

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done in Toronto. Our wheat and flour markets are thus reported at present. Wheat dull, actual transactions by wholesale at from 70o. to 81c. Flour, such as bakers use, from \$4.65 to \$4.87 per barrel. The fault is not with the millers ; flour is cheap enough in comparison with wheat. We have before spoken of cheap wheat and dear bread, but we must now change the expression : cheap flour (by wholesale) and dear bread is the fact to which we would now direct public attention. When you buy flour by retail, always remember that the bakers buy wholesale.



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
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
