A party of blue jackets landed at Fort Gabaru and spiked nine guns in position this morning. The Monarch fired at and soon destroyed another battery.

The gunboat Iris has arrived at Port Said, and lies with one broadside bearing on the town and the other upon an Egyptian corvette commanded by one of Arabi Pasha's officers. There are 428 British subjects, 500 Egyptian soldiers, and 200 police at Port Said.

PEOCLAMATION FROM THE MAPPINE

It is stated that Arabi has only 4000 very much disorganized troops. Two hundred marines have been ordered to march through the town and shoot all persons ricting. The report that the steamer Gien Lyon is ashore in the Sucz Canal and being looted is unfounded. There are no signs of an attempt to block the canal.

LONDON, July 14—In the house of commons Mr. Gladstone stated that the consul at Alexandria, Mr. Cartwright, telegraphed that the khedive had secured the loyalty of the cavalry and infantry guards sent to watch him and would summon the leading Pashas and endeavor to re-establish order.
