HISTORY OF THE PEOPLE OF ISRAEL

Rev. A. J. Vining Continues His Discourses in Talbot Street Church.

Evidently the congregations of this church are interested in the series of sermons that their pastor, Rev. A. J. Vining, has been continuing for some weeks past, discussing the history of the people of Israel. The seating capacity was taxed to the utmost, and some were turned away. Sunday evening's subject was "A Great King's reference being to King Solomon, I Kings II, 8. The speaker not only drew attention to the good qualities in this great king worthy of imitation, but also set forth in language that could not be mistaken the terrible picture of a life begun under most favorable conditions, and confronted with exceptional opportunities, yet blasted by the awful mistake of compromising with the world and following after worldly fashions.

The preacher emphasized upon the young the danger of sacrificing principle for the sake of sociability, and warned his hearers against the first step in this downward course.

The speaker said no man need have his life end in dismal failure, but the only safeguard is to be linked with Jesus Christ. Everyone who trusts in him will be brought out more than conqueror over sin, death and the grave.

The subject for next Sunday evening will be "The Kingdom Divided."

In the morning the pastor of South London Baptist Church, Rev. W. M. Walker, will exchange pulpits with Pastor Vining. Mr. Walker gave his hearers a most practical and profitable discourse.

DUNDAS CENTER AUXILIARY MEETS

Large Attendance in the Lecture Room Yesterday Afternoon.

Yesterday afternoon, at the meeting of Dundas Center Auxiliary, the large attendance in the lecture room was an evidence of the continued interest taken in the work of the Woman's Missionary Society by the members of this church.

The Easter messages given by Mrs. Stevens, of the China Inland Mission, and Mrs. F. Y. Miller, were full of hope and inspiration.

Madam Egbert, of Detroit, who is assisting in the special services this week, rendered two solos in a very effective manner.

Over \$240 was received for the annual thank-offering.

Mrs. (Rev.) E. B. Lancelley was appointed delegate to the branch meeting at Stratford, and Mrs. C. E. German, alternate.

Board Accepted the Murray Plans For Lorne Avenue School Addition

In Preference To Those Submitted By the City Architect.

At a special meeting of the board of education yesterday afternoon, the plans for the Lorne avenue school, of Mr. W. G. Murray, the architect, were accepted in preference to those prepared by City Architect Nutter. The estimated cost of the school is \$23,800, according to Mr. Murray's plans.

Both sets of plans were placed before the board and examined closely. Mr. Nutter's plans did not allow for a basement under the whole of the school, but merely the front part. This was objected to by some of the trustees, who wanted a basement under the whole of the school.

Dr. Teasdale and others of the trustees objected to the electric fans in Mr. Nutter's plans, declaring that with a steam heating plant, such as is installed in the St. George's school, fans are unnecessary.

The rooms in Mr. Nutter's plans were large, with plenty of air space and light, and splendid ventilation. There were lockers for the children's clothes, instead of a cloak-room. The lockers were placed in the halls. The estimated cost of Mr. Nutter's school was \$26,500.

The Murray Plans.

Mr. Murray's plans showed a basement under the entire school. The heating system was the same as that

in St. George's school. The school was large and roomy, with good ventilation. He estimated the cost to be \$23,800 based on actual contracts offered by contractors of the city.

After considerable discussion Trustee Westervelt declared the plans of Mr. Murray more suitable to the board's need than those of Mr. Nutter, and he accordingly moved that they be accepted, and that the council be requested to issue debentures for the sum of \$25,000 for the erection of the school.

The motion was seconded by Trustee Granger, and carried.

Talbot Street School.

The matter of the installation of a new heating and lavatory system in the Talbot street school was discussed at some length, and Chairman MacRobert of No. 2 committee, was instructed to have estimates prepared of the cost and report at the next meeting of the board.

Chairman Graham was of the opinion that these improvements were permanent, and that they could be provided for by debentures rather than out of the general fund. He also declared it would be well to install a new heating system in the Chesley avenue school as the present system was costing the board \$200 or \$300 a year too much. However, he will inquire whether debentures can be issued.

Those present were Chairman Graham, Trustees Hamilton, Westervelt, McCormick, Teasdale, Granger, MacRobert, Weekes, Inspector Edwards and Secretary McElheran.

He Opposes Front Street Breakwater

The board of works visited Front street last evening to look into the question of a breakwater. The members also inspected Nelson street to inquire into complaints regarding the dump there and to see what can be done regarding the opening of that street to Wellington street.

Both matters have been before the board for some time, and it is expected that they will be disposed of at the meeting of the board, Thursday night.

Against the Breakwater.

City Engineer Graydon advised against the breakwater on Front street.

Ald. Saunders last night declared that there was danger in building the breakwater at the eastern section, because the current of the river would be thrown directly against the north bank of the river at the rear of Victoria Hospital, with the result that the bank would be worn away, causing considerable damage.

"It would pay the city to buy the property complained of as being damaged, and run the current across it," said Ald. Saunders. "The north bank needs protection more than the Front street section, I think."

No opinion was expressed regarding Nelson street.

Life and Character of Oliver Cromwell

"The Life and Character of Oliver Cromwell," was the theme of a most interesting address given in the First Congregational Church last night by Mr. C. B. Edwards, public school inspector.

When the war ended he started in to reform the nation. He marched to London to seize King Charles, who escaped, and immediately Cromwell found himself engaged in another war.

This was of short duration, as King Charles was captured and later beheaded.

One of the darkest spots in Cromwell's career was the cruelty he showed in suppressing the rebellions in Ireland and Scotland.

Having restored peace, he set to work to legislate, and passed several useful measures.

By his policy he restored to England her prestige, which, owing to the disastrous civil wars, had become impaired.

A very hearty vote of thanks was tendered to Mr. Edwards at the conclusion of his address.

MRS. MEWAN WINS IN LOCAL ACTION

Is Entitled to a Share in the Estate of the Late George Chapman.
