MAY BE MURDER CHARGE

Toronto, April 20.—Mary Smith, sometimes known as Quinn, died at St. Michael's Hospital here on Saturday. Interment took place at Mount Hope Cemetery on Sunday, but on the orders of the Attorney-General's department, the body will be exhumed, and an inquest held. In the meantime Saul Gagnon, a French-Canadian, under arrest at Cobalt on a charge of assault and robbery, will likely have the charge of murder against him changed to that of murder.

In the fall of last year, two women, Ethel Crawford and the Smith woman, were in the house in which the murder took place. Gagnon, who was under the influence of liquor. Using an axe, he beat the women in a terrible manner, and from the effects the Smith woman never recovered, lying in St. Michael's Hospital, whence she was brought from Cobalt, as stated, Saturday night.

The hospital authorities were unaware that anyone was under arrest in connection with the case, hence the burial. Gagnon disappeared after the assault and robbery, and was only captured a few weeks ago at North Bay, and was sent on to Cobalt.

Death of Missionary Is Confirmed

Boston, Mass., April 19.—Confirmation of the death of the missionary, Mr. Rogers, of Meriden, Conn., was received tonight in a cablegram from the American board headquarters here of the Massachusetts. The cablegram was as follows: "Massachusetts at Adana and Tarsus. Rogers killed. All others safe. Tell friends to send relief."

Girl Swallowed Poison On Street

Detroit, April 19.—Love's tragedy is suspected as the cause of the suicide of an as yet unidentified young woman, who swallowed carbolic acid on the street early this morning. The girl took the poison on Cass avenue, just north of Jefferson avenue. Herbert Brown, 254 Third avenue, heard the choking cry and saw her fall. He hurried to her and found her gasping, apparently already near death. She was carried in the East End ambulance to St. Mary's Hospital. She died there at 1:15 o'clock.

Big Ice Breaker Proves Her Worth

Montreal, April 19.—To the Montreal belongs the chief credit of making possible a navigation of the St. Lawrence between Montreal and Quebec, open by today. Since Jan. 12 last this 2,400-horsepower icebreaker has been smashing the ice, with, at that time, the entire crew, under Capt. Gagnon, working at 20 degrees below zero, in a record attempt to clear the St. Lawrence. Yesterday the work was completed, and navigation is open ten days earlier than last year. But for the good work done by the Montreal it might have been two weeks yet before the channel was clear.

Tornado Wrecks a Utica Suburb

Utica, April 19.—A tornado swept over Marcy Hill, a suburb of Utica, this afternoon and left behind it destruction and devastation. Houses and barns were demolished, trees uprooted, fences laid low, and large crevices made in the earth. It came with a roar, and while it lasted was terrifying. That no lives were lost is remarkable. Some of the summer cottages in the path of the wind were turned upside down, and several residences were completely demolished. Heavy timbering was carried from the wrecked buildings for several hundred feet.

THE KINRADE CASE

Wright Reported Aiding Detectives in the Virginia Hunt. Richmond, Va., April 19.—A man thought to be Montrose Wright, the fiancé of Miss Kinrade, appeared in Richmond last night and was in conference with the detectives who are working on the case. This man is registered at the Jefferson Hotel as W. M. Clark, of Washington. That Clark or Wright is interested in the Kinrade girl is evidence by activity in communication with the detectives and other officials who are working on the case at this end. Detective Pender says he has secured some important evidence, but will not divulge its nature.

THE INSURANCE BILL

To Be Taken Up Again Immediately After Budget Speech. Ottawa, April 20.—In the banking and commerce committee yesterday Mr. Richard Blain asked as to the insurance bill. There was an impression abroad, he said, that the measure would not be gone on with this session. Mr. H. H. Miller, chairman, said he had no doubt the bill would be proceeded with. Mr. Pieling had informed him that at the first meeting of the committee after the budget speech, he would move for a sub-committee to consider amendments to the bill along the lines suggested by the different interests that had been heard.

