SLAYS WIFE AND WOUNDS 2 OTHERS

Vancouver Man Shoots
Spouse, Small Son and
Aged Uncle.

Vancouver, Feb. 1.—Mrs. Edward Clegg is dead, her 5-year-old son Edward, and an aged uncle, Henry Morgan, are believed to be dying in hospital, and Edward Clegg, husband and father, is being sought by the police here following a brutal shooting here last night. The Clegg family came from Toronto eight months ago.

The killing and wounding occurred when Clegg, who had been in Seattle for the past three weeks, returned to his home here, and after a few words with his wife, it is claimed, opened fire. The woman fell, shot through the heart, and her uncle, who rushed to her aid, dropped with a bullet through the lungs. Clegg then turned the revolver on his tiny son, who sat on a table, a terrified spectator of the tragedy; the bullet lodging in the back of the head, fracturing the skull.

Some trouble is said to have developed between husband and wife over the disposal of money realized from the sale of the Toronto home, owned by Mrs. Clegg, and which Clegg induced her to sell.

In September she made formal complaint to the authorities that her husband had abused her, and the matter was bound over for twelve months to keep the peace. Clegg went away with the boy, but his wife succeeded in getting the custody of the child in October. Soon after this Clegg went to Seattle, and did not return to Vancouver until a few days ago.

FINED \$10 FOR DRIVING OVER HOSE DURING FIRE

G. Wright, who was charged in police court Wednesday morning with driving over a line of hose during the Cowan Hardware fire, was fined \$10 and costs by Deputy Magistrate P. H. Bartlett.

A short time ago a number of citizens appeared in police court, to answer to a similar charge. It was then pointed out that it was a very bad practice, as the hose might break, and not only delay the fighting of the blaze, but endanger the lives of the firemen.

Fire Chief John Aitken states that often in a big fire the firemen are inside the building, surrounded by flames, which makes it necessary that they keep throwing the stream on all sides. If a line they were using was broken by some careless motorist driving over it, in all probability the men would be burned to death.

OPENS CAUCUS IN PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE

Government Supporters From
Over All the Province
Gather in Toronto.

PREDICT STORMY SESSION

Indications Are That Ses-
sional Program Will Be
Laid Before Convention.

Toronto, Feb. 1.—The caucus of government supporters in the provincial legislature opened this afternoon with M. L. A.'s from the four corners of the province present. It has for many years been the custom to hold a meeting of the members on the government side of the house a short time before the legislature opens, so that today's caucus is quite in keeping with past usage, although it is probably the most important conference that has been held since the Farmer-Labor party took control at Queen's Park.

On the threshold of what nearly everyone anticipates will be a fighting session, Premier Durney's followers assembled today evidently determined to lay their plans to meet their opponents carefully and well, and at the same time expressed confidence that they would be successful in the interesting weeks which are to come.

This was a busy forenoon for the members of the cabinet. The M. L. A.'s brought with them the views of their constituents relative to the many questions up for discussion this afternoon, and were eager to impart their views to the ministers of the departments most directly affected. The result was that the time of the department heads was at a premium today with waiting-rooms crowded with visitors.

Both the members of the government and its supporters were of one mind in not wishing to say anything in advance about what was to take place this afternoon, but one thing seemed definitely indicated, and that was that the meeting would be long and the whole program of the Farmer-Labor party for the coming session would be laid before every one of its supporters right to the back benches. This will no doubt include the radical policy of the government, the temperance act, the reforms proposed in the administration of justice, including the position of sheriffs, aid to unemployment, and there seems to be a strong probability that the question of the separate school demands will be discussed. This latter is bound to prove one that will need very careful handling.

BOMB HURLED AT CAR OF FIUME PRESIDENT

Fiume, Feb. 1.—An attempt was made on the life of President Zanella of the independent state of Fiume, as he was leaving his hotel in a motor car yesterday. A bomb was thrown at the machine, but the president was not injured.

A member of the chamber of deputies and a police officer were wounded by the explosion.

LONDONER SUED FOR ATTACK ON GODERICH GIRL

Robert Foley Brings Action
Against Robert Kelly of
Beattie Avenue.

DEFENDANT DENIES ALL

Claims Jewelry Clerk Was
Mistaken as to Purchaser
of Watches.

The action of Robert Foley of Goderich, against Robert Kelly, 29 Beattie avenue, is being proceeded with at the winter sittings before Chief Justice R. M. Meredith. Mr. Foley is asking damages for an alleged attack on his daughter Clara, who was employed as a domestic at the Kelly home from April 1, 1920, till December 17, the same year.

