

DETROIT TUNNEL BILL THROWN OUT

Ousted in Senate When Border Cities Protest Against Private Company.

Ottawa, June 19.—The railway committee of the Senate tonight threw out a bill to incorporate the Detroit & Windsor Subway Company, which sought a charter to construct a tunnel to carry vehicular traffic between Windsor and Detroit. The bill was protested against by a delegation from the Border Cities and Essex county, which claimed that the private tunnel scheme would interfere with the financing of the municipal bridge project which is being promoted. Mitchell of Windsor told the committee that the people of the Border Cities did not want a tunnel.

The delegation also waited on the prime minister and other members of the government and asked that bonds for the bridge be endorsed by the government. NAME TO BE KEPT BY PRESBYTERIANS

Fraser Declares Continuing Church Will Defend Name in Courts.

Montreal, June 19.—Claiming that the church union bill as passed by the federal parliament is unconstitutional in its provision for the organization of religious bodies outside the United Church under any name but "The Presbyterian Church in Canada," Principal D. J. Fraser of the Presbyterian college stated today that the continuing Presbyterian would go on under that name. "We hold that we are the Presbyterian church, and naturally have a right to our own name," he said. Dr. Fraser declared the question would probably have to be decided by civil courts.

WOMAN IS CHARGED WITH SLASHING NEGRO

May Schuler Arrested at Hamilton—Argument Over O. T. A. Case Alleged.

Hamilton, June 19.—As she turned to go, after paying a \$100 fine on an O. T. A. count, May Schuler was re-arrested today on a charge of having wounded George Windish, negro, in a razor fight. Windish was picked up by police Tuesday, and has been in the general hospital since then suffering from severe wounds. The man had long refused to name his assailant, detectives said, but finally accused May Schuler. According to his story, an argument over a O. T. A. case ended violently, with the woman slashing him over the face and shoulders with a razor.

Multiple Sclerosis. S. C. asks: I would appreciate it if you could give me some information on the spinal disorder, multiple sclerosis. Is it hereditary? How is it acquired? Is there some other very similar term that could have been confused with it? What is indicated by a series of cracking sounds from the spine when the body is forcibly twisted at the hips? Can this be remedied?

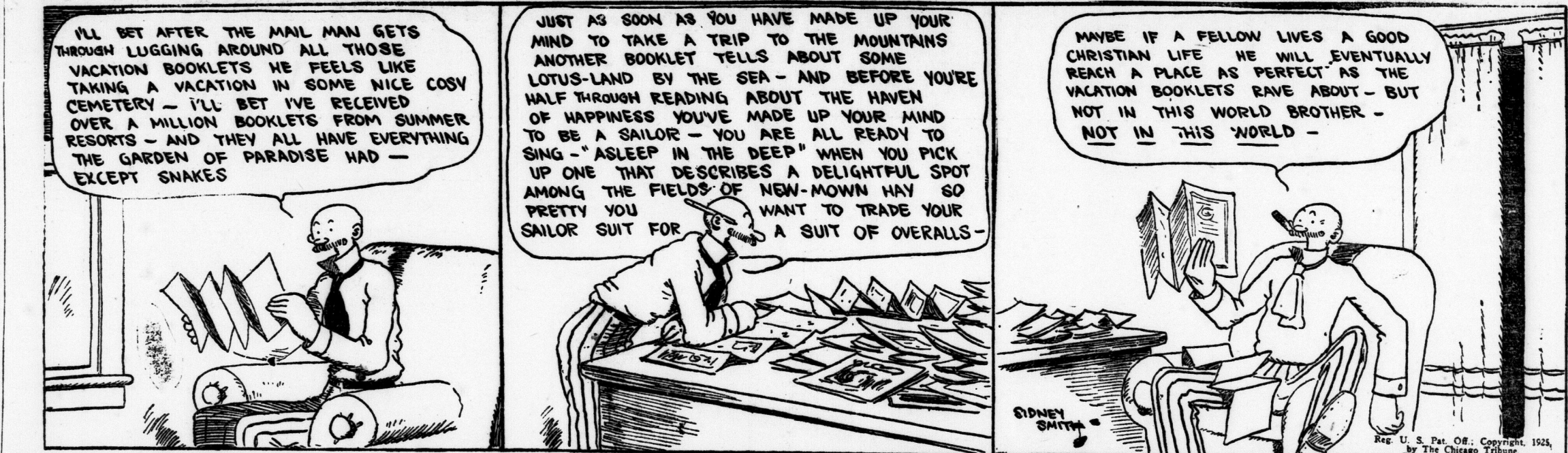
Answer—Multiple sclerosis is a chronic disease, associated with patches of hardening in the spinal cord and brain. Little is known of the cause of this disease. Some of the victims give a history of infectious disease, poisoning by one of the metals, or of injury, but there is no established relationship between these things and this disease. Most of these cases occur in early adult life. The disease causes a variety of symptoms, and is slowly progressive. There is no cure, though certain drugs will sometimes relieve certain symptoms. The cracking sound from the spine when the body is twisted at the hips might be due to a chronic inflammation of the joints between the vertebrae, or to some anatomical peculiarity of the individual. It is not possible to make a positive statement.

