SHE SPEAKS FOR MOTHERS' RIGHTS

Ellen Key, Swedish Author, Advocates a New System of Moral Ethics.
Berlin, May 4.—Ellen Key, an eminent Swedish author, is here preaching a new system of ethics which does not condemn a woman as immoral because she obeys the vital instinct which impels her toward motherhood. The immorality, she declares, will be based on responsibility. She admits that her doctrine may seem extravagant at the moment. But she adds—and who can deny it?—the most extreme ideas of today become the reason of tomorrow.
Her celebrity has been gained by her delineation of feminine character, so she seems to know her sisters. She is lecturing here on "Mother and Child," to hear her the hall is filled, many in her audience being prominent in women's clubs and in the various movements for women's betterment. The lecturer told these frankly that she has no sympathy for "emancipating" woman, for the women who devote themselves to these causes had infinitely better attend strictly to their duties as mothers.

FOUND BODY IN FIELD

Inquest Being Held on the Body of an Unknown Man.
Brampton, May 4.—Crown Attorney W. H. McFadden was notified this morning of the finding of the body of an unknown man on what is known as the old Mitchell farm, near Erdale, in Toronto Township. The body was discovered by some boys who were walking through the fields yesterday afternoon. Everything pointed to foul play.
Coroner Sutton has empaneled a jury and will hold an inquest this afternoon at 4 o'clock. Crown Attorney McFadden and County Constable Broddy left for the scene and will be present at the inquest.
This is the third person who has been killed under peculiar circumstances in Toronto Township during the past year, the two former being found on the railway track near Port Credit.
The dead man is an entire stranger in the neighborhood. It is probable that something will be discovered at the inquest which will give the detectives something to work upon.