CONMEE POWER BILL SHELVED BY PREMIER

Sir Wilfrid Opposes It on the Grounds That It Infringes on Provincial Rights.

Ottawa, April 20.—In the interests of Ontario's right, Sir Wilfrid Laurier yesterday put himself on record as opposed to the Conmee power bill as it now stands, and in consequence the measure was shelved for the present. The Ontario and Michigan power bill was the measure introduced by James Conmee, the Liberal member for Thunder Bay and Rainy River, and provided for the expropriation forever of the water power of the Nepegin and Pigeon Rivers. The measure also provided for the extension of half the power to the United States.

The Opposition members of the private bills committee raised serious objections when the bill was before that body on the ground that it was an infringement on provincial rights. They were supported by one Liberal, Mr. Fowke. The measure was reported and reached the House yesterday.

Mr. Fowke, the Liberal member for South Ontario, opposed the bill on two grounds, that it was bartering away natural resources in perpetuity and that the water power of the province shall require all the water power within our own Dominion.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier said he had always deemed it his duty to support the finding of the private bills committee unless there were strong reasons to the contrary. In this instance there were strong reasons why the decision of the committee regarding the bill should be questioned and reviewed. The Premier agreed with the minister of justice regarding the jurisdiction of parliament in this matter but that was not the point of the discussion. There were points in the bill, he said, which would affect Ontario. The whole discussion had been upon expropriation and deserved their serious consideration, for the Ontario Government had a policy on this question, and in pursuance of that policy was refusing to give power to local companies to expropriate. In accordance with the policy of the Government of provincial rights, he could not support that feature of the bill. Another feature objectionable to him was the reservation of half the power to Canada. Why not, he said, go further and reserve the whole.

The Premier moved that the committee rise and report progress.

UNWRITTEN LAW FOR CAPT. PRINGLE

Said That Wife Will Make Contribution on the Stand in Order to Save Him.

Port Huron, April 19.—Captain Ralph Pringle was arraigned today on a charge of murdering George McKinnon, of Mooretown, Ont., in a saloon at St. Clair shortly after midnight on Sunday.

His attorneys waived the reading of the complaint, and his examination was set for Friday morning, a plea of not guilty being entered by the court and bill being filed. The prisoner was not notified of his victim's death until the time of his arraignment, and when the news was broken he said: "Is that so? I'm sorry."

The story is told today that Captain Pringle accused young McKinnon of being intimate with his wife, the young man sat in all his chair, and tantalized the vessel man, saying that it was none of his business if he and Mrs. Pringle had business. McKinnon formerly had charge of a night ferry, running between St. Clair and Courthouse, where he was told that once, between two years ago, McKinnon rode Mrs. Pringle across the St. Clair River, and ever since that time Pringle has harbored a deadly hatred for McKinnon. Mrs. Pringle will take the stand to see her husband. Her attorneys say she will give testimony similar to her confession made to her husband regarding herself and McKinnon. The defense will be the unwritten law, according to the lawyers.

EARLY STEAMERS FIGHT WITH ICE

Five Held Up Near Line Island and One Delayed at Whitefish Point.

Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., April 19.—After trying all day to force a passage through the sea, the steamers Northern Light, Northern King, G. Watson French and City of Chatham succeeded in only getting up a short distance above Sweet's Point light, near Line Island, where they encountered very strong. The steamer Dunham tied up at the dock, having arrived there today. A steamer was sighted off Whitefish Point this morning downbound and later reported as the Northern Wave. She was stuck in the ice about ten miles south of Whitefish Point, having not moved any during the day. The ice is held solid between Ironquins Point and Whitefish Point by a north wind. Unless the wind changes the situation will not be improved very early.

