Kincardine Threshers Terribly Injured by Piece of Cylinder. Which Burst While Working.

FRENCH EMBASSY SAYS GERMANS LIE

Only 20,000 in Maubeuge Garrison, Whose Fall is Not Confirmed-No Corps of Snipers.

LONDON, Sept. 11 .- 8:10 p.m. - German statements that snipers had been organized by the French two months before the war were denounced tonight at the French embassy as "demon-strably false." Several other German statements were denied in the statement, which said:

The news from Berlin announced yesterday that Maubeuge had been taken with four generals, 400 guns and

The capture remains unconfirmed. Forty thousand men could not in any case have been made prisoners, for the garrison is less than 20,000.

The alleged numbers are on par with the news of the French aeroplanes having dropped bombs on Nuremburg, and with that of France's Tierreurs (snippers) having been organized 'two months before the war.' If they had been, some trace would probably have been found since, and none has. The truth is that neither before or after red war on France was any such corps organized. LONDON, Sept. 12 .- 2:30 a.m. - The correspondent of the Daily Telegraph has sent the following dispatch

from the front: "The last remnants of the German cavalry has been destroyed and a large part of their mobile artillery and ammunition trains have been taken. Huge numbers of their rank and file have been either captured or cut off. 'A wireless message to Berlin, which was intercept-

ed here today, said: 'We are badly in need of horses and supplies.' "A German general who slept in an inn here last night was overheard to say to one of his aides: 'A great

disaster has overtaken us.' "An English officer of an aviation scouting corps remarked: 'It will be a miracle if any of these Germans get home again. Their only anxiety now is to increase the distance between themselves and their pursuers.'

"There can be no doubt that the tide has turned in the Allies' favor. The great German coup has failed. There will be no siege of Paris, and the Government can safely return from Bordeaux at once."

PETROGRAD, Sept. 11.—It is announced that the Russian troops have succeeded in separating the left wing of the Austrian army from the troops which were operating around Tomaszow and Rawa, in Russian

Winston Churchill Says Results so Far Are Very **Encouraging to Great** Britain.

[Canadian Press.] LONDON, Sept. 11.-11:15 p.m.

-Under the auspices of the National Liberal and Constitutional Clubs, two great rival political organizations of the metropolis, whose members before the war were scarcely on speaking terms, an enthusiastic meeting was held in the London Opera House tonight in support of the Prime Minister's call for recruits. The chief speakers were Winston Spencer Churchill, first lord of the admiralty; F. E. Smith, director of the official press bureau, and Will Crooks, labor leader in the House of Commons

"It is too soon to speculate upon the result of the great battle which is now being waged in France.' said Mr. Churchill, "but everything we have heard during four long days of anxiety seems to point to a marked and substantial turning of the tide. We have seen the force of the French and British armies strong enough, not only to restrain and check the devastating avalanche which has swept over the French frontier, but now for four long days the enemy has been splendidly rolled back.

Better Than Expected. "In a battle taking place on a front of over 100 or 150 miles, one must be careful not to build too high hopes on the results achieved. But when every allowance has been made for the uncertainty with which great operations always are enshrouded over so great an area, the situation tonight is better, far better, than the cold calculations of the forces available before the war could lead us to expect in this early stage of the campaign. But had this battle been as disastrous as, thank God, it appears to have been triumphant, I should have come before you tonight with unabated confidence, with the certainty that we have only to continue our efforts to bring this war to the conclusion, which we wish and in-

Result is Encouraging.

"The war has now been in pro gress five or six weeks. In that time we have swept German commerce from the seas. All our ships, with inconsiderable exceptions, are arriving safely and punctually at their destinations, carrying the commerce upon which the wealth and industries and power to make war of this country depend. We have transported, not without danger, but, still, hitherto safely and successfully, great numbers of soldiers across the seas from all quarters of the world to be directed upon the decisive theatre of the land struggle. We have swept the so-called German ocean without discovering a German flag.

The number of battleships that will be completed within the next twelve months is more than double the number that will be completed for Germany, and the number of cruisers will be three or four times as great. Therefore, we may count upon the naval supremacy of the country being effectively main-

Great Army Needed "What we now have to do is to make under cover and shield of the navy a great army, strong enough to enable the country to take its proper share in the decision of this terrible struggle To make the assistance of the Empire effective, we should put on the continent and keep there an army of at least 1,000,000 men. That
