IMMENSE CROWD AT SUNDAY CONCERT

Majestic Theatre Could Not Accommodate All the People Last Night.

A SPLENDID PROGRAM

Police Say That Concert Did Good Work in Taking Crows Off the Streets.

The first Sunday band concert of the winter season, held in the Majestic Theatre last evening, attracted an audience the equal of which has seldom been seen in London at any gathering. The affair was marked by the strictest propriety and orderliness, and police officials who were present commented on the fact that the entertainment served to draw from the streets many who would not otherwise be so well occupied.

The programme was one of unusual excellence, and reflected much credit upon Mrs. (Dr.) Kingsmill, convenor of the concert committee and others who assisted her in the arrangements.

The doors were opened at 8:45 in order to provide an entertainment after church, until 10 o'clock. An immense crowd was attracted, filling the lobby in a solid wedge and out to the middle of the street. On the opposite side several hundred people also gathered, unable to gain admission. Mrs. Kingsmill, who has studied recently under Dr. Gutzwiller, Toronto, an eminent voice culturist, rendered a solo in an exceptionally pleasing manner. Her rendition of Hamilton Gray's "Dream of Pauline" was loudly applauded, and encores were not permitted.

Mr. Ed. Webster's "Open the Gates," by Knapp, also pleased greatly, as did "The Last Chord," a cornet solo by Mr. Rogers, of the First Hussars Band. The band under the efficient direction of Mr. Roselle Pococke, excelled itself and earned many encomiums from the crowded house. Mr. A. D. Jordan was the piano accompanist.

The audience was requested in the program to stand and sing the hymn and responded in an inspiring manner. Rev. Canon Tucker, of St. Paul's Cathedral, led the Lord's Prayer and pronounced the benediction at the conclusion of the concert.

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SUNDAY IN LONDON CHURCHES

ONLY RIGHTEOUSNESS WILL PRESERVE RACE

Professor Patterson's Sermon in the First Methodist Church.

Prof. W. J. Patterson, of the Western University, occupied the pulpit of the First Methodist Church on Sunday evening in the interests of the layman's missionary movement.

Prof. Patterson commenced his remarks with the verse, "This day is the Scripture fulfilled in your ears." From that day forward, the speaker stated, there had been a constant struggle to extend the gospel. One-third only of the 1,600,000,000 people in the world today had reached, and were nominally Christians. The other two-thirds were yet in darkness and were awaiting the arrival of the gospel.

"In all great movements," said the speaker, "there are two forces which are environment and destiny. Environment is that which influences man, and destiny is that force with which the person is able to influence others."

He traced the growth of the Anglo-Saxon race, which had come from small beginnings, and in some instances the nation had failed because they were unwilling to observe righteousness. The Greek and Roman races had fallen and decayed from this same fact. The Anglo-Saxon races were liable to the same fate unless the spirit of righteousness was cultivated. The downfall of the empire of ancient Europe should serve as a warning to the people of today.

Only those nations could succeed who were willing to transmit the gospel and Christian religion to other nations. Hence lay the importance of the evangelization of the world in this generation.

A WEAK SPIRIT IS SHOWN BY THE WORLD

Professor Gandier's Criticism of Present-Day People in Spiritual Matters.

The hesitating spirit which dominated the children of Israel at the period of their march toward the promised land, was identical to that which the people of the world were exhibiting today in not accepting the Savior and seeking an entrance into the celestial kingdom.

Joshua and Caleb, the two faithful spies returned from the promised land with true reports, said the speaker. "But the children of Israel lacked faith in God, and would not venture forward at the time. They were punished accordingly."

"When Christ came to the world two thousand years ago, we have a repetition of the same events, but on a greater scale," continued the minister. "Christ was sent into the world to save the people and prepare them for the promised land, but faith was again found wanting and they refused to follow the Savior's lead."

Principal Gandier stated that the time was ripe for another religious revolution. The organization of numerous religious bodies throughout the world combined with the efforts of the church missionaries and the great Layman's Missionary Movement is the work of the Father in heaven was again opening the door of opportunity for his people. If the offer was not accepted this time, he did not know when the people would be received back and restored. This is the crucial time for the salvation of the world. It may be the final call; it should be heeded.