Buffalo, April 19.—The passenger steamer City of Buffalo, from Cleveland, arrived at this port early today. It was delayed from entering the river by the ice which had been blown down the lake by a heavy wind during the night, and she did not reach her berth until 7 p.m. She left on her scheduled time for Cleveland this evening.

Steamer Carleton Clears. Port Arthur, Ont., April 19.—The steamer Carleton, the first boat to leave the Canadian head of the lakes this season, steamed out today for Kingston, Ont., with 65,000 bushels of wheat.

IMMIGRANT DIED ON AN M. C. R. TRAIN

R. F. Reynolds Was Journeying From Sligo, Ireland, to Salt Lake City.

St. Thomas, April 19.—R. F. Reynolds, an immigrant from Sligo, Ireland, en route to Salt Lake City, Utah, died on No. 8 M. C. R. express between Fargo and Tisbury early Sunday morning. Reynolds, in company with a couple of other immigrants, had been going through on No. 87 express, but in St. Thomas had left the train and went up to his room. When they returned the train was gone, and he was forced to wait for No. 8. At Fargo he was taken seriously ill, and before a doctor could be procured at 7 P.M. the man was dead. Alcohol poisoning is given as the cause of his death. Reynolds, 17-year-old, was a doctor, and he was held in the train, who was on the first train with him, and who stopped off at Detroit to wait for him, took charge of the remains at Windsor.

MASHER TRIED TO MASH A POLICEMAN'S WIFE

Young Man the Victim of a Terrible Mistake on Dundas Street—Fined \$5.

A young man of the masher variety made an awful mistake on Dundas street last night, when he stopped a policeman's wife and tried to talk nicely to her. In addition, the young man was fined \$5 in court this morning by Magistrate Love.

The young fellow, it seems, drank so much during the afternoon that all women looked alike to him, and it made little difference which one he tried to talk to.

The lady in question was waiting for her husband to come off duty, when she was accosted by the masher, and the masher, in the endeavoring names he could recollect.

The lady took to the situation, and deciding that she could stand it for a moment, she was told by the masher that her husband arrived, let him believe on. A Terrible Shock. In his own estimation he was getting on famously, and felt that his reputation as a lady killer was established. He was, however, in a room, where he thought the matter was a huge joke.

TORONTO TO HAVE CHEAP LIGHTING

Six Cents Per Kilowatt Hour Supplied by Civic Plant.

Toronto, April 20.—The city's electric department is preparing a schedule of prices to be charged for house lighting, and it is said the rate will be about six cents per kilowatt hour. The rate will be lowered by a cent as it is thought that by that time the city will be in a position to sell 10,000 kilowatt hours, and will be able to dispose of it at five cents per kilowatt hour. The Toronto Electric Light Company now charge eight cents.

In view of Ottawa's successful competition against a private electric power company it is thought Toronto should be successful on a much larger scale, as the field for business for this city, Ottawa started in by cutting the price of house lighting from 15 cents to 7 1/2 cents. But Toronto, and last year's business was so good that a further reduction to 6 1/2 cents was decided on. The steady growth of business for the Ottawa electric power plant, without special solicitation on the part of the city, has given promoters of the city electric plant a confidence that a profitable investment, Mr. Alexander Dow, a Detroit electric expert, assured the board of control that in three or four years, if not earlier, this city would have customers for 10,000 horsepower, including the city lighting. At present the city guarantees to take a minimum of 4,500 horsepower.

COMMISSION TO DECIDE

As to a Uniform Bill of Lading for Railways.

Toronto, April 19.—A last conference of the shipping interests and railwaymen in regard to the proposed uniform bill of lading was held in the offices of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association today.

The details were further discussed, and it was finally agreed to have the Dominion board of railway commissioners decide the question on May 20 at Ottawa.

The interested parties have come to a standstill as far as their relative positions on most of the points involved are concerned, and it is expected that the board will be able to dispose of the outstanding questions, without serious trouble.

Delaware Lady Dead.

