GRAMME OF RADIUM HAS GREAT POWER

Could Lift Vast Building From Off the Ground.

EXPERTS IN MONTREAL

Dr. C. Everett Field Explained

Wonders of Precious Substance As Aid in Cancer Cure.

Montreal, May 29.—The Radium Institute of New York was represented in Montreal recently by Dr. C. Everett Field and Col. R. P. Wadhams, who have been identified with experimental research in radium therapy in the laboratory of this institution since its organization in 1914, about ten thousand cancer cases having been treated since that time. About one-half of this work was done on a philanthropic basis, and Dr. Field, who is an enthusiastic spokesman for the wonderful properties of radium, suggested at the Windsor Hotel yesterday that there was good medical philosophy in making it in this way accessible to the people.

Radium is an expensive but potent material. One gramme of it, Dr. Field said—about a third of a thimbleful—generates within itself sufficient force to lift the great C. P. R. building off the ground. Human life would soon be destroyed if brought into direct contact with a gramme of unprotected radium. A tiny atom of radium is capable of generating rays that will make their beam visible through twelve inches of battleship steel. It takes 28 grammes of radium to make an ounce, but an ounce of this wonder substance today quickly sells for three million dollars, and the laboratories of the world are unable to meet the demand, the whole world's supply at present being only six ounces.

Some insight into the scarcity and expense of this strange substance was found in the doctor's conversation. It takes 300 tons of the carbonate ore treated with 500 tons of chemical solution for two months to produce a gramme of radium worth \$120,000. But the properties of the substance are such that when once produced they are susceptible to conservation, and this one gramme—according to the doctor's computation—is sufficient to treat cancer patients for 1,500 years, even if used for 24 hours a day, and then its energy would be only half-spent. "I have estimated," said he, "that we can give aid to at least 4,000 patients, allowing three separate treatments to each, with a gramme of radium."

A darkened apartment in his room at the hotel Dr. Field gave a demonstration of the mysterious rays which tiny parcels of radium will send forth untrammelled by the tube of glass set within two other tubes of alloyed metal and gold encasing them. Using a small oval stone of "Willemite" (although he explained a diamond or a piece of tinsel would have answered) as a sort of bulwark to absorb the rays, he placed this on top of three pairs of hands laid together. Then, placing his own hand, with the tiny receptacle inclosed in it, at the bottom, there was produced a glow of light, passing through the hands and focussed by the stone, resembling the dull glow of a bulleseye lantern. The newspaperman doubted his fast rounded eyes of these mysterious rays, and a like result was produced, as also a most uncomfortable, eerie feeling. "It won't hurt you," assured the doctor; "you might perhaps safely hold it for an hour."

A like illumination has caused in a mold of willemite, about the size of an ordinary bowl, the stone being placed in a wooden box, and the radium tube held beneath it. In fact, the doctor said that the beams from one of these tiny vessels would penetrate at least twenty inches of tissue. If this radium were out of its glass mold metal encasement it would burn a hole in the body. The rays from one gramme of radium concealed in its protective casing, no larger than a beach pebble, will show on the electroscope (an instrument designed to detect them) over a distance one and one-third times greater than the length of an ordinary football field.

Measure of Treatment.

Dr. Field and Dr. Wadhams were in Montreal for the purpose of discussing radium before the Medical-Chirurgical Society.

Speaking of radium from the medical point of view, he said: "We must not look upon radium as a cancer cure. It is simply one of the most important measures of treatment."

Surgery and radium will certainly cure many cancers, and the percentage of good results is very high in the early stage only. Radium, however, is none the less valuable in its power to relieve symptoms of pain.

Dr. Field exhibited, among devices for using radium medically which he brought for the society's inspection, four needles, resembling small sharpened needles, each of which contained \$1,200 worth of radium. These needles being designed for use in deep tumors. He also showed a set of screens (the gold and alloyed metal and glass vessels referred to) in a variety of patterns devised at their New York laboratories.

THROW FLOWERS AT BLACK WATCH

Strange Scenes in Silesia

Mark Arrival of British Troops.

OPPELN, Silesia, May 30.—The first battalion of the Black Watch arrived here today and met by hundreds of children, who threw flowers at the British soldiers. They broke into marching squads, trying to hold the soldiers' hands and shouted gleefully as the bagpipes screamed the music of the march.

The residents of the place lined the sidewalks smilingly, and the men doffed their hats as the kilts trooped passed. The Scotsmen were pleased at the reception and patted the children's heads and exchanged greetings with the crowd.

The German green police stood at rigid salute until the whole column was by, then went laughing about their duties. The first in the column to arrive in the morning reached here about 3 streets were virtually deserted, but the moment it was known that the British had arrived, men, women and children began running from every direction toward the station, where the battalion formed for the march to the barracks.

As the column wheeled into the narrow, winding main street, two horsemen cleared the way and kept careful eyes on a number of civilians with rifles on their backs, but there was apparent friendliness on every hand and anxiety vanished. From every window handkerchiefs were waved and women threw flowers on the heads of the troops. Some of them wept.

The expression was repeatedly heard from the crowds: "The Poles now have something to reckon with."

The Italians appear eager to co-operate with the British in driving out the insurgents; they have heard that this was the plan. An Italian officer remarked: "It is this time they let us loose on these fellows."

The Black Watch will be quartered here until the remainder of the British force arrives. It is said that they will then be ready to take the field within a week.

PRINTERS ASK

\$1 PER HOUR

Strike Is Almost Certain in Toronto On June 1.

TORONTO, May 30.—According to a member of the committee of the local Typographical Union, is negotiating with the Toronto Typothetae on the question of wages and hours of work, a strike seems imminent among the union job printers of this city on June 1. The men are demanding \$1 per hour for a 44-hour week, and the employers state that it is impossible to give increased wages or a shorter workday, because of conditions which the printing industry faces.

It is said the Typographical Union is chiefly concerned in obtaining the 44-hour week, instead of continuing the 48-hour week, and if this were conceded the men would not insist on an increase in pay.

A final meeting of the men's committee and a committee representing the employers, which will be held tomorrow night to consider the question of enforcing the strike vote taken a short time ago, to become effective on Wednesday.

REMARKABLE FINDS

BY ARCHAEOLOGIST

Interesting and Valuable Discoveries Made Near Abraham's Birthplace.

LONDON, May 29.—Recent excavations in the neighborhood of Abraham's birthplace by Dr. Hall of the British Museum Egyptian department, resulted in many interesting and valuable discoveries. Dr. Hall's researches led to the conclusion that the Babylonian city of Ur, from which the Patriarch Abraham set forth on his wanderings to the Promised Land, existed long before King Urenger repaired it 2,500 B. C. The excavations revealed a number of copper and iron heads, probably intended to be supporters of the throne, with eyes made of shell and jasper, and teeth and tongue, all fastened on with copper wire, were also found. These heads were of cast copper. To cast copper is an exceedingly difficult operation, and the accomplishment of it is an indication of the high point of civilization attained by these early dwellers of lower Babylonia. As the heads were hollow, they were filled with bitumen and clay to make them more durable. This fact explains, most probably the enigma of the image mentioned in Daniel which was a mixture of metal and clay.

Two wonderful columns were discovered. The trunk of these was wood, which perished long ago. They were covered with diamond shape scales fastened with copper wire. These scales were red, black and white. Nothing like these columns had ever been seen before. It is an absolute novelty in archaeology.

One of the most notable finds was a wonderful relief in copper depicting two stars facing in opposite directions and vainly endeavoring to escape from the tails. Dr. Hall interprets the relief as depicting the political and military supremacy of the mighty town of Lagash (modern Tello) over other towns.