Clara Foley, the youthful daughter, appeared in court with a baby born August 14, 1921. She stated that she had had relations with the defendant on a number of occasions and that at different times he had purchased clothing for her. Mr. Kelly had also bought her a watch before Christmas and had given her money frequently. Asked by J. W. G. Winnett as to the paternity of the child, Miss Foley with tears coursing down her cheeks, sobbed out "Mr. Kelly." She said she received \$3.50 a week from Mrs. Kelly as wages.

Cross-examined by Jared Vining, counsel for the defence, Miss Foley admitted that when she was visiting a Mrs. Crockett at Dorchester she had taken a purse and skirt from the house without the permission of her hostess. She denied having been friendly with numerous young men.

Girls' Sister Testifies.
Mrs. Charles Simpson, sister of Miss Foley, stated that she had seen her sister and Kelly together a number of times, and had accused Kelly of taking her sister to St. Thomas.

A resident of Queen's avenue where Miss Foley went to work after leaving Kelly's, stated that he had seen the defendant call for the girl at his home.

Roy Burridge, clerk at Young's jewelry store in East London, stated that Kelly had purchased two ladies' watches from him. He paid \$30 by check for one and \$20 cash for the other.

Charles Simpson said that he had seen his sister-in-law with Kelly the day before Thanksgiving 1920. He and his wife went to see Kelly in April 1921 and the latter had declared that he knew nothing about the matter.

Cross examined by Mr. Vining, witness became angry, the judge interrupting with the remark, "civility on both sides if you please." This ended the case for the plaintiff.

Defendant Denies All.

Robert Kelly said that he had lived in Thorndale for 23 years before moving to London seven years ago. He denied ever having any relations with the Foley girl. He had never taken her to St. Thomas, given her money or bought her clothing, or a watch. Witness, who had said that he bought a watch from him was mistaken, as was also the resident of Queen's avenue who had stated he had seen him at his house.

Mrs. Robert Kelly declared that she had paid Miss Foley \$4 a week for her services, and that almost from the first she had not been satisfied with her habits. The girl was always wanting to go out in the evening.

cident happen, but a few seconds later saw Mrs. Sovereign's body drop away from the car, 20 feet from the crossing where she had been struck. The car was still moving, she declared.

Frank Kent, a mail clerk, stated that he saw the car shoot past the corner going at 20 miles or more. He helped take Mrs. McElhardy off the bumper of the motor.

Mrs. Bridget McElhardy, the last witness called, told of leaving the Methodist parsonage with Mrs. Sovereign and her little daughter sometime between 8.30 and 9 o'clock. It was still daylight. They walked to the corner and before crossing the road looked both ways. There was a wagon and a buggy about 20 feet from the crossing, but they thought they had lots of time to cross. They did not see the motor car approaching. She stepped along the crossing and couldn't tell any more about it. The witness had to be lifted into the witness-box on a chair, and seemed to be quite bright and cheerful, notwithstanding the handicap of not being able to walk.

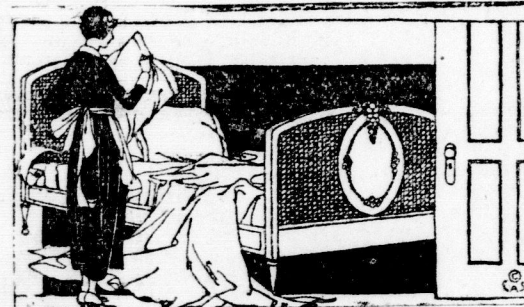

these. He is extremely popular in Italy. He's 64, and has been a cardinal 14 years. He is a strong Italian patriot and stands for reconciliation between the Vatican and the Italian government.

Another leading possibility is Cardinal Ratti of Milan. Ratti has been a cardinal only one year, but Pope Benedict had been a cardinal only four months when elevated. Ratti started his career as curate in the libraries of Milan and the Vatican.

Then he became apostolic visitor to Poland, while Poland was struggling for freedom.

When Poland was freed he became papal nuncio. He also acted as ecclesiastical diplomat in Finland and Russia, making an enviable record of accomplishment.

Cardinal la Fontaine of Venice also is considered. La Fontaine is 62, and was made a cardinal in 1910. Alessio Ascalesi of Benevento has been mentioned as another possibility. But by most he is considered a long shot—his 49.
