberal newspapers who are not already appointed delegates, has given great satisfaction. There will be no difficulty about these gentlemen securing credentials, and in any case any of them have been invited to the convention. The Reform Association secretary or to the committee rooms, 34 Victoria street, Toronto, will insure immediate attention. It is quite evident that there will be a big rush at the registration and the transportation desks. Tickets will be sold as much as possible, on Tuesday at 2 p.m. the credential and transportation committees will be at Association hall, 413 Yonge street, and will remain there until 10 p.m. Every delegate who possibly can is earnestly requested to present his credential and ticket as early as possible, on Tuesday afternoon or evening. Every city delegate should be sure to present his credential on Tuesday. It will be perfectly obvious that unless every credential and every railway certificate possible is handed in on Tuesday afternoon and evening there will be very much confusion and crushing on the morning of the convention.

THE TURK AND THE BIBLE

Britain With United States Protests Against Stoppage of Sales.

Constantinople, Nov. 21.—The British embassy has joined the American legation in insisting on the cessation of interference with the sales of Bibles in certain localities. It appears that the British and American Bible Societies have had trouble at Uskup. The Porte says the reason for the opposition is that the Bibles are being sold at a ridiculously low price and the sales partake of the character of a propaganda.

COLOMBIA'S DEPT

Foreign Bondholders Will Ask Roosevelt to Arbitrate Question.

London, Nov. 21.—A movement is on foot to get President Roosevelt to arbitrate the difference between Panama, and the corporation of foreign bondholders in regard to the Colombian debt. A meeting of the Colombia committee of the corporation has just summoned to consider the best means of recovery from Panama of a portion of the \$10,000,000 paid by the United States in connection with the debt. It is proposed to call a public meeting of the Colombian bondholders for the purpose of requesting President Roosevelt to arbitrate as to the proportion of this amount, the new republic ought to pay towards the liquidation of Colombia's debt.

JURY REFUSES TO OBEY JUDGE

Sensational Scene in a Winnipeg Court Over Trial of Galicians.

Winnipeg, Nov. 20.—The trial of several Greek Catholics, Galicians, charged with damaging the independent Greek Church property at Gimli and assaulting Priest Jarema, which has been in progress at the assizes here for several days, concluded yesterday with a verdict of guilty. Chief Justice Dubuc in summing up, charged strongly in favor of the prisoners. Mr. Potts, counsel for the crown, took strong exception to his lordship's charge and gave notice that he would ask for a case to be stated to the full court. The jury returned a verdict of guilty at 1 o'clock. Mr. Patterson, Deputy Attorney-General here, pointed out to the chief justice that it was a very serious problem before the authorities dealing with these foreigners. They had no respect for the law of the land and were daily taking it into their own hands. It was a most serious thing if these men went back to Gimli with the authority of the court to repeat their offense. His lordship again directed the jury to retire and bring in a verdict of not guilty. He had never had such an experience during the whole time he had sat upon the bench. The foreman of the jury stated that the jury were unanimous in the matter, but that it was no use their retiring, but Chief Justice Dubuc insisted that on the question of law they must do as he directed. After the jury had again retired Mr. Potts protested strongly against his lordship's charge as to the right of the accused to act as they had done. The jury again returned into court and persisted in their verdict. "Are you unanimous?" queried his lordship. "Entirely unanimous," replied the jury. On the request of Mr. Potts sentence is to be deferred until the question as to the legality of his lordship's charge is decided by a full court. Chief Justice Dubuc's action is strongly commented upon, owing to his prominence in Roman Catholic circles.

WAYLAND GLEN IN JAIL

Because He Refused to Pay a Bill He Did Not Owe.

New York, Nov. 20.—Francis Wayland Glen, for eight years a member of the Canadian Parliament, and since then the promoter of a republic which shall embrace the whole of North America, is in the Ludlow street jail because Miss Josephine Kneeland, a public stenographer, says that he secured \$50 worth of work by false representations. Mr. Glen says: "I am not sorry that I am in jail; in fact, I am glad of it, for I am learning many new things. I refused all offers of assistance from my friends, and would allow anyone to go on my bail bond, as I intend to remain the full fifteen days in jail. "I will have something sensational to tell some time, concerning the real reason for my imprisonment," he said. He then intimated that a well-known magnate had promised to pay for the work he was doing, and that the failure of this man to keep his promise was responsible for his plight. The manuscript which led him to jail related to reciprocity with Canada—another of his pet projects.

RACE WAR IN LEXINGTON, KY

Mob Moves On Jail to Lynch Negro Murderers. But Thinks Better of It.

Lexington, Ky., Nov. 21.—William Moore, a laboring man, was killed last night by three negroes, who attacked him in a saloon. The three negroes, James Garfield, John Taylor and Edward Taylor, came into the saloon, and with the words, "We will clean out all you white dogs," began firing. Moore fell dead without a word. Edward Taylor and Garfield were caught and lodged in jail. At midnight a crowd gathered on the outskirts of the city with the intention of attacking the jail to secure the negroes. A riot alarm called all the policemen from their beats and they were stationed in and around the jail. The mob, 500 strong, finally moved on the jail. When within two squares of the prison police picked the leader with the exclamation: "Is there an Oddfellow in this crowd?" The crowd halted, and a man stepped from the front rank. In a hurried conversation the policeman told him that forty officers were in and around the jail, that it was a stone and steel structure, and that an attack meant wholesale bloodshed. The leader returned to his fellows, who were armed with firearms of all descriptions, and counseled abandonment of the undertaking. Within five minutes the mob had disappeared and the authorities are confident that the jail will not be attacked.