Poisoning From Fireworks. Many years ago numerous cases were reported of serious injuries to the workers in factories in which yellow phosphorus was used in the manufacture of matches and fireworks. Workmen in the roach paste and match industry developed severe destruction of the bones, particularly those of the jaw, from the repeated inhalation of the fumes of phosphorus. It is, therefore, interesting to have reports from Doctors Dwyer and Helwig of a case observed by them recently in which a child was poisoned by fireworks containing phosphorus. A three-year-old boy had pains in the stomach and vomited frequently. He became drowsy, the skin was yellow, and his heart became rapid and his liver was enlarged. In spite of all that could be done in treating him, he died four days after eating the material that contained the phosphorus.

The Division of Industrial Hygiene of the New York State department of labor has records of seven deaths of little children who put in their mouths such fireworks as "spit devils" and "devil-on-the-walk," which are supposed to be ground under the heel and which continue to crack, spit and sputter when used in this way. This type of fireworks is made of such chemicals as potassium chlorate, iron oxide, magnesium carbonate and gum arabic with several per cent of phosphorus. Investigations as to the best methods of treatment show that the thing to do is to give as quickly as possible several tablespoonfuls of liquid petroleum or mineral oil. This oil is not taken up by the stomach and intestines, so that it will not be absorbed into the body, as would be the case if castor oil were given. As soon as possible a physician should be summoned, who will wash out the stomach and get as much of the poison out as is possible in this manner. All such treatment must be given immediately, as the absorption of the phosphorus by the body will usually result promptly in the death of the child.

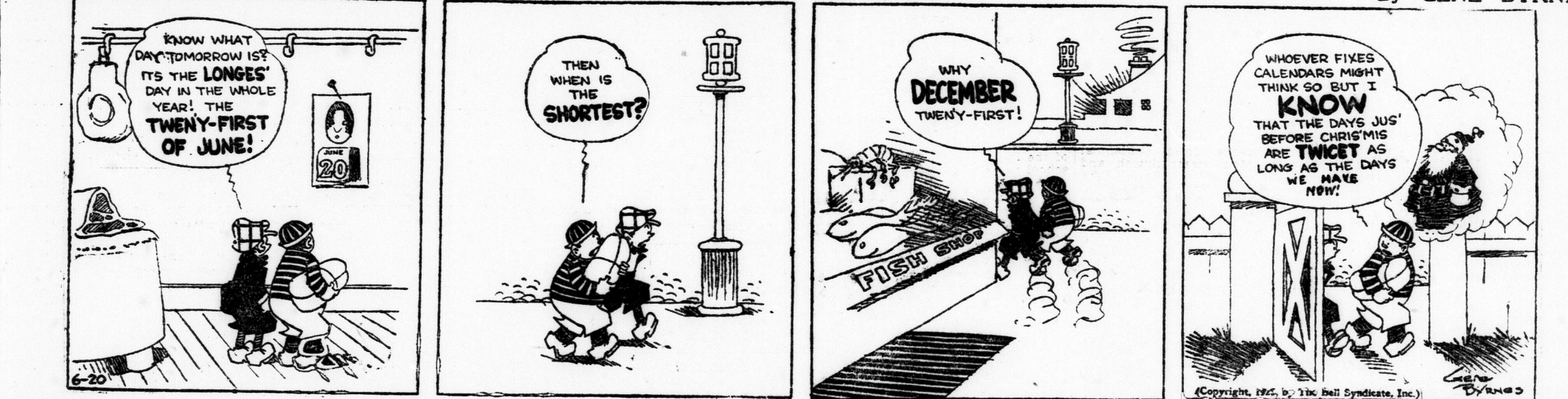
