

IT TAKES A JOINT OF BEEF TO MAKE A

Michigan Champion Has the Edge on New York's

Frankie Brennan Outpoints "Young" Fisher, Fighting the Cleaner Scrap—Big Gloves Prevented Knock-Out Being Scored, But the Punches Were There.

Frankie Brennan of Detroit, middleweight champion of Michigan, clearly outpointed Charlie "Young" Fisher of Syracuse, in a ten-round mill at the Masonic Temple, under the auspices of the Sportsman's Patriotic Association, Monday night. The bout developed into a real scrap after the half-way mark had been reached, and had the boys been wearing eight-ounce gloves, instead of eight-ounce gloves, Brennan would probably have been knocked out. Brennan landed several blows in the different rounds that would have made "Fish" swim toward the bottom of the sea had lighter gloves been used.

Fisher is Hissed. Although both boys used their elbows, Fisher got in the most swabs, and was hissed several times by the crowd. He was the shorter of the two, and looked to be smaller than he was by adopting the crouching attitude. He had a few good punches, but did not get any thing. He did not have the reach that Brennan possessed, and therefore did very little of the leading.

Brennan's Fine Work. Brennan put up a good, mainly exhibition, and fought fairly all the way through. He apparently did not know what a crouch was, for he waded into Mr. Fisher every trip, with his head up, and had no idea of slipping out of the tight corners on many occasions. In the first round the boys merely felt each other out, exchanging a few love-taps to the jaw in the final stages of the round. The crowd applauded heartily.

In the second round Brennan landed some good body punches, after which Fisher threw him to his knees. Frankie came back, rushing the Syracuse hope to the ropes, landing to the face.

They Warm Up. The third round was faster. The boys were warming up to the evening's work. Brennan did most of the leading, and his punches were more effective. Fisher started out strong in the fourth, and got away with some clever boxing. Frankie rushed him to the ropes, and brought the crowd to its feet by landing six vicious wallops to Fisher's jaw. The lad from Syracuse became some puffed, and told Frankie all about his ancestors, etc. Frankie

Gardner jumped into the air and pulled down Miller's terrific line. It was brilliant fielding by the Sox players.

BRITISH TROOPS ARE VERY ACTIVE AGAIN IN ARRAS SECTORS

Raid German Trenches, Inflict Casualties, Take Prisoners.

GAS IS DISCHARGED Successful Operations Reported North of the Ancre River.

LONDON, Oct. 9.—British troops north of the River Somme made progress during Friday night, says a British official statement issued today, and established positions to the east of Le Sars and in the direction of Butte de Warlencourt, on the road to Baupenne. Ground has also been gained north of Stuff Redoubt in the region of Thiepval.

Unusual activity has marked operations in the neighborhood of Arras which is at the northern end of a 20-mile salient extending from the British lines north of the Ancre River. Early this morning the British extended German trenches south of Arras. Yesterday successful raids were carried out near Neuville St. Vaast, north of Arras, and at Loos, northwest of Lens.

The official communication issued tonight from British headquarters in France says: "In the neighborhood of Le Transloy a party of the enemy was caught in the open by our artillery and dispersed. As a result of a local operation we gained ground north of Stuff Redoubt, inflicting serious losses on the enemy and taking over 200 prisoners, including six officers."

"Early this morning we successfully entered the enemy's trenches south of Arras. Southward of Stuff a strong enemy party rushed a crater fronting our lines, but was immediately ejected with heavy casualties."

An earlier British report read as follows: "British Gas Gas. 'Gas was discharged successfully at different points along our front north of the Ancre. The enemy's reply was feeble and our patrols were able to enter his trenches and secure prisoners. Several raids were carried out by us in the neighborhood of Neuville St. Vaast and Loos. The enemy's trenches were entered in all cases, many casualties being inflicted on the enemy. Prisoners taken. In addition three machine gun emplacements were destroyed, and considerable damage done to the enemy's trenches."

French Reports. The following official communication was issued tonight from the French war office: "On the Somme there has been sustained activity by our artillery. The enemy's reply was particularly brisk in the region southwest of Baucourt in the regions of Belloy and Denicourt."

"This morning an enemy attack, starting from the St. Pierre Vaast wood, was repulsed by our artillery. Shortly afterwards a reconnaissance debouching from a small wood northeast of Boussines was repulsed by our artillery. On the remainder of the front there is nothing to report."