Collided in Fog

Sarnia, Ont., Nov. 21.—While rounding at her dock during a thick fog, the steamer United Empire was struck by the steamer Craig, receiving damage to the rail and bulwarks on the starboard side. The Craig was not injured and proceeded on her way.

30,000 HOMELESS BY HURRICANE

Catastrophe Overtakes Natives of Talaute Isles, Malay Archipelago.

Amsterdam, Holland, Nov. 21.—The Talaute Islands, northeast of Celebes, Malay Archipelago, have been visited by a disastrous hurricane, causing sea to rise to such an extent that it flooded the islands and left 30,000 persons homeless. Many boats and plantations being destroyed.

WOOLATT TO RETIRE

Superintendent of Marquette Buffalo Division in Poor Health.

Walkerville, Ont., Nov. 21.—William Woolatt, superintendent of the Buffalo division of the Pere Marquette, with headquarters here, will retire temporarily on account of failing health, and take a trip to Calgary. After Nov. Year's Mr. Woolatt, who was appointed general manager of the L. E. and D. R. in 1899, has resided here sixteen years. It is rumored that the position of superintendent of the Canadian division of the Pere Marquette is to be abolished altogether.

WILL FIGHT FOR EARLDOM

Kansas City Man and British Claimants in Opposition.

London, Nov. 21.—Robert Barclay Allardice, whose claim to the dormant dukedom of Strathearn, Monteth and Airth, in the peerage of Scotland, will be heard in the next session of the House of Lords, is in opposition to George Marshall Graham, of Kansas City, whose interests in this country are represented by his cousin, W. M. Graham, of Eastern Canada. Mr. Allardice was born in Edinburgh on Nov. 1, 1852, is the eldest surviving son of the late James Graham, of Leith, and is now residing in Perthshire. The earldom of Strathearn dates from 1371, and the earldoms of Airth and Monteth from 1633 and 1427, respectively. Barclay Allardice is a member of the Lochnathill, Cornwall, and is the eldest son of the late Samuel Ritchie by his marriage with Margaret Barclay Allardice, whose name the claimant assumed by royal license in 1888. His mother, who died in August of last year, was a daughter of Capt. Robert Barclay Allardice, of Ory, in Kincardineshire, himself an heir in the direct line of the earls of Strathearn. In 1827 James I. of Scotland, seeing danger in the fact that the Earl of Strathearn, that day claimed royal descent, deprived him of that earldom, but conferred on him in its place that of Monteth, which was held by several generations of earls. The seventh holder was the Earl of Strathearn, declaring himself of purer descent than Charles I., then on the throne of England. Charles was not a king who would stand any nonsense of that sort, and accordingly in 1633 the earl found himself made Earl of Airth, with the privilege of taking that title or none. As he was in some danger of losing his head as well as his title he took the title. His son predeceased him and it was his grandson who became the second Earl of Airth.

The succession also was claimed, however, by the descendant of the second earl's younger sister, who married Sir William Graham, of Gartmore, and whose great-grandson, known as the "beggar earl," voted as the Earl of Monteth. In the middle of the eighteenth century the committee on privileges had to confess itself baffled by the rival claims and dismissed both without settling either.

SEALEY LOSES ON THE RECOUNT

Wentworth Goes Conservative Through Blunder of a D. R. O.

Hamilton, Ont., Nov. 21.—By Judge Snyder's decision, given this morning in the Wentworth recount, E. Sealey, Conservative, is elected by ten majority. The judge threw out the ballots in the Beverley Township polling station, where Adam Valleron, the deputy returning officer, illegally numbered the ballots. Had these ballots been counted W. O. Sealey, Liberal, would have elected by fifteen, but majority having been reduced from twenty by the recount.

KICKED BY A COW

Walkerville, Ont., Nov. 21.—Charles Janisse, aged 34 years, one of the oldest residents of Sandwich East, was kicked by a cow yesterday. Owing to his advanced age and the shock of the injury his hope is entertained for his recovery.

SS. Kroonland Safe

New York, Nov. 21.—The steamer Kroonland was reported in communication with Nantucket lightship at 5 o'clock this morning, and will dock about 8 o'clock tonight. The Kroonland has been reported as having been taken by the report was discredited by the steamship company which gave out a statement of denial last night.

HARD AGROUND

New York, Nov. 21.—The steamer Sicilian Prince, of the Prince Line, which went ashore four miles west of the life saving station at Long Beach, Long Island, at 5 o'clock Sunday night, was found aground on the beach. This morning the steamer moved two lengths inshore. All the stevedores who had been on the ship last night, and a considerable number of the crew, were taken off early today and brought up to this city in tugs.