REVIVAL MEETING IN ASKIN ST. METH. CHURCH

Will Be Continued Every Evening This Week With the Exception of Saturday.

A series of revival meetings were commenced in Askin Street Methodist Church Sunday morning by Dr. A. E. Burrows and Professor W. W. Weaver, and will be continued every evening this week with the exception of Saturday. Large congregations attended the services yesterday and listened to two powerful sermons by Dr. Burrows.

In the evening he spoke from the text, II Samuel, xxiii, 10, and compared the warfare between the Israelites and the Philistines to that which is now being waged between the Christian church and the army of the devil. "Every living person today is either fighting for Christ or against Him, and even if one's neighbors are mistaken as to the cause, that one is fighting for God and will give a fitting reward. Some men give Jesus Christ a black eye several times a day and others are putting the devil in the hospital daily. Every series of revival meetings is merely a renewed effort upon the part of the army of the devil, who brings his forces to bear upon the point of attack."

"Election was completely worn out after the battle with the Philistines and laid down to rest. Today the man who doesn't get tired with his labor is of no account, and those that haven't undertaken a job which will fatigue them are not worth considering. The fight against sin is hard work, and the influence brought to bear upon the people must be greater than that of the saloon gambling-hells, white slave traffic and so-called society."

To successfully combat the power of the devil we must have confidence in God and take a firm hold upon the Bible, which will be our only weapon in the struggle. No matter what our personal feelings are we must drop all that conflict with the truths of the Bible. PROFESSOR HILL TO MEN'S LEAGUE

Talked in Askin St. Methodist Church on Sunday on the Subject of Diseases.

Dr. H. W. Hill, of the London College of Preventive Medicine, addressed a large meeting of the Men's League of Askin Street Church Sunday morning on "The Source and Route of Infection." The meeting was one of the largest held since the organization of the league, and was attended by over 10 men connected with the church.

Dr. Hill stated that epidemics are now met in the best way to prevent the increase of the number of cases of a disease. The spreading of a disease is due, according to the speaker, to the number of cases, whether large or small, that are reported to the proper authorities. The most successful method of fighting diseases known to Dr. Hill is to discover and quarantine every case in the community.

Many municipalities are misled into believing a minor danger to be the most important and threatening cause of disease, and neglect the greatest danger to fight that which has little or no bearing on the disease. Much attention has been paid to the crusade against house flies, but these are not such a menace to public health as the drinking water of the community.

SPECIAL SERVICES MARKED ANNIVERSARY

Rev. Dr. Boyle, of Toronto, Spoke in London South in Sunday.

Special services of an anniversary nature were held in St. James' Church, South London, on Sunday, and both services were conducted by Rev. Dr. Boyle, of Trinity College, Toronto. The work of the Anglican Church in South London was commenced over 35 years ago, and since the commencement Rev. Dean Davis has had charge. Fourteen years ago the present church building was erected, and yesterday's services were in commemoration of the event.

Dr. Boyle reviewed the history of the church since its inception, and congratulated the church members, both past and present, upon the work and growth of the congregation. At the evening service the minister spoke from the words, "The door was shut," and showed the various kinds of doors that are opened but once to every person. Dr. Boyle emphasized the state of the church, and the need of the present time for the opportunity to be opened to each person but once, and advised his hearers to be on the alert for their opportunity. Special music was rendered by the choir under the leadership of Mr. Charles Perry.

FALL SAVED LIFE OF YOUNG INSPECTOR

Touched Wire Carrying 2,400 Volts and Was Terribly Burned.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Windsor, Nov. 3.—While at work on top of a ladder in the electrical transmission station at the mouth of the new Michigan Central tunnel, Murray McQueen, aged 29 years, one of the inspectors, accidentally touched a high-tension circuit, and a current of 2,400 volts passed down his right arm, emerging much as a lightning bolt might do, just below the right knee. The instant he made the contact, McQueen lost consciousness, and fell from the ladder to the concrete floor, fifteen feet. The fall undoubtedly saved his life by breaking the circuit. The young man was attended to by Dr. James Gow, who believes he will recover.

A hole as large as a 25-cent piece was left in the flesh of the leg at the point where the current emerged. McQueen is a son of Douglas McQueen, station agent for the Michigan Central here.