Mrs. Frederick Maier, widow of the late John Maier, died at her home at 575 Siding in Delaware on Sunday after a brief illness. Mrs. Maier was 75 years old and is survived by a grown-up family. The funeral will be held at Delaware Cemetery Thursday afternoon.

Newcastle, Ont., April 20.—William Henry Gerrill, a native of Devonshire, Eng., died here at the age of 91 years. He came to this country in 1854, landing at Bowmanville, accompanied by his wife and three children. He was twice married, and both wives and six children predeceased him. His last years were spent with his only surviving child, Mrs. Atkinson, of this village. In the old and Mr. Gerrill was intimate with members of the Wesley family, with whom he used to sing carols.

HAS A BROKEN BACK

Hugh Duff Has Lived Over Three Years, Though Crippled.

Watford Station, April 20.—On Jan. 15, 1906, Hugh Duff, aged 50 years, one of the oldest settlers living 2 miles west of here, had his back broken by a falling water tank, and his lower limbs have been partly paralyzed ever since. Though unable to walk, he otherwise enjoys good health.

MRS. KILLAM TO WED

Widow of Railway Board's Late Chairman To Remarry.

Winnipeg, Man., April 20.—The engagement is announced of W. R. Allan, chairman of the Canadian National Railway Board, to Mrs. Killam, the widow of the late chairman of the railway commission. She was Miss Minnie Whyte, of Windsor.

SULTAN WITHOUT A MINISTRY

(Continued from Page One.)

And Nazim Pasha, commanding the force in the capital, sent in his resignations to the Sultan late last night. The Sultan, thereupon, summoned Hilmi Pasha, the late grand vizier, but Hilmi hesitated to resume office. His majesty then called Tewfik Pasha, to the palace, and the grand vizier has been closeted with the Sultan since early this morning. It is said that the outcome of this conference, which is known to portend a momentous decision, will be announced shortly.

Young Turks Murdered

London, April 20.—The Constantinople correspondent of the Times says that parliament yesterday discussed the question as to whether the deputies should continue their deliberations in the capital, or repair to the Macedonian camp in the capital. Kemal, chief of the Liberal Union, committed a gross blunder on Saturday which cost him his chances for the presidency of the assembly by informing the house that the deputies, no matter to which party they belonged, were to be shot. The remark, which was received by a majority of the members, was a dispatch to the Times from Vienna says: Report is published as coming from military sources that 220 Young Turkish officers, including all the officers of the cavalry regiment, were murdered last week. If that is true, the alleged demand of the authors of the conspiracy may acquire a grim significance.

Advancing on the Capital.

Constantinople, April 20.—All the forts surrounding the entrance to the Sea of Marmora from the Black Sea are now occupied by the Constitutional troops, and the soldiers supporting the Young Turks are advancing upon the capital. No definite information as to when they will enter Constantinople can be obtained.

Peril of Civilians.

London, April 20.—Should fighting occur on the streets of Constantinople the loss of life among the civilians would be enormous, is the opinion of an American army officer, who witnessed the revolutionary outbreak at the Turkish capital of last Tuesday. "As an instance," the officer continues, "there was a clash Tuesday night between the two small sections of soldiery. Three soldiers were killed and seven were wounded, whereas the casualties among civilians amounted to 60. This is accounted for by the fact that the populace, apparently without fear, mingled freely with the troops, and received a large number of the bullets intended for the rebels."

Killed Celebrating.

The officer estimates that at least 1,000 rounds of ball cartridges were fired Tuesday night to celebrate the success of the revolt, and he believes that many women and children must have been killed or wounded in their homes, as the walls of the houses have been shelled by the rebels.

Foreign official opinion in Turkey is strongly favorable to the Young Turks. The Liberal Union, which was supposed to be the heart of the movement is without great influence. The reactionaries used the name of the union, and under this banner they hoped to abolish the constitution and restore the old regime. Their momentary success might have