The official French statement issued this afternoon says: "On the Somme the night was calm to the north of the river. To the south there were bombardment on each side."

"In the Roye district the enemy carried out a very lively bombardment against our Camby-Sur-Matz positions. Our artillery replied with vigour."

"On the rest of the front there was nothing to report."

TREMENDOUS BATTLE STILL RAGING, SAYS BERLIN.

BERLIN, Oct. 9.—(via London)—The official statement issued today regarding the west front follows: "Front of Duke Albert of Wuertemberg.—In the neighborhood of the front of the army of Prince Rupprecht of Bavaria lively artillery and patrol activity continued."

"The tremendous battle on the Somme continues. Yesterday our Allied enemies, if possible, increased their efforts. Heavy and costly fighting, which the heroic infantry and powerful artillery of the army of General von Buelow has inflicted upon them grew proportionately greater. Not the smallest trench element on the twenty-five kilometre battle front was lost."

"Between Guedecourt and Bouchavesne the English and French, repulsed by our artillery, delivered assaults with special violence at very short intervals. The troops of the army of General von Boehm and General von Gallwitz repulsed the enemy every day. Near Le Sars we took twenty prisoners and took two machine guns. Also, north of the Ancre and a few sectors south of the Somme, the artillery duels increased to the greatest violence."

"Front of Crown Prince.—Extensive German explosions in the Argonne destroyed French trenches over a considerable front. East of the Meuse the artillery fire revived from time to time on both sides."

DEATH OF MRS. O. WESTELL. KINCARDINE, Oct. 9.—Mrs. Omar Westell died Thursday evening after a long illness. She was 55 years old. Besides her husband she leaves three daughters, Mrs. T. O. Lake Shore, Mrs. Frank Case, and Mrs. Kincaid. The funeral will be held at 2 p.m. at the home of Mrs. O. Westell, 18th Street, Kincardine, on Saturday afternoon.

SHOULD TREAT THE HUN SUBMARINES AS OUTSIDE THE LAW

Memorandum of Allies Sent to Neutral Governments.

LONDON, Oct. 9.—The operations of the U-53 have created the greatest amount of interest here, but the foreign office states it is inadvisable under present circumstances to make any announcement in regard to the attitude of the British Government.

The text of the memorandum respecting the admission of belligerent submarines into neutral waters or ports, is as follows: "In view of the development of submarine navigation and by reason of acts which in the present circumstances may be unfortunately expected from enemy submarines, the allied governments deem it necessary, in order not only to safeguard their belligerent rights and liberty of commercial navigation but to avoid risks of reprisals to urge neutral governments to take effective measures to make sure that their vessels, if they have not already done so, with a view to preventing belligerent submarine vessels, whatever the purpose to which they are put, from making use of neutral waters, roadsteads and ports."

Difficult to Handle. "In the case of submarine vessels the application of the principles of the law of nations is affected by special and novel conditions: first, by the fact that these vessels can navigate and can thus escape all control; second, by the fact that it is impossible to identify them and establish their character, whether neutral or belligerent; and third, by the fact that they are capable of harm inherent in the nature of such vessels."

"It may further be said that any place which provides a submarine warship far from its base with an opportunity for rest and replenishment of its supplies, thereby furnishes such aid to its powers that the place becomes, in fact, through the advantages which it gives, a base of naval operations."

Should Be Detained. "In view of the state of affairs thus existing, the allied governments are of the opinion that submarine vessels should be excluded from the benefit of the rules hitherto recognized by the law of nations regarding the admission of vessels of war or merchant vessels into neutral waters, roadsteads and ports, and their solution in them. Any belligerent submarine entering a neutral port should be detained there."

The allied governments also state this opportunity to point out to the neutral powers the grave danger incurred by neutral submarines in the navigation of regions frequented by belligerent submarines."

BUCHAREST, Oct. 9, via London, Oct. 10.—The official communication from headquarters issued today reads: "On the northern and northwestern fronts patrol engagements occurred between Kallman and Spelszentgyorgy. In the Brassó (Kronstadt) region we were obliged to fall back towards the northern ends of the Carpathian passes."

"In the Calmet and Jini passes minor infantry and artillery actions were fought, ending in our favor. Southern front.—There was fierce artillery actions east of Zimnistr, (on the Danube). In Dobruja there were artillery and patrol engagements."
